THE following Address of the High Sheriff, Grand Jury, Justices of the Peace of and for the County of Cornwall, the Clergy and Gentry at Bodmyn Assizes, has been presented to his Majesty by the Right Honourable the Lord Edgcumbe, Lord Lieutenant of the said County, being introduced by the Right Hon. the Earl of Lincoln, one of the Lords of his Majesty's Bed-Chamber in Waiting: Which Address his Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the High Sheriff, Grand Jury, Justices of the Peace of and for the County of Cornwall, the Clergy and Gentry, at Bodmyn Assizes, the Twenty-sixth Day of August, One thousand seven hundred and forty-six,

May it please your Majesty,

WE your Majesty's ever loyal Subjects, humbly beg Leave to congratulate your Majesty on the late happy Success of your Majesty's Arms at Culloden, under the auspicious Conduct of the Duke of Cumberland, over a perverse and deluded Race of Men, blind to their

own and their Country's Interest: An Event, glorious to the young Hero who commanded, and to all the brave Officers and Soldiers who fought under him on that never-to-be-forgotten Day. A Day, that we hope has for ever freed the Church from the Fears of Popery and Idolatry, the State from Sedition and Rebellion, and which, we hope, will, under your Majesty's wise and prudent Directions, greatly contribute, with other concurring Circumstances, towards the obtaining of a safe and honourable Peace, so much the Desire and Interest of a trading People.

May the Almighty always continue to protect your Royal House; may your Majesty reign long and happily over a grateful People; and when your Majesty shall change the Earthly for an Eternal Crown, may his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales and Duke of Cornwall, in whom we see all the Virtues of your illustrious Line, not only succeed to your Crown, but reign in the Hearts and Affections of a free People, and bless us with a Race of Kings his Descendants, to latest Posterity.
