*Stockholm, May 7, O. S.*

**L**AST Friday being the Prince Successor's Birth-day, when he entred into the 36th Year of his Age, there was a numerous Court in the Morning to compliment his Royal Highness on that Occasion: At Noon the Prince and Princess Royal, and several Senators and their Ladies, were entertained at Dinner by his Swedish Majesty; and in the Evening his Swedish Majesty gave another grand Entertainment, to which several Senators, their Ladies, and the Foreign Ministers, who dined the same Day with Senator Count Tessin, Great Master of his Royal Highness's Household, had the Honour to be invited. After which, his Majesty opened the Ball with the Princess Royal, which lasted till Two in the Morning.

*Hambourg, May 19, N. S.* The Mortality among the horned Cattle has now reached within a German Mile and half of the Bailliage of Pinnenberg, contiguous to the Territory of Hambourg, which is of little Extent on the Side of Danish Holstein. The Appearance of this same Distemper at Harburgh gives an Alarm, lest it should gain further on that Side of the Country. Proper Precautions are used to prevent its spreading, and to get the better of it in its Beginning, which is attributed to some infected Cattle having passed through there. This Evil has communicated itself likewise to the Danish Islands of Zealand and Fuhnen.

*Leipsig, May 22, N. S.* His Highness the Duke of Saxe-Weissenfels sat out on the 20th from this Place, to take upon him the Command of the Saxon Auxiliary Army in Bohemia.

*Vienna, May 19, N. S.* We hear from Silesia, that the King of Prussia is transporting his Magazines from Schweidnitz, dismantling the old Walls thereof, and retiring with his Army to Lignitz, which is but seven Miles from Glogaw. If this be true, Breslaw, Brieg, and Neiss are left open. There is great Talk here of the Grand Duke's commanding the Army in the Empire, which will exceed 50000 Men. We hear from Italy, that the Spaniards are pent up between the Sea and the Mountains, and that they have lost at least 4000 Men in their Marches. General Bathiani is supposed to be set out for the combined Army upon the Rhine, with the Title of Marshal.

*Mentz, May 23, N. S.* The Prince of Conti has Orders to detach 18000 Men to the Netherlands. The French actually began to repass the Rhine Yesterday upon their Bridge at Biberich. We saw Part of their Cavalry file off from the Windows of the Elector's Palace. The Passage continues to Day with great Diligence, and 'tis said that by To-morrow Night the whole Number will be on this Side of the River. Whether their real Intention is to march to the Low Countries, or make an Attempt up-

on this Town, we cannot positively say; but lest it should be the latter, the Elector has ordered 2000 Men to encamp upon the Glacis, to prevent a Surprize. Letters from Worms inform us, that 12 Barges, which were arrived there from the Upper Rhine with Forage, in their Way to this Neighbourhood, have been countermanded, and are to remount the River as far as Spire, which looks as if the Design of the French was in Reality to march to the Netherlands. Marshal Traun has begun his March towards Francfort with upwards of 40000 Men.

*Mentz, May 26, N. S.* The French continued to pass the Rhine all Day on the 23d, 24th, and Yesterday Morning, after having drawn off the Cannon which they had in the Island of Ingelheim. They began to take up the Pallisadoes which defended the two Heads of their Bridge, and they have since demanded a Passage for their Bridge, which they are now employed in breaking up. Part of their Troops and Baggage are marched with great Diligence up the Rhine for Oppenheim, from whence it is thought they will proceed to Spire, where they are forming very large Magazines. Another Part of their Troops has filed off to the Right towards the Hunsruck, and we have Advice that the Corps lately commanded by M. de Chatelet upon the Moselle, amounting to 6 or 7000 Men, will begin its March To-morrow towards the Netherlands, and that they will be followed incessantly by those Troops which are marched from this Neighbourhood towards the Hunsruck. The Prince of Conti passed through this Town on the 24th to Oppenheim, and was followed Yesterday by M. de Chatelet. The French have abandoned Aschaffenburg, and some other Posts in the Neighbourhood of Francfort, but they have reinforced Konigstein and Hoecht, and give out, that they will still retain a Corps of 30 Battalions and 35 Squadrons in this Neighbourhood; but we believe, on the contrary, that as Marshal Traun advances, all their Posts on the North Side of the Rhine will be withdrawn. The Elector's Ministers to the Diet will set out from hence on the 29th or 30th for Francfort.

*Berlin, May 25.* A large Quantity of Gunpowder, and other Ammunitions of War, which were embarked in order to be transported to Magdebourg, and were by his Prussian Majesty's Orders disembarked, are now again embarked for the same Purpose, and the greatest Part of the Officers are gone thither already. Advices from Silesia give an Account, that the Army, at the Head of which the King will put himself in Person, consists of 60 Battalions and 120 Squadrons, who were to begin to encamp the 25th of this Month; and that Count Truchses, who commanded on the Frontiers of Bohemia, had received Orders to repair to his Majesty at Kamentz, and was relieved by General du Moulin.

The Regiments of Foot of Margrave Charles, Margrave Henry, M. de Munchow, his Royal Highness the Prince of Prussia, General Kleist, and of Prince Ferdinand of Wolfenbuttel, are to leave the Field in order to go into Garrison. All the Boats are still detained, and there are above 200 here loaded with Corn, that are to be transported to Silesia along the Oder.

*Journal of the Proceedings of the Allied Army in Flanders, from the 13th to the 21st of May.*

**T**HE 12th and 13th were employed in examining into the State of the Regiments, in establishing the Hospitals, and in dispatching Trumpets to the French Camp, to enquire after the State of the Wounded, and to complain of the Treatment they received contrary to the Rules of War.

The 14th a Detachment of 600 Foot, 100 Horse, and 100 Hussars, all of the Right Wing, commanded by Brigadier Skelton, was sent to post themselves at Leuse, to prevent the French Pandours and the Grassins from infesting the Edges of the Camp.

The 15th the Quarter-Masters were sent out to mark a Camp, with Lessines on the Right and Rebay on the Left, a small League from Aeth.

The 16th we march'd and took Possession of the new Camp, and a new Corps de Reserve was formed under the Command of Lieutenant General Molk, consisting of the Highland Battalion, a Squadron of the King's Dragoons, one of Stairs, and two Austrian Squadrons, two of Hop's Horse, and two of Marfau's Dragoons, Dutch.

The 17th Skelton's Command returned to the Camp late at Night. The Marshal came to his Quarters at Lessines, not having been able to march with the Army because of his Gout.

The 18th Lord Harry Beauclerk's Battalion relieved Fleming's at Oudenarde, who came to Camp.

The 19th Colonel Ligonier march'd with the Battalions of Duroure, Welch Fusileers, and the Scotch Fusileers, to relieve the King's Regiment in Ghesit, that late Ponsonby's in Bruges, and Colonel Ligonier's at Ostend.

The 20th two Detachments of the Right Wing, each composed of 300 Foot, 100 Horse, and 30 Hussars, one commanded by Lieutenant Colonel Powell, the other by Lieutenant Colonel Lord Robert Manners, march'd from the Camp, the former to be posted at Everbeck, the other at Scoris, to secure the Convoys from Oudenarde.

The 21st the King's Regiment march'd into the Camp from Ghent. A very advantageous Piece of Ground was pitched upon in the Front of the Camp for forming the Army in Battle, in case the Enemy should think fit to attack us.

*Hague, May 25, N. S.* The Criminal Prosecutions of certain Dutch Officers, on Account of their Behaviour in the late Action near Tournay, are commenced, and the Sentences are to be without Appeal.

*Hague, May 29, N. S.* Two Days since arrived here an Express, with the News that the Governor of Tournay had, upon the 22d Instant, delivered up one of the Gates of that City to the French, and retired with his whole Garrison into the Citadel.

*Hague, June 1, N. S.* His Highness the Prince of Orange has been at Leyden, to com-

pliment Professor Albinus, and returned Yesterday in perfect Health to Lieuwarden, where the Provincial Dyet is about to assemble. Lord Harrington arrived here in the Night between Saturday and Sunday last, and set forwards on his Way to Hanover Yesterday at Three o'Clock in the Afternoon. With the Packet Boat of last Friday are arrived Messieurs Wasner, Carvalho, Flemming, and Hop, Ministers of Hungary, Portugal, Poland, and this Republick, who are all to follow his Majesty to Hanover immediately.

On Wednesday the 15th Instant, Captain Beavor, in his Majesty's Ship the Fox, about four Leagues off Flamborough Head, seeing a Sail in the Offing gave Chace to her: She proved to be a French Privateer, which, upon seeing the Fox, tack'd and stood off: Between Nine and Ten the next Morning, the Fox came within Musket-Shot of her, and the Privateer, in springing her Luff, in order to give the Fox her Broadside, carried away all her Top-Masts, on which she immediately struck: She came out of Dunkirk five Days before, but had taken nothing; she mounts 14 Guns 9 Pounds, and 16 Swivels 2 Pounds, and has 145 Men; she is called le Bon Ame Louis.

*Whereas by an Act passed in the last Session of Parliament, intituled, (amongst other Things) An Act for giving farther Time for the Payment of the Duties omitted to be paid for the Indentures or Contracts of Clerks and Apprentices, and for the further enforcing the Payment of the said Duties, it is Enacted, That*

on Payment of the said Duties (which have been so omitted to be paid) on or before the first Day of August next, and upon tending to be stamp such Indentures and Contracts at the same Time, or at any Time before the 29th of September next, that the said Indentures and Contracts shall be good, and the Clerks, Apprentices or Servants shall be capable of exercising their Trades or Employments as fully as if the said Duties had been paid within the Times limited by two several Acts of Parliament of the 8th and 9th Years of Queen Anne.

And for the better enforcing the Payment of the said Duties, it is Enacted, That after the 24th of June next, if any Master or Mistress shall neglect to pay the said Duties within the Times limited by the said Acts, they shall for every such Neglect forfeit and pay double the Duties charged and directed to be paid by the said former Acts (over and above all Penalties and Forfeitures thereby inflicted) for all Moneys which shall after the said 24th of June be given, paid, contracted, or agreed for, with or in Relation to every such Clerk, &c. to be paid by the said Masters and Mistresses; and if they shall neglect to pay the said Duties charged by the said former Acts, within the Times therein limited, and any such Clerk, Apprentice or Servant shall in that Case pay the said Duties and the Penalties incurred by this Act, within one Year after the same shall become charged and made payable thereby, (such Master or Mistress not having then paid the same, although required so to do) that then it should be lawful for the Clerk, Apprentice or Servant, within three Months after such Payment, to demand of the Master or Mistress, their Executors or Administrators, the Money paid to them in respect of such Clerkship, Apprenticship or Servitude: And in case the Money shall not be paid, within three Months after such Demand made, it shall be lawful for the Clerk, Apprentice or Servant to sue for the same against the Master or Mistress, their Executors or Administrators; and after Payment of the said Duties, Penalties and Forfeitures, the Clerk, Apprentice or Servant shall be discharged from their Clerkship, Apprenticship and Service, and from all Actions and Damages for not serving their Time, and shall have the Advantage of the Time they shall have served such Master or Mistress, as they might have done in case of any Assignment or turning over to any new Master or Mistress.

The Commissioners for managing his Majesty's Stamp Duties give this publick Notice, that no Person may incur the Penalties mentioned in the said Clause.
