The King's most Excellent Majesty in Council

WHEREAS by Order of his Majesty in Council of the Twelfth of March last, Liberty was given to send, drive, or remove, or cause to be sent, driven, or removed, any lean Ox, Bull, Cow, Calf, Steer or Heifer, out of any Town, Parish, or Extraparochial Place whatsoever, within that Part of Great Britain called England, to any Fair, Market, or any other Town, Parish, or Extraparochial Place within the same; or to buy, sell, or expose, or offer to Sale in any such Fair, Market, Town, Parish, or Extraparochial Place, any such lean Beast or Beasts as are aforementioned, for and during the Space of three Calendar Months, to be computed and begin from the Twenty-fourth Day of the said Month of March last; which Liberty was granted upon this express Condition, That the Person or Persons selling such Beast or Beasts, should deliver to the Person or Persons who should buy such Beast or Beasts, such proper Certificate or Certificates as are required by the said Order: — And whereas his Majesty hath received Information, that though the Distemper amongst the Horned Cattle is entirely ceased in the County of Middlesex, and is greatly decreased in several other Parts of the Kingdom, yet that it still continues to rage in some other Counties, and hath lately spread itself into several Parts of the Counties of Derby and Nottingham on the North Side of the River Trent, insomuch, that there is Reason to apprehend, that the permitting any Horned Cattle to be bought and sold in Fairs and Markets, to be

held either in such Places where the Distemper may happen to be, or in any Places in the Neighbourhood thereof, may be attended with bad Consequences, and be a Means of spreading the said Distemper still further: For the better preventing whereof, his Majesty doth, by this his Order in his Privy Council, hereby authorize and empower any four Persons, being Justices of the Peace, or Commissioners of the Land Tax (authorized by Virtue of an Act of this present Session of Parliament, to put the said Act and his Majesty's Orders of Council in Execution) within their respective Divisions, to put a Stop to the holding of any Fairs or Markets, for the buying and selling of such Horned Cattle, where they shall apprehend the holding thereof may be attended with the Danger of spreading the said Distemper, for and until the Twenty-fourth Day of June next. And his Majesty doth hereby strictly forbid the sending, driving, or removing, or causing to be sent, driven, or removed, any such Beast or Beasts, to any such Fair or Market. And the said Justices and Commissioners are hereby authorized and required to cause publick Notice to be given of the putting a Stop to such Fairs or Markets, and to issue their Orders to the chief Constable, or Headborough of the Hundred, Lath, Rape, or Wapentake, and to the Petty Constables of the respective Parishes within the same, to prevent the holding such Fair or Market. And if any Person or Persons shall presume to drive, remove, or send, or cause to be driven, removed, or sent, any such Beast or Beasts, to such Fair or Market, contrary to the Orders issued by the said Justices or Commissioners in that Behalf, such Person or Persons so offending, shall be carried before some neighbouring Justice, or Commissioner as aforesaid, to be dealt with according to Law.

And

And whereas his Majesty was pleased by his Order in Council of the Twelfth of March last, (for obviating any Doubts that might arise about driving Oxen in the Plough, Cart, &c.) to allow of and permit Oxen to be drove in the Plough, Cart, Waggon, and other Carriages, from one Parish to another, upon Condition that no Distemper had been, or should afterwards happen to be amongst the Horned Cattle within Twenty Miles of the Parish or Place from which, or to which such Oxen should be so driven. And whereas it hath been this Day represented to his Majesty, that notwithstanding the said Permission, it hath so happened in several Parts of the Kingdom, that many Farmers and others have not received the Benefit thereby intended, in regard the said Distemper hath in some Counties spread itself within Twenty Miles of every Town and Village thereof; his Majesty taking the same into Consideration, and being desirous to remove any Impediments upon Husbandry, so far as may be done with Safety, is pleased, by this his Order in his Privy Council, to permit and allow, that from henceforward, Ox Teams in any Kind of Carriages may be driven from one Parish, or Place, to another, provided such Teams be not driven nearer than three Miles to any Place where the Distemper is, or shall happen to be amongst the Horned Cattle; and provided also, that before such Oxen shall be permitted to be so driven, a Certificate be obtained under the Hand and Seal, or Hands and Seals of one or more Justice or Justices of the Peace for the County, Riding, Division, City, Liberty, or Town Corporate, or of one or more Commissioner or Commissioners of the Land Tax as aforesaid, or in Case no such Justice of the Peace or Commissioner of the Land Tax, authorized as aforesaid, be resident within three Miles of the Place from whence such Ox Team shall be driven, then under the Hand and Seal of the Rector, Vicar, or Curate of the Parish from whence such Team shall be driven, or in his Absence, of the Rector, Vicar, or Curate of some Neighbouring Parish, specifying the Name or Names, and Place or Places of Abode of the Person or Persons to whom the said Ox Team doth belong; and that upon Examination on Oath of one or more credible Person or Persons, it appeared to him or them, that the said Oxen, and the Herd or Herds out of which the same was or were taken, had been, for the Space of two Calendar Months before the Date of such Certificate, entirely free from the said Distemper or Infection. And whereas by Order of his Majesty in Council of the Twelfth of March last, it was directed amongst other Things, that no Hides or Skins should be suffered to pass over the Severn Westward, or any of the other Rivers therein named, for the Space of three Calendar Months, to commence from the Twenty-fourth Day of the said Month of March: And whereas

it has been represented to his Majesty in Behalf of the Tanners of the Parish of St. John's near the City of Worcester, and within the Liberties thereof, though separated therefrom by a Bridge over the River Severn, that the said Tanners are engaged in an annual Contract with the Butchers of the said City of Worcester, to take the Hides and Skins of the Beasts and Calves which shall be slaughtered within the said City; but that they are restrained from carrying the same from thence into the said Parish of St. John's by Reason of the said Parish being situated on the Westward Side of the said River, and therefore humbly praying, in regard to the particular Circumstances of their Case, and to the enabling them to fulfil their Contract with the said Butchers, that they may be allowed to carry the Hides and Skins of Beasts and Calves slaughtered in the said City of Worcester cross the Bridge to their Tann Pits at St. John's; His Majesty taking the same into Consideration, and having received Information that not only the City, but the whole County of Worcester hath been free from the said Distemper, is hereby pleased, in regard thereto, and to the particular Circumstances attending the Case of the Tanners at St. John's, to order, by and with the Advice of his Privy Council, that Liberty be granted to the Tanners living at St. John's aforesaid, to carry over the Severn Westward the Hides and Skins of Beasts and Calves slaughter'd in the said City of Worcester, notwithstanding any Thing contained in the aforesaid Order of Council of the Twelfth of March last to the contrary; provided the said Tanners do first obtain such Certificates, as to the Health of the Beasts and Calves from which such Hides and Skins shall be taken, as are required by his Majesty's Order of Council of the Seventeenth of December last to be obtained upon the selling Hides or Skins.--And for the better notifying of this Order, it is his Majesty's Pleasure, that the same be forthwith printed and published, and be also inserted in the London Gazette, and be likewise read, together with the said former Orders of Council, in all Parish Churches, Chapels, and other Places set apart for Divine Worship, on such Sunday in every Calendar Month, as the Minister of such Parish shall think proper, according to what is required by the Act passed this present Session of Parliament.

Naples, March 14, N. S. On the 8th Instant anchored in this Port a Transport Vessel from Genoa, with Recruits for the King's Troops; as did one of the King's Half Gallies, escorting a Vessel with the Baggage and Domesticicks of the Prince of Campo Florido, Ambassador from the King of Spain to this Court, which was a considerable Time detain'd by an English Privateer, and released since at Leghorne by Virtue of the Passports from his Britannick Majesty and the King of Sardinia. On the 9th anchored likewise three other Transports, whereof one from Port Luhgone with Invalids, and two from Messina with the second Battalion out of the Foot Regiment Royal Naples, in Garrison there. On the 10th arrived here from Rome, Madame Fogliani, the Secretary of State's Lady. On the 11th the Duke de la Vieu Ville departed from this Port for Palermo, on board the King's Frigate, Notre Dame de la Conception, to take upon him that Government as Viceroy of Sicily.

Rome, March 18. Notice was sent the other Day from Ostia and Nettunno to this City, that several Transport Vessels with Troops from Naples, sail'd in Sight of those Ports for the Presidii. Prince Corsini, it is said, on his Return from Sicily, will be appointed to succeed Cardinal Acquaviva as Minister from the Court of Naples to the Pope. On the 16th M. Sampario, the Portuguese Minister, had a long private Audience of the Pope.

Florence, March 18. Threatning Letters were put up in the last Week in different Parts of this City, abusing the new Fiscal, with Menaces to shoot him. By Directions from the Court of Vienna, there are packing up, in order to be sent thither, several Machines and other Mathematical Instruments made by the late M. Varange, the Emperor's Professor of Mathematicks, as likewise a Collection of large Machines, which were made for the Use of the late Cardinal de Medicè, who established a very renowned Academy for that Study.

Lisbon, April 7. Besides the two Spanish Prizes brought in here some Time since, one of 30000 l. Sterling Value, bound from Cadiz to Buenos Ayres, and the other of above 100000 l. for the Havannah and La Vera Cruz, by the Squadron of English Privateers call'd the Royal Family, there has been likewise brought into our Port by Commodore Leg, three homeward bound Martinico Men, loaden with Sugar, Indigo, and Coffee, valued at about 6000 l. each; another of about the same Value by Captain Keppel, of the Maidstone, (who took two, but one of them sunk at Sea) and a Fifth last Week worth 10000 l. by the Dreadnought Privateer.

Hague, April 28, N. S. By Yesterday's Letters from Brussels, Marshal Saxe was returned thither incognito from Antwerp. The French Troops were still in their Cantonments, and were, as they gave out, to remain so till the Surrender of Sas van Ghent, which it seems was much retarded by the Inundation. The Body of Troops that assembled in the Neighbourhood of Sedan, and were said to be destined for the Siege of Luxembourg, were arriving daily about Brussels to join Marshal Saxe. A Battalion of Militia was sent Yesterday to Antwerp, and the Switzers to Mechlin. The French Guards were to arrive this Day and cantoon in the Suburbs of Brussels. There were 1500 Sailors or Fishermen assembled at Ghent, and 200 Boats upon the Schelde, designed, as it is thought, for an Expedition against Zealand, as soon as that River is cleared of the Dutch Forts. The Paris Letters of the 24th, N. S. mention the Time of the French King's Departure for the Army as still undetermined; but the Officers of his Household, and his Equipages, were already set out for Brussels; as Marshal Belleisle was to do in a few Days for Provence. The Duke de Bouffleurs was gone for Marseilles in his Way to Genoa; where, it was hoped, he would have the supreme military Command of that Republick. We hear from Marseilles, that the Grand Prior of France was to sail with his Gallies for Antibes the 20th or 21st of this Month, in order to favour the Attack which M. de Chevreton was to make upon the Islands of St. Marguerite and St. Honorat. They write also, that the French Transports which took Refuge at Monaco, sailed from thence the 2d, but came back again in an Hour by contrary Winds, excepting one, which had not been heard of since.

Hague, April 29, N. S. The States of Zealand having on the 25th Instant declared his most Serene Highness the Prince of Orange Stadtholder, Admiral and Captain General of that Province; and the Town of Rotterdam having followed the Example, and sent a Deputation hither to the States of Holland to desire their Concurrence, it is thought that his Highness

Highness will be declared Stadtholder of this Province in a few Days.

Rotterdam, April 29. The English Men of War cruizing off Flushing, have taken and carried up to that Place four Blankenberg Fishermen, and a French Privateer. The Letters which came from the Allied Army last Night, say, that it was preparing to move To-Day or To-morrow to a new Camp.
