Petersbourg, April 20.

ON Tuesday last in the Evening, M. Dedieu, the Dutch Ambassador, arrived here, and this Morning he had his Audience of her Imperial Majesty, and met with a most gracious Reception.

Mentz, May 12, N. S. The French have finished their Bridge Heads at Biberich, which, instead of being such Works as are commonly thrown up to defend the Accesses to a Bridge, are in Reality large and regular Forts, projected and finished with great Skill, and strongly palisadoed: That on the North Side of the River has an Area; in which 2000 Men may be regularly drawn up under Arms, and that on the South Side is capable of receiving 1500 Men very commodiously. From these Forts their Bridges are carried into the Isle of Ingelheim, where they have actually 32 Pieces of Cannon, with which they have raised Batteries which flank their Forts in such a Manner, as would make it a Work of Difficulty to approach them. A great Number of Waggon (not less than 600) are arrived at Biberich from the Neighbourhood of Worms and the Upper Rhine, loaded with Cannon Ball and Ammunition; and there is Advice, that the French are forming Magazines at Homburk and Deux Ponts, which with that at Simmeren, may either be employ'd to subsist a Body of Troops, which should march from the Frontiers of France to the Rhine, or be intended for the Use of the Prince of Conti's Army, if he should be obliged to repass the Rhine and retire to the Moselle. We hear that his Electoral Highness of Bavaria has wrote to the Queen of Hungary, assuring her Majesty that he will religiously observe the Terms of the Treaty lately concluded at Fussen. The Duke of Aremberg remains at Valendar.

Mentz, May 15, N. S. The French who had made an Attempt to raise a Fort in St. Peter's Island, in a Manner under the Windows of the Elector's Palace, and had desisted from it upon the Representations made by the Elector against such an Insult, are now returned into the said Island, and have placed a Guard of fifty Men at the Western End of it near Ingelheim Island, under Pretence of covering their Works. They have opened all the Mails for this Week past, and the Prince of Conti suffers no Boat to descend the Rhine. Count Sinsheim is gone from hence to Munich, and will probably be sent from thence to Vienna.

Berlin, May 15, N. S. The Austrians lost 200 Hussars in a late Rencontre near Schweid-

nitz, but they have lately taken a very considerable Magazine at Hirschberg, and have sent the Provisions to Schatzlitz in Bohemia. His Prussian Majesty was upon the 8th at Kamentz. The Army will extend from this last Place to Schweidnitz. Upper Silesia is entirely evacuated. M. de Valori set out upon the 12th for Breslau. People begin to talk again of the Camp at Magdebourg; and it is given out, that two Regiments of the Garrison of Wesel have received Orders to march thither; that several thousand Quintals of Powder, and great Quantities of warlike Stores, are embarked in order to be sent to that Place; and that 10 or 12 Officers belonging to the Artillery, are arrived here from Silesia in their Way thither. The reigning Queen set out the Day before Yesterday for Schonhausen for the Summer Season.
