To the King's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Justices of the Peace and Grand Jury, assembled at a General Quarter Sessions held the 17th Day of July 1746. for the County of Kent, at Maidstone in the said County.

*May it please your Majesty,*

It is with the greatest Pleasure and Sincerity we congratulate your Majesty on the Success of your Arms under his Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland, by which so happy an End is put to the detestable Rebellion rais'd in your British Dominions, in Favour of Popish Superstition and French Politicks.

We cannot sufficiently adore the Goodness of God in preserving us from the impending Danger, acknowledge your Majesty's Wisdom in appointing his Royal Highness to command your Forces, and admire the Valour and Intrepidity with which they followed his glorious Example in that decisive Action, which secured to us the Continuance of our Religion, Laws and Liberties, under your Majesty's just and mild Administration.

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The following Address of the Governor and Upper House of the Assembly of the Province of Maryland, has been presented to his Majesty by the Right Honourable the Lord Baltimore, being introduced by the Right Honourable the Earl Cowper, one of the Lords of his Majesty's Bed-chamber in Waiting: Which Address his Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Governor and the Upper House of Assembly of your Majesty's Province of Maryland.

**WE** your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Governor and the Upper House of Assembly of your Majesty's Province of Maryland, in Assembly convened, being truly sensible of those many Blessings we enjoy, in the Security of all that is dear to us, under the Protection of your Majesty, cannot but be justly alarmed with that unnatural Insurrection in Favour of a Popish Pretender to your Majesty's Crown.

Rebellion and Civil War are so horrible in themselves, that every Well-wisher to his Country must detest the Authors and Supporters; but when they are set on Foot, and carried on in a Protestant Nation, govern'd by a King acting in a strict Conformity with the Laws made for the Preservation of its Liberties, in order to fill the Throne with a Person educated in the Bigotry and Superstition of the Romish Church, and thoroughly instructed in the slavish Maxims and Arts of the Courts of France and Spain, every Man must be amazed at the Madness, and every Protestant Subject fired with the strongest Resentment at the Baseness and Ingratitude of such Attempts, since a just and good King has an undoubted Right to the Returns of a most grateful Loyalty, Duty, and Affection, and that it is impossible our Religion should be maintain'd by the Councils of Jesuits, or our Liberties secured by the Friendship and arbitrary Politicks of France or Spain.

These, Most Gracious Sovereign, are our sincere Principles, and although our Distance may prevent the Effects of our Loyalty and Affection, in the immediate Defence of your Majesty's sacred Person; yet we are resolved (agreeable to our Association for that Purpose) not to be backward in any Instance, where we may be called upon, or expected to demonstrate to, the Hazard of our Lives and Fortunes, what we owe to ourselves, our Country, and the best of Kings, in the Maintenance and Support of your Majesty's Authority, and consequently of our own Religion and Liberties.

*Naples, July 5.* The King has consented to the Representations of the Deputation of the Health, for dismissing the Troops which formed the Lines in Calabria, since, for these fifteen Months past, no Signs of epidemical Sickness has been discover'd in these Parts.

*Florence, July 12.* We hear from Lombardy, that a Body of 5000 Men, commanded by M. Mirepoix, who were to attempt to surprize Pavia, had been repulsed three Times by the Sardinian Troops, with the Loss of about 2500 Men; and were obliged to leave most of their Ladders, and many Boats for the Use of a Bridge, which they had brought in Waggons. The French and Spanish Army have since posted themselves at Codogno, extending with a large Detachment to Lodi, in order to receive from that Part of the Country, such Supply of Necessaries as they are able to get. They have fortified themselves both at Codogno and Lodi, and keep their Bridge of Communication over the Po, to succour the Garrison of Placentia. The Infant and the Duke of Modena are at Lodi. Their Army suffers extremely for Want of Necessaries, and the Desertion amongst their Troops is considerable. The Austrians by their Batteries have greatly damaged the Buildings of Placentia, and killed many of the Inhabitants, who are put to the utmost Distress for Want of Subsistence; and it is reported that there are in that City upwards of 10,000 sick.

Whereas the Post Boy, bringing the Chester Mail from Fenny Stratford to Dunstable, was Yesterday, the 1st Instant, about Eleven of the Clock at Night, attacked on the Highway, near a Place called Hockliffe, otherwise Hockley, in the County of Bedford, by a single Highwayman, who carried off the following Bags, viz. Warrington, Ormskirk, Wigan, Chester, Wrexham, Coventry, Litchfield, Tamworth, Burton, Uttoxeter, Stafford, Stone, Holmes Chappel, Macclesfield, Stockport, Drayton, Rutbin, Northop, Conway, Shrewsbury, and Oswestry. The Person who committed this Robbery, is a middle-fix'd Man, and had on a light brown colour'd loose Horseman's Coat, his Face cover'd with the Cape of his Coat, and rode on a dark bay Mare, with a bald Face, and white Legs behind, and made off towards Woburne.

This therefore is to give Notice, that whoever shall apprehend and convict, or cause to be apprehended and convicted, the Person who committed this Robbery, will be intitled to a Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, over and above the Reward given by Act of Parliament for apprehending of Highwaymen: Or if any Person or Person, whether Accomplice in the said Robbery, or knowing thereof, shall make Discovery, whereby the Person who committed the same, may be apprehended and brought to Justice, such Discoverer or Discoverers will, upon Conviction of the Party, be intitled to the same Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, and also have his Majesty's most gracious Pardon.
