Venice, February 26, N.S.

HE 21st of this Month being appointed for the Publick Entry of the Earl of Holderness, Ambassador Extraordinary from his Majesty the King of Great Britain, his Excellency went about Noon to the Island of S. Spirito, where he was received by the Superior and Fathers of the Convent, and conducted to an Apartment furnished by the State for his Reception. Several English Genthemen, and Foreigners of Distinction, being Subjects of the Allies of the Crown of England, with the Consul and British Merchants residing in Venice, came to the Island to compliment and attend the Ambassador. Some Time after, Signor Tron, Cavalier of the Stola d'Oro, with fixty Senators, landed there. The Cavalier sent a Secretary of the Republick to acquaint the Amballador with his Arrival. His Excellency returned this Compliment by his Secretary, and then came down the Stair and met the Cavalier in the Middle of the Cloyster: After having complimented each other, the Cayalier placed himself on the Ambassador's Left Hand, and conducted him to the Gondola, in which he came to wait upon him, and gave his Excellency the Hand there. The Senators did the same to the English Gentlemen, &c. The Cavalier's Boat preceded, and was followed by the Ambafsador's three State Gondolas magnificently gilt and adorned. Being come to the Ambassador's Palace, the Cavalier and Senators, giving the Hand to the Ambassador and his Suite, waited upon him into the Audience Room, where, after being complimented and entertained with Refreshments, they took their Leave, and were reconducted to their Boats by his Excellency and the English Gentlemen, &c. giving the Hand to the Cavalier and the Senators.

On the 22d the Cavalier came, attended by the fixty Senators, and having notified his Arrival as before, the Ambassador met him upon the Middle of the Stairs, and giving him the Hand,

couducted him to the Audience Room. After Civilities, they came down to the Boats, the Cavalier giving the Hand to the Ambassador. Upon entring the College, the Doge and Members of it arose from their Seats, and after the usual Formalities, his Excellency sat down covered on the Doge's Right Hand, and presented his Credential Letters. The Ambassador made a Speech proper for the Occasion in the English Language, and a Translation of it into Italian being read by a Secretary, the Doge answered it. After this the Cavalier and Senators waited upon the Ambassador back to his Palace, and after the same Ceremonies and Civilities as the Day before, took their Leave.

His Excellency excused himself from being treated for three Days at the publick Charge, which was offered to him. The Doge and Senate sent his Excellency, during that Time, Presents of Wine and Provision.

Upon the 26th the Ambassador, attended by only the English Gentlemen, went to the College to receive the Answer of the Senate. The Ambassador was in the first State Gondola, attended by the Secretary of the Embassy and the Consul. He went alone into the College, and came out attended by a Secretary of the Republick, who dictated to his Excellency's Secretary the Answer of the Senate. After this, the Ambassador and his Suite walked through the Merceria to the Rialto, where his Gondolas waited for him, and then returned to his Palace.

The whole Ceremony was conducted with the greatest Order and Magnissicence. Nothing was wanting on the Part of the Republick, that could tend to demonstrate how sensible they were of the Honour done them by this Embassy. The Senators appointed to attend were chose out of the principal Families and chief Men of the State. At Night great Numbers of the most considerable of the Venetian Nobility of both Sexes came to pay their Compliments to the Ambassador and Ambassadress. The Ambassador supported his Character with Dignity, Mag-

Magnificence and Politeness. His Palace was finely illuminated, Concerts of Musick in several Rooms, and the Company entertained with Chocolate, Iced Waters, &c. &c. for two Days, during which Time the Palace was crouded with Masks. His Liveries and Equipages were numerous and splendid.

The Earl of Holderness's Speech to the College, at his publick Audience the 21st of February, 1744-5.

Most Serene Prince,

Most Illustrious and Excellent Lords,

Have His Majesty's express Commands to give your Serenity and Excellencies, in this publick Manner, the strongest Assurances of his Friendship, and that He will, upon all Occastrong, be ready to demonstrate the great Regard and Consideration He has for this Republick, and to do whatever may tend to the maintaining and improving a strict Harmony between Himself and this State, and a good Correspondence between the respective Subjects of both Nations.

I am persuaded, your Serenity and Excellencies will set the true Value upon the Friendship of a great King, ruling over the Hearts of a flourishing free People; a faithful Desender of his distressed Allies, a zealous Supporter of the Balance and Liberties of Europe.

The Wisdom, Conduct, and great Actions of this State, raise in me the highest Veneration and Respect towards it; and sure I am, that whenever this Republick shall think proper to exert itself, none of the great Qualities of her renowned Ancestors are wanting to equal or even out-do the greatest of her Predecessors, her Friendship will always be courted, her Displeasure will always be feared.

For my own Particular, I shall ever look upon it as the greatest Mark of my Royal Master's Goodness towards me, that he has entrusted me with this Declaration of his Sentiments, and I shall constantly make it my Study to promote the best Understanding, and to contribute all that in me lies to the Prosperity and Welfare of this powerful State.

Naples, March 9. The Clergy in this Kingdom, and especially the Orders of Fryars, are extremely uneasy at the Opinion which prevails in this City, that the King, in the present Situation of Assairs, proposes to make use of the Plate and rich Furniture of the Churches and Convents to support the great Expences which the Maintenance of his Troops abroad occasions to him at present. The King, by Advice of the Spanish and French Courts, is not to stir this Summer from Naples. M. de la Vieu Ville is charg-

ed, it is said, with the Command of the Neapolitan Troops at the opening of the Campaign. The Train of 40 large Cannon and 20 Mortars, which the King furnishes to the Spanish Army, is getting ready with great Diligence, and several Transports have already been hired for transporting it to Ancona.

Rome, March 13. The latest Advices from Spoleti bring the melancholy Accounts, that that City had been terrified for many Hours with dreadful Shocks of an Earthquake, by which many Steeples were thrown down, and the Buildings and Houses in general had received great Damage. On the 7th the Cardinals Oddi and Lanti had their first private Audience of the Pope, when they both were presented with the Cardinal's Cap; and on the 10th they received, with the usual publick Formality, the Hat.

Florence, March 16. M. de Gages has moved his Head Quarters from Viterbo to Foligno, between which Place and Perugia all his Troops are situated at present. The Artillery, consisting of 18 large Pieces of Cannon, and 23 small, are on the Road thither. The Neapolitan Troops are likewise in March to join the Spaniards, which it was supposed they would do by the 20th Instant; and that then the whole Army would move. It is still publickly said in the Spanish Camp, that they are to march directly towards Prince Lobcowitz's Army. The Spanish Troops desert very considerably, but these are so many People employed all over the Papal State to seize them, that it is with great Difficulty any escape. They publickly raise Recruits in Rome, and in the Neighbourhood. The Pope having made a second Diminution of his Troops, most of them, as the others were some Months ago, have been engaged in the Spanish Service, and no Body doubts but that this has been done by the Connivance of the Pope's Ministers. Prince Lobcowitz is assembling his Troops together, in order to have them ready at hand on any Occasions. Recruits from Germany and Lombardy daily reinforce his Army): But General Bathiani is said to be on his Journey to Italy, to succeed him in the Command, and that the Prince is to repair to his Government of Milan. Regimentals and Arms are sending from this City to the different Towns and Villages of Tuscany, to cloath and put in Order the Militia; and the necessary Provisions and Forage are sending to St. Piero a Sieve in the Mugello, for the Sublistance of the Tuscan Troops there. In Consequence of these Dispofitions, and the extraordinary Expence attending the same, on the 11th Instant an Imposition of 6 per Cent. was fixed by the Regency on the Revenues of the Tuscan Subjects. On the 25th past M. de Braitwitz returned hither from Leghorn, after he had reviewed the Fortifications, and ordered that Place to be provided with all Necessaries. This General having asked his Dis--mon

mission from the Great Duke, is preparing to leave this City, in order to take the Benefit of the Baths.

Stockholm, March 12, O.S. On Saturday Evening last died here, in a very advanced Age, Counters Gyllenborg, the Lady of Senator Count Gyllenborg, the President of the Chancery. Yesterday Count Finckenstein, the Prusfian Minister, had a private Audience of his Swedish Majesty; in which he delivered a Letter from the present Elector of Bavaria, notifying

the Death of the Emperor his Father.

Berlin, March 30, N. S. His Prussian Majesty is arrived at Neis. Mollendorsts Regiment of Dragoons has received Orders to quit Brandenbourg, and to march immediately into Silesia. They are embarking Cannon-Balls from 12 to 24 Pounders here, and it is said, that between 15 and 1600 Boats are prepared for transporting Provisions to the Army in Silefia. A few Days fince 150 Carriages laden with Sabres, Muskets and Caps, set out for the Army, but the Horses which are to draw the Cannon and Mortars are not yet arrived. The reigning Prince of Dessau is expected here this Day or To-morrow, it is faid, in his Way to Dessau, to attend the Funeral of the late Princess his Wife.

Mayence, April 1, N.S. The French have begun to raise a Bridge of Boats at Biberich, a little below this City, in the same Place where the Allied Army had theirs in 1743. The French Army has been in Motion these two Days, and Marshal de Maillebois has ordered a Camp to be traced out between Butshbach and Arnspurg, about four Leagues on this Side Wetzlar'; where General Sommerfeld is posted with Part of the Hanoverian Troops, which are extended from thence along the Banks of the Lahne to Wilmar. The Dutch under General Smissaert are cantoned from thence to Dietz, and the Austrians from thence towards the Mouth of that River, which discharges itself into the Rhine near Coblentz. The Duke of Aremberg's Head Quarters are at Hadamar, but will remain in that Position. The French are stand absolutely excluded. in Possession of Konigstein, and the Elector's Garrison is already returned into this Town.

Hague, April 6. By Advice from the Confederate Army, the Duke of Aremberg had order'd the Right and Left Wings of his Cantonment upon the Lahne, to approach nearer the Center; against which it was apprehended that M. Maillebois was forming some Defign.
