Whereas on Saturday Night, the 18th of April last, his Majesty's Warehouse at Shoreham, in the County of Sussex, was broke open by Persons unknown, who stole thereout 22 Oil skin Bags, containing Five hundred and forty four Pounds Weight of Tea (which Robbery was effected by the said Persons getting over a Wall ten Feet high into the Collector's Garden) and who left a large Club and a Horse-whip at the said Warehouse: His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the said Robbery, is pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, who shall discover his Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so as they or any of them may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

And as a further Encouragement, the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs do hereby promise a Reward of One Hundred Pounds to any Person or Persons making such Discovery as aforesaid, to be paid upon the Conviction of the Offender or Offenders, by the Receiver General and Cashier of the Customs; and if any one of the Persons who were concerned in the said Robbery, will discover his Accomplices, so as any one or more of them may be apprehended and convicted thereof, he will be entitled to and receive the like Reward of One Hundred Pounds, to be paid upon the Conviction of the Offender or Offenders.
