Stockholm, October 30, O. S.

ON Thursday last arrived here General Lubras, who has been so long expected as Ambassador from the Court of Moscow; but we now hear that he is to take no Character upon him: As he is a little indisposed, he has not yet taken his Audience. A few Days ago arrived here also Ali Bachi, Minister from the Dey and Republick of Tripoly. His Swedish Majesty has been indisposed for these few Days past with a Fit of the Gravel.

Journal of the Confederate Army continued, from the 5th of November to the 10th.

UPON the 5th of November the Combined Army decamped in order to advance to Kutenberg. The Duke of Weissenfelds fixed his Quarters at Widjitz, a short Hour from Cziflow, and about a Mile from the first mentioned Place, in which Prince Charles took up his.

Three hundred of our Tartars, who were detached with a small Body of Hussars to reconnoitre the Position of the Prussian Army, obliged some of their advanced Posts to retire; and having fallen in with some straggling Equipages, they made 46 of the Escort Prisoners, besides many Officers, and carried off the Carriages and a great many Horses.

The Duke received a Letter from Prince Charles, advising him, that according to the Reports of the Situation of the Prussian Camp, it was probable, that they were directing their March either towards Kolin, or on the Side of Podiebrad.

Upon the 6th Prince Charles sent Advice to the Duke of the Position of his Army, and of the Distribution of the different Corps, according to what had been concerted between them before.

Conformably to this Plan, Lieutenant General Count Nadafti is posted with the Light Horse near Kaurzim, over-against the Right Wing of the Prussians, whose Communication with Prague, and on this Side the Elbe, is cut off; Lieutenant General Ffestetitz, with a Party of Hussars, being posted between the two Fronts at Cottuchau. General Ghylani is with his Corps at Alt Kolin, before the Right Wing of the Combined Army beyond Kutenberg, and the Pandours are dispersed along the Front, guarding the advanced Posts.

According to what the Prussian Deserters report, the Regiments in Garrison at Prague, having all been drawn out of that Place, except Prince Henry of Prussia's Regiment, have rejoined the Army, and the Sick who were in the said Town, have been conducted elsewhere.

The Prussian Army is said to be reduced to a very bad Condition, and Sickness has taken off a great Number.

With respect to the Flying Corps under Lieutenant General Nassau, it is affirmed, that the Day before Yesterday it was still on the other Side the Elbe. Some Hours after, by Accounts from General Ffestetitz, we learnt, that the Prussian Army, amounting to 70,000 Men, according to the Informations given by the Deserters, was encamped in two Lines on this Side the Elbe, in the Neighbourhood of Kolin, which Town covers their Left Wing, which is opposite to the Right Wing of the Combined Army: That the Posts which had been attacked the Day before by the Hussars, were reinforced with two Battalions and 400 Horses, who were retrenching themselves there: That the Scarcity of Bread continued to increase in their Camp, none having come thither since the last Week, and the Remainder of that having been distributed four Days before in such small Quantities, that 10 Soldiers had received only a Pound and a half to divide amongst them: That Meat was not altogether so scarce, although the Soldiers had been forbidden to seek Provisions amongst the Peasants, but that all which had been sent from Prague, had been carried off by the Austrian Hussars.

Upon the 7th the Quarter Masters of the Combined Army were sent to reconnoitre the Ground in Front, which they found intersected with Ditches and Eminencies equally advantageous to both Armies. The Duke was informed by Prince Charles, that the greatest Part of the Prussian Infantry were cantoning, and that they were fortifying the Village of Gros-Gbell, where the King's Quarters were.

His Serene Highness sent two Pulcks of Tartars to reinforce the Corps under Lieutenant General Nadafti, who is posted on the Left of the Elbe, in the Road to Prague, and who had demanded of Prince Charles to be reinforced by a Detachment from General Ffestetitz's Corps, who commands the Avant Guard.

Towards the Evening a Motion was perceived amongst the Prussians, and they seemed to be marching towards Kolin.

Upon the 8th Letters from Prince Charles gave Advice, that the Prussian Corps, which had been encamped over-against Pardubitz, on the other Side the Elbe, had quitted that Post, in order to advance towards Semin. This Motion has Relation to that which they had been observed to make this Morning in their Cavalry on this Side, marching from Teinitz towards Kolin.

At the same Time Advice was received by Way of Chrudim and Alt Kolin, that some Dragoons and Prussian Hussars, and some Infantry,

fantry, had taken Possession of the Suburbs of Kolin, and that, besides that, they had placed Troops in many Villages situated on that Side, which they had abandoned afterwards in the Evening, and their Cavalry was in March towards Gros-Gbell, before which they had ranged about 2000 Horse in Order of Battle, to favour the March of the Infantry, and to intercept our View of them.

Upon these Motions of the Prussian Troops, General Fesstetitz advanced in order to attack them; and having fallen upon a Detachment of their Cavalry, he put it to Flight, and obliged it to retire towards the main Body of the Army, and to post itself behind the Infantry, which fired several Times upon General Fesstetitz, killed one of his Men, and wounded two Horses. The Loss was greater on the other Side, and we brought off eight Prisoners besides 18 Deserters.

The Duke removed his Quarters to Maleschau, in order to advance nearer to Kuttentberg, but the Auxiliary Corps remained in their old Camp.

Upon the 9th, at the Dusk of the Evening, the Prussians made some Motions, which the Decline of the Day, and the Fogs which arose prevented our discerning. It was not till Ten o'Clock of the Morning, that we knew by Advice from Lieutenant General Ghylani, that they had decamped, and were passing the Elbe upon several Bridges, which had been thrown over that River for that Purpose, after having first sent away their Baggages towards Teinitz, and left large Detachments at Gros-Gbell, Lofan, and other neighbouring Places on this Side the River. It has not been possible to discover, whether it be the whole Army of the King of Prussia, or one Column only, which is desiling. All that we know for certain in this Affair is, that his right Wing was retired behind the Left, in order the better to conceal his Retreat, and that the Call has been heard beating for his Troops on the other Side of the Elbe, and a Convoy has been observed, which it is judged came from Pardubitz to meet him, with Provisions taken out of the Magazine there.

Upon the 10th, the whole Army of the Prussians had passed the Elbe, so that they have not any Posts on this Side but at Kolin and Pardubitz, where they have large Detachments of Infantry, in order to defend those two Towns, which they have pallisadoed round, and provided with great Artillery.

According to Advices received, the Garrison of Prague, a few Days since, consisted of 4020 Men, and the Number of Sick amounted to 5679. They continued exacting the Contributions imposed upon the Nobility. At the same Time came an Account of the Scarcity in the Prussian Army, in which a Pound of Bread sells for 18 Creutzers, a Pot of Beer for 30, and Brandy two Florins.

The Duke gave Orders for the necessary Dispositions to be made for marching our auxiliary Troops the next Day towards Czeffau.

Vienna, Nov. 7. Letters of the 4th Instant from Bohemia advise, that the King of Prussia was with his main Body at Bohemische Brod, and that while General Nassau was on the other Side of the Elbe at Kolin with 10,000 Men, another Body of Prussians was at Czafmuck. But the Austrians and Saxons were advanced no farther than Widjitz, between Janowitz and Kuttentberg. By the best and latest

Accounts of the State of Affairs in Bavaria, the Palatins, who are to make 5000, are not yet arrived. M. Segur, with about 4000 French, is supposed to be marching up from Kelheim towards Passau. The Hessians, who amount to 7000, have made an unsuccessful Attack upon Wasserburg, and the Imperialists are not supposed to go beyond 9000. Count Rathen has 7000 Regulars, and about 10,000 Irregulars with him; 6000 more of the Queen's Troops are in Garrison at Ingolstadt, and about 3000 at Braunau, Sharding, and Passau, at which last Place the six Battalions from Bohemia will, it is supposed, arrive as this Day, as likewise the two Battalions from hence.

Ratisbon, Nov. 12, N. S. A Person arrived here Yesterday reports, that the Emperor, after the Austrians had abandoned Wasserbourg, passed by the Fortresses of Braunau and Scharndingen, and was on the 9th at Vilshofen, his Army extending to within an Hour's March of Passau. General Roth has caused all the Cattle within four Hour's Distance from Ingolstadt to be brought into the Fortrefs, so that he will not soon be in Want of Provisions. The Report of the Bavarians having invested that Place, is without Foundation.

Ratisbon, Nov. 16, N. S. Our last Letters from General Bathiani's Corps are of the 8th, when it was encamped at Ranshofen, between Braunau and Passau. The greater Part of the Imperial Army lies about Vilshofen, where the Emperor has his Head Quarters; the rest are still behind in the Neighbourhood of Braunau. Orders have been sent from Vilshofen to all the Inhabitants along the Danube, to send thither whatever Boats or Vessels are on the River, to form a Bridge. A Detachment of about an hundred Men, mostly consisting of Austrian Deserters, have entred Stadt-am-Hoff. The Austrians, on their Part, have raised a strong Fort near Passau, on a Hill called St. Mary's Help, and have covered the Bridge between the Town and the Castle with Combustibles, to be ready to set it on Fire on the first Occasion. Major General du Chaffat has his Quarters still at Kelheim; the Corps under his Command consists of Bavarians, Hessians, French and Palatines, who are drawing every Day nearer to Ingolstadt, and repairing the Bridges at Kelheim and Vohburg, which were ruined last Year.

Hambourg, Nov. 20. The Prussian Army in Bohemia, according to all Accouns, suffers many Kinds of Distresses, and is followed by the Allies. His Prussian Majesty will not, we hear, leave his Army so soon as he had some Time ago proposed. There is a Report, that Field Marshal Schwerin has laid down his Command.

Hague, Nov. 24, N. S. Our freshest Advices from Bohemia are of the 11th Instant, when his Prussian Majesty had passed the Elbe in the Neighbourhood of Kolin with the Bulk of his Troops without the least Disorder or Loss, and the Combined Army was drawing by the Way of Czaflaw towards Pardubitz, probably in the View of forcing that Post, where the Prussians had still a considerable Detachment and Magazine. Our Intelligence from the Frontiers of Austria are so imperfect, that it is almost impossible to ascertain where the Bulk of the Emperor's and the Queen's Army is, tho' the former is generally supposed to be between Vilshofen and Passau, and the other near Scharding behind the Inn. Some Advices even mention

tion the Imperialists having miscarried in an Attempt they are supposed to have made on Passau. Part of the French Cavalry is certainly in Motion towards the Middle Rhine, but is said to be in a miserable Condition. The Infantry is also said to be in March along the West Side of that River. By Letters from Paris of the 20th Instant we learn, that M. Villeneuve had declined the Post of Secretary of State, and that thereupon the French King had conferred it upon M. d'Argenson, Elder Brother to the Secretary of War.
