The humble Address of the Lieutenant Governor and Council of the Province of Pennsylvania.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE your Majesty's dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Lieutenant Governor and Council of the Province of Pennsylvania, being truly sensible of the Blessings we enjoy under your Majesty's mild and gracious Government, humbly beg Leave, with Hearts full of Joy and Gratitude, to present our most sincere Congratulations on the Success of your Majesty's Arms, under his Royal Highness the Duke, in defeating the Rebels in Scotland, and thereby extinguishing the Hopes of a popish Pretender and his detestable Confederates.

If Mercy; Justice, and the strictest Regard and Attention to the Liberties and Interests of your Subjects, could have secured to your Majesty a Reign of Peace, your Annals would not have been clouded by a black and most unnatural Rebellion: But it is no new Thing for arbitrary Princes to contrive and promote Schemes for the Subversion of a Government, which is a standing Reproach upon their own; or for wicked Subjects to hate Virtues in a King, which are Restraints upon their base and savage Natures.

Naples, Sept. 6, N.S. In the Evening of the 3d Instant, by Orders from Court, an Embargo was laid on all Vessels actually in the Ports of the Kingdom, and upon those that shall arrive, in order to compleat the Number of 120, which are to be employed in transporting the King's Troops from the Coast of Genoa to this City.

Venice, Sept. 16, N.S. The Letters from Genoa mention an Action between the Piemontese and the French near Final, but were uncertain which had the Advantage. This is supposed to be an Attack of their Rear Guard under M. Mirepoix, who remained with 12 Battalions to cover the Retreat of their Army. The British Squadron, Part of which was at Savona, and Part near Ventimiglia, have incommoded the French very much in their March, and obliged them to leave the Road along the Riviera, and to march through a very difficult Way over the Mountains. Don Philip and the Duke of Modena are supposed to be at Nice, where a Palace was ordered to be prepared for their Reception. Six thousand Warasins of the last Reinforcements are already arrived at Mantua, and will be soon followed by 6000 more, two Regiments of Horse, and two of Infantry, who are marching with all Diligence through the Tirol. The Imperialists are, by the Ammunitions and Provisions of all Sorts found in the State of Genoa, and by the Contributions levying, as well as by the Numbers of Recruits, and of Deserters, who are returned to their Colours, in the best Condition that can be well imagined.

Fort William, September 21. There is an Account from the Braes of Locharkieg, that last Thursday, about Twelve o'Clock, the Pretender's Son embarked on board a French Ship of War in the same Loch in Moydart where he first landed, attended by the following Persons, viz. Macpherson of Clunie, with others of his Clan; Cameron of Lochiel, Dr. Cameron his Brother, Ludovick Cameron of Torr Castle, Allan Cameron, and Macdonald of Lochgary, with many others, whose Names were not known. Macdonald of Barrisdale was said to have gone on board before the Pretender's Son got to the Ships.

Kensington, September 30.

This Day Prince Scherbatow, Minister Plenipotentiary from the Czarina, being recall'd, had a private Audience of Leave of his Majesty, to deliver his Letter of Revocation.

As had afterwards Count Czernichew, his first private Audience of his Majesty, to deliver his Letters of Credence, as Minister Plenipo-

tentiary' from the Czarina. They were both introduc'd by the Right Honourable the Earl of Harrington, one of his Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and conducted by Sir Clement Cotterel Dormer, Knt. Master of the Ceremonies.

Whereas certain Information has been made, upon Oath, before one of his Majesty's Justices of the Peace, that the Chiffer Mail, of the 2d of July last, was robbed by a Person who goes, or has gone by the several Names of GABRIEL TOMKINS, alias YOUNG GIBB, alias KIT JERVIS, alias CHRISTOPHER WOOD, alias UNKLE, alias RAWLINS, who has been formerly a Smugler, and was some Years since employed as a Riding Surveyor in the Service of the Customs, and some Years ago lived at the Town of Dartford, in the County of Kent: He is a Man of between Forty and Fifty Years of Age, of a very swarthy Complexion, somewhat marked with the Small Pox; about Five Foot Nine or Ten Inches high, is a very well made Man, walks very upright, with large dark Eye-brows, which hang over his Eyes, and has formerly received a Wound in his Left Arm with a Pistol or Musquet Bullet, of which some Mark or Appearance is left.

* * * By Intelligence received, since the first Printing of this Advertisement, the above described Gabriel Tomkins has a small Wart or Wen at the Corner of one of his Eye-brows, next to his Nose, and is said to appear in a shabby brown duffil Coat, much pieced and torn, and trimmed with white metal Buttons, a deep blue Waistcoat, and an old light or lightish Wig turned Yellow with the Wearing.
