

Siege of Tournay, all Accounts seem to agree in general, that the Garrison continues to make a gallant Defence, and that the Ground the Besiegers have hitherto gained, has cost them dear. The freshest Advices from the Allied Army on the Rhine, report it to be at present encamped in an advantageous Position near Neuwied, where it is supposed it will wait the Arrival of Marshal Traun. The Duke of Aremberg has solicited and obtained his Demission of that Command, and will be succeeded therein by Count Bathiani.

Whitehall, May 18.

On Tuesday last in the Afternoon, a Messenger arrived here, with an Account, that his Majesty landed at Helvoetsluys, in perfect Health, on Sunday in the Forenoon, and soon after proceeded on his Journey to Hanover.
