We are filled with just Indignation at the Thoughts of so black and so ungrateful a Conduct, and beg Leave to assure your Majesty of our now most unfeigned Loyalty, and of the Loyalty of the People under our Charge, which we shall endeavour to the utmost of our Power to increase.

We hope we shall never forget the late happy Revolution, brought about by King William, of glorious Memory, under the Conduct of Divine Providence, or forbear to contemplate it as the Fountain of all the sacred and valuable Privileges which these Nations enjoyed under your Royal Father; and which we, in a particular Manner enjoy under your Majesty's auspicious Reign; the Consideration of which shall ever cement our Hearts, by an unshaken Loyalty to your Majesty's Person and Government, and to the Protestant Succession, as established by Law in your illustrious House.

That the King of Kings may take your Majesty and Royal Family under his peculiar Protection; that he may crown your Arms, both at home and abroad, with such Success as may effectually extinguish the present unnatural Rebellion, entirely crush the unjust and ambitious Designs of all your Enemies, and establish the Peace of Europe on a solid and lasting Foundation: That he may long preserve your Majesty, the Support, under God, of our Civil and Religious Liberties, and at last crown you with undying Happiness in a future Life, is the sincere Prayer of,

Whereas this Kingdom is greatly endangered by a Rebellion now actually raised in Scotland, in Favour of a popish Pretender, against our most gracious and lawful Sovereign King George, and further threatned with a powerful Invasion from abroad, by the Forces of France and Spain, the Consequence of which, should it succeed, will be the Subversion of our Religion, Laws and Liberties:

Therefore, We the Mayor, Aldermen, Common-Council-Men, Clergy, Gentlemen, Merchants, Tradesmen, and other the Inhabitants of Great Yarmouth, in the County of Norfolk, whose Names are hereto subscribed, sensible of our common Danger, and endued with a just Sense of Gratitude for the Blessings we have enjoyed during the Reign of his said present Majesty, do declare our Detestation and Abhorrence of the present most wicked and unnatural Rebellion: And we do hereby unite and associate ourselves, and promise each to the other, that we will, to the utmost of our Power and Ability, assist each other in supporting his Majesty King George on the Throne of this Kingdom, and in the maintaining and defending the Succession of the Crown in the Protestant Line, according to the Acts of Settlement, and according to our Duty and true and real Interest.

Witness our Hands this Sixteenth Day of October, in the Year of our Lord Christ One thousand seven hundred and forty-five, and in the Nineteenth Year of the Reign of our Sovereign Lord George the Second, by the Grace of God, of Great Britain, France and Ireland, King, Defender of the Faith, and so forth.
