To the King's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Governours, Justices of the Peace, High-Sheriff, Clergymen and Freeholders of the County of Galway, in the Kingdom of Ireland.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Protestants of this County, humbly beg Leave, with the most joyful Hearts, to congratulate your Majesty on your safe and happy Return to your British Dominions.

Words are wanting to express our equal Astonishment and Abhorrence of the most unnatural Rebellion, now raised and carried on in North-Britain, against your Majesty's sacred Person and Government, in Favour of an abjured Pretender, educated in the Maxims of Tyranny and arbitrary Government, and one who has constantly imbibed from the Bosom of the Popes of Rome, the absurd, superstitious, and bigotted Principles of Popery. From so traiterous and wicked an Attempt, supported by such foreign Power, and under such Influence (which can never act in Contradiction to itself) what Evils have we not to dread? Fatal Experience, yet fresh in the Memory of many of your Protestant and loyal Subjects in this Kingdom, and the Self-evident

Principles of Reason and Self-Preservation, demonstrate to us, that our Religion, Laws, Liberty and Property (those inestimable Blessings of human Life) can only, under God, subsist and be secured to us, by the gracious Protection and Government of your Majesty and your Royal Family: And we beseech you to accept of our most sincere Fidelity, and inviolable Attachment (already so often confirm'd by Oaths) to your Majesty's Person and Government; which we are most firmly determined to support (as far as is in our Power) with our Lives and Fortunes, against this and all other Pretenders whatsoever: It being much more eligible to have no Being at all, than to bear it with the Loss of the most valuable Blessings, and of all that is dear to us; which we have long enjoy'd, and most earnestly pray to the Almighty, may be for ever continued to us, and our latest Posterity, under your Majesty and your Royal and most Illustrious House.

WE the Magistrates, Town-Council, and Burgesses of the Borough of Selkirk, beg

Leave to assure your Majesty of our inviolable Attachment and unfeigned Affection to your Majesty's Person and Government, and of our utter Abhorrence and Detestation of the unnatural Rebellion now raging in the Kingdom.

Deeply sensible of the many Blessings we enjoy under our present free and happy Constitution, which can only be secured to us by the Preservation of the Protestant Succession in your Royal House, we desire to declare to your Majesty, that we are ready and willing to employ our Fortunes, and hazard our Lives, in Opposition to this traitorous Attempt upon our Religion and Liberty; which, if successful, will unavoidably render our Fortunes precarious, and our Lives insupportable.

Hague, Jan. 28, N. S. The States General are settling a new Promotion of General Officers, nominating their Staff for the ensuing Campaign, and pressing the several Confederates to furnish their respective Quotas to all the Petitions, as they are called here, or Estimates necessary to defray the present Exigencies of the Republick. The Council of State is making new Contracts for the Field Artillery Horses, Ammunition Waggons, &c.

Edinburgh, Jan. 20. Yesterday a Court Martial was ordered for the Tryal of some Officers and Men who behaved ill in the late Action, of which Brigadier General Mordaunt is President, and the Proceedings began this Morning. The Pretender's Son march'd back to Stirling Saturday Afternoon. That Morning the Rebels summon'd the Castle there to surrender, and again in the Afternoon, but General Blakeney's Answer was, That he had always been looked upon as a Man of Honour, and that the Rebels should find he would die so. The Army is preparing to move from hence again, the Cannon and Stores being on the Road from Berwick and Newcastle. As yet we have heard but of 30 of our Men who were made Prisoners by the Rebels, and carried to Stirling, one half of which belong'd to the Glasgow Regiment; and we have also an Account of three Officers wounded. The others, who are missing, it is to be feared are killed, particularly Sir Robert Munro, Lieutenant Colonels Whitney, Powell, and Biggar, though as yet we have no absolute Certainty, and cannot form a List. One hundred and seventy Men, supposed to have been lost, got on Board a Vessel at Barronstounness, and came in here this Day, and more are continually coming in. The Loss of the Rebels is, by all Accounts, considerable; but the Number of their Killed and Wounded are not known. The Country People about Falkirk report, that six People of Note of their Army have been buried in that Neighbourhood, and that many of their Officers attended at those Funerals. Sullivan is said to be one of their Slain.
