WE your Majesty's said most dutiful and loyal Subjects, being truly sensible of the late Danger which threatened our Constitution, and that our Religion and Liberty, with whatever else is dear and valuable to a Protestant Country, are, under Divine Providence, best preserved and secured to us by the Continuance of the Crown in your Majesty's most illustrious House, beg Leave to join with the rest of our Fellow-Subjects, in the most unfeigned Congratulations for the compleat Victory obtained over the Rebels by the Valour and Conduct of your Royal Son.

As our Apprehensions about the Issue of the detestable Rebellion were dark and gloomy, so at the News of its Defeat, our Hearts overflow with the sincerest Joy: And every Briton must stand convinced of your Majesty's perternal Care and Concern for your Subjects, from this among

other Instances, that you was pleased to make Choice of the Duke for that Service, who by exposing his Royal Person to the most manifest Hazards, from the Fury of a merciless and bloody Rabble, and by putting our Enemies to utter Rout and Confusion, has frustrated the Schemes of Popery and Ambition, rescued our Constitution from impending Ruin, approv'd himself the true Offspring of so heroick a Father, and thereby for ever endeared himself to the People of these Nations.
