THE following Address of the High Sheriff, Grand Jury, Justices of Peace, Clergy, Gentlemen and Freeholders of the County Palatine of Lancaster, having been transmitted by the Right Hon. the Lord Viscount Strange, Member of Parliament for the said County, to his Grace the Duke of Newcastle, one of his Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, has by him been presented to his Majesty: Which Address his Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the High Sheriff, Grand Jury, Justices of Peace, Clergy, Gentlemen and Freeholders of the County Palatine of Lancaster, assembled at the Assizes held at Lancaster for the said County, on the 30th Day of July 1746.

WE your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, beg your Majesty most graciously to accept our sincere Congratulations on the signal Victory gained by your Majesty's Arms over the desperate Crew of Rebels, headed by the Son of a popish and abjured Pretender.

We were too sensible of the Dangers that threatened the Loss of all that is dear and valuable to us as Britons and Protestants, to look on with Indifference, or without the greatest Anxiety, when Attempts were made to force an Exchange of our free Government for arbitrary Power; of Liberty for Tyranny, and of the rational Religion of Protestants for the Superstition and Priestcraft of Popery: But such and many more Calamities, hard to be expressed, but terrible to Thought, must have been the

Fate of Britons, had their detestable Scheme succeeded.

The infinitely more desirable Event inspires us with the most grateful Acknowledgments to the great Giver of all Victory; and under him to your Majesty, who in tender Concern to the Happiness of your People, at so critical a Juncture, appointed his Royal Highness the Duke to command your Army. By his Conduct, blessed by the gracious Concurrence of Providence, we have seen that most audacious Rebellion so happily extinguished, and such a Blow given to the Enemies of our happy Constitution, as will secure, we firmly trust, the uninterrupted Enjoyment of our Religion and Liberty, under your Majesty's mild and lawful Government.

That your Majesty's Arms, and those of your Allies, may be favoured by Heaven, so as effectually to scourge Tyrants, and protect the Liberties of Europe. And that your Majesty and your Royal House may long reign over a free and happy People in these Lands, and thus our Liberties be adorned and perpetuated to the latest Generations, is the earnest Prayer of,

Stockholm, August 5. On Wednesday last Baron Korff, the new Muscovite Minister, had his first Audience of his Swedish Majesty at Carlsberg, and the Friday following he went to Droningholm, to pay his Respects to the Prince and Princess Royal, who have taken their Residence at that Place for the remaining Part of the Summer. General Lubras has not yet taken his Audience of Leave, but talks every Day of doing it, and leaving this Place in about a Fortnight.

Berlin, August 13. The King of Prussia came to Town the Day before Yesterday about Noon. Having given Audience to the Foreign Ministers, M. Valory acquainted his Majesty with the Death of the King of Spain, and of Madam la Dauphine. His Majesty dined and supped in his own Apartment, and returned the following Day at Eight of the Clock in the Morning to Potzdam, and is expected to return hither on Tuesday next. Count Czernickew sets out this Evening for England. He proposes to pass through Hanover, and to make some Stay at the Hague.

Berlin, August 16. The King of Prussia did not come to Town Yesterday as was expected, his Majesty being indisposed. On the 13th Count Schmettau returned hither from Aix la Chapelle. Count Czernickew departed on the 14th about Noon. He passes through Zerbit, where he intends also to make some Stay. The Russian Secretary M. Simmy is to manage his Court's Interest here, till another Minister is appointed.

Berlin, August 20. His Prussian Majesty is not yet recovered, and keeps his Chamber. Both Queens, and the rest of the Royal Family here, are in good Health. The Duke Charles Leopold of Meclenburg's Minister, M. Vatter, return'd hither on the 16th from Domnitz, with the Title of his Highness's Privy-Counsellor of Court and Regency. On the 18th he set out for Potzdam, in order to wait on his Majesty.

Munich, August 18. On the 16th Instant a Battalion of the Guards marched from hence towards Donawert, which with another of Sekendorff will form the first Column of the Bavarian Corps, yielded to the States under the Orders of Major General Swibel.

Hague, August 26, N. S. We have no Advices directly from our Army fresher than of the 21st Instant, when both we and the French were still drawing down on each Side of the Mehaigne nearer the Meuse: But by Letters from Maestricht of the 24th ditto, we learn that Marshal Saxe had made himself Master of Huy, taken the few sick, and Provisions we had in that Town, and posted Detachments all along the Meuse down to Liege, where he had even demanded Admittance for some Troops. In the mean Time, the Field Train which the Austrians were expecting from the Rhine, consisting of 14 three Pounders, and six Haubitzes, and escorted by above 1000 Recruits, has thrown itself by forced Marches into Maestricht.
