Stockholm, January 17, O. S.

YESTERDAY the Ceremony of Baptizing the new born Prince was perform'd at the Castle by the Archbishop of Upsal. His Godfathers were the King of Sweden and the King of Prussia, and his Godmothers the Empress of Russia, the Queen Mother of Prussia, and the Princess of Holstein, Mother to the Prince Successor. Gustavus is the Name given to this young Prince. The King, Prince Successor, Senate, Heads of Colleges, all the great Officers of the Crown, and the Foreign Ministers, were present: In the Evening there was a great Entertainment at Court, and in Town most of the Houses were illuminated. Our Letters from Gottenburg are still silent as to the Time of the Departure of the Swedish Officers there; and the Report is general that they are all to come back again. These Gentlemen on their Arrival at Gottenburg, found the Inhabitants of that Place so incens'd against them, on Account of the Errand they were going upon, that for Fear of any Insult they keep in a Body as much as possible, and never stir out but in large Parties.

Berlin, Jan. 22. The Articles of both Treaties of Peace, Reconciliation and Friendship, lately concluded at Dresden, were published and communicated to all the Foreign Ministers on the 19th Instant. On the 18th the Duke of Weissenfels's Aid de Camp, Lieut. Colonel Vizthum, and a Captain of the Regiment of Gotha, M. Benningfen, arrived here from Dresden, whither they returned on the 20th; and the same Day 979 Saxon Prisoners were escorted to Bareuth in order to be released according to the 4th Article of the afore-mentioned Treaty. They consist chiefly of those who were taken at the Action at Hennerstorff and the Surrender of Gorlitz, and there are still near 4000 Prisoners in Town here.

Berlin, Feb. 1, N. S. The King of Prussia came to Town Yesterday at half an Hour after Eleven in the Morning, and will return to Potsdam on the 15th Instant. He proposes to set out for Pyrmont in the Month of May. Baron Bulow, the Saxon Minister, who arrived here on the 28th past, was presented immediately after the King's Arrival to his first Audience. He deliver'd his new Credential Letters, and met with a very gracious Reception. On the 28th past General Polentz, to whom the Regiment of the late General Truchses was given, died at Meissen of the Wounds he received at the Battle near Dresden.

Berlin, Feb. 8, N. S. His Prussian Majesty continues here in good Health. M. Klinggraff

set out on Sunday last for Dresden, where he is to reside for the Future. After the King of Prussia's Departure for Potsdam, which is fixed for the 15th Instant, the Winter Diversions are to end.

Copenhagen, Feb. 5, N. S. The King of Denmark, who has rested very little for several Nights of late, was more out of Order Yesterday, than he has been at any Time yet; and for that Reason the Council was omitted: But last Night his Majesty slept pretty well, and finds himself To-Day much better.

Willemstadt, Feb. 8, N. S. Upon the 3d Instant the Hessian Hussars were embarked. On the 4th, the Regiment of Grenadiers, 5th, Prince Maximilian's Regiment, } and their
6th, Lieutenat General Mansbach's, } Horses.
7th, six Companies of the Guards.

In the Night of the 6th it blew so hard, and the Tide was so high, that the Platform on the Head was washed away, and all Yesterday Morning was spent in Repairing it. It being so late before we began to embark again, only six Companies could be got on board with the Horses of General Wolfe's Regiment, and twenty-five belonging to the Artillery. If the Weather had continued moderate, this Day would have completed the Regiment of Guards, and we should have embarked Donop's Regiment; but in the Night the Wind sprung up at East, and blew excessively hard with heavy Snow, which continues, so that all stands still. If a Frost should succeed, the Snow will occasion so much Ice, that it will greatly disconcert the Embarkation, and the Troops already embarked, be obliged to put to Sea. The Men of War, Yachts and Transports were seen off the Mender a few Days ago, and all except the Yachts were obliged to go off the Coast again. They are now got in near Brewer's Haven, to the Westward of Goree.

Willemstadt, Feb. 10. Captain Barker, on board his Britannick Majesty's Ship the Gibraltar Man of War, and two others, arrived at Helvoet Yesterday, with 23 Transports from England. Prince Frederick of Hesse, and the Earl of Craufurd, are arrived here from Antwerp, in order to embark with the Hessian Troops, which are commanded by his Highness.

Willemstadt, Feb. 15. The Fleet sail'd Yesterday Afternoon about Three o'Clock, and it is hoped will be near their destin'd Port by Tomorrow Night or Thursday Morning. The remaining Transports are all gone from before this Town to save themselves from the Ice, so that the Embarkation of the British Cavalry is retarded.

Frankfort, Feb. 10. Baron Ramswach, the Emperor's Minister Plenipotentiary to the Congress of the Anterior Circles assembled here, set out

out on the 8th Instant for Ulm, to be present at the Diet of the States of Swabia, to whom he is accredited; and he will be followed in a Day or two by Mr. Burriſh, his Britannick Majesty's Minister to ſeveral Princes and Circles of the Empire, who returned hither Yeſterday from Bonn, the Reſidence of the Elector of Cologne. Baron Hagen ſupplies the Abſence of M. de Ramſwach, as Miniſter Plenipotentiary from their Imperial Majesties to this Congreſs.

Hambourgh, Feb. 11, N. S. The new Imperial Miniſter Count Raab, who is accredited in that Quality to the Circle of Lower Saxony, came to Town Yeſterday, and was complimented this Morning on the Part of the Magiſtrates.

Antwerp, Feb. 10. The French continue round about Bruſſels, and block it up very cloſely, but the bad Weather has prevented their doing any Thing againſt the Town. They have made no Batteries as yet, but ſuch as ſeem to be to guard their Cantonments, having erected only Three, of four ſmall Field Pieces each; one is on the Cauſeway to Antwerp, another on the Cours, and the third juſt by it. They are making Roads with Trees and Faſcines, but the Ground is ſo very marſhy, that they have been obliged to ſtop, and ſome of their Battering Cannon is at preſent ſtuck in the Ground, and they cannot move them. The Dutch Officer, who commanded the 250 Men in the Caſtle of Vilvoerden, ſurrendered it the 7th for Want of Proviſions, and he and his Garriſon are made Priſoners of War.

Antwerp, Feb. 14. We have Advices here, that Fitzjames's Regiment of Irish Cavalry, with their Horſe Furniture, and two Regiments of Irish Foot, were embarked at Oſtend in ſix large Transports for Scotland.

Antwerp, Feb. 14. A Perſon is juſt now arrived from Bruſſels, who brings Word, that the Garriſon continues to make the moſt gallant Defence, and had made a ſucceſſful Sally; that the French had been firing upon the Town ſince Saturday, and had attacked the cover'd Way Sword in Hand on the Side of Scharbeck, but had been repulſed with the Loſs of 180 Men. The Prince of Waldeck has juſt given Orders to the Garriſon of this Place, which conſiſts of Six Hanover and Four Dutch Battalions, and Seven Squadrons, to hold themſelves in Readineſs to march at a Moment's Warning, and that every Soldier be provided with 30 Charges.

Hague, Feb. 15, N. S. By an intercepted Letter from a French Engineer, employed before Bruſſels, to the commanding Officer of that Nation at Louvain, dated the 12th inſtant, it appears, that the Trenches were opened on the 9th inſtant. That on the 12th there were but Six Mortars, and Four pieces of Cannon in Battery. That the Garriſon kept an inceſſant Fire, having killed in that Space 180 Men of the Enemy; and had made ſeveral ſmall Sallies, which had retarded their Approaches. The ſaid Engineer adds, that from the Countenance and Behaviour of the Garriſon, and the bad Management of his own People, Bruſſels was like to give them much more Trouble than they had imagined; and he did not expect to carry the Place under

Ten Days more. Letters from Mechlin of Yeſterday ſay, that the French had then got up a ſecond Battery of 14 Pieces, and that they had formed but one Attack between the Gate of Louvain and Scharbeck. As ſoon as the Auſtrians, who are ſaid to have paſt the Maeſe on the 10th inſtant, join Prince Waldeck, he hopes to be in a Condition to give the Beſiegers ſome Diſturbance.

Helwoetſluys, Feb. 14. The Embarkation of the Heſſian Infantry and Huſſars was finiſhed Yeſterday Morning, and the Transports are now all here ready to ſail with the firſt Opportunity, which it is hoped will be this Evening. His Highneſs the Prince of Heſſe is in good Health on board the Gibraltar Man of War.

Helwoetſluys, Feb. 15. This Morning at Six the Men of War, with the Transports having on board the Heſſian Troops, ſail'd from hence with a fair Wind for Scotland.
