A P R O C L A M A T I O N.

W Hereas upon Information to his Majesty, That the Plague hath broke out at Santa Cruz, and other Ports and Places in West Barbary, his Majesty has been pleased, by his Order in Council bearing Date the 20th Day of June instant, to require all Ships coming into any of the Ports of Great Britain, either from Santa Cruz, or any other Port in West Barbary, to perform a Quarantine of Forty Days :

And whereas it is of the utmost Importance to prevent the Infection being brought by Ships or Vessels coming from thence into the Ports of this Kingdom ;

We the Lords Justices and Council do think fit, hereby to order and direct, That all Ships and Vessels already arrived and not yet unladen, and all Ships and Vessels which shall hereafter arrive in any Port of this Kingdom, from the Port of Santa Cruz, or any other Port in West Barbary on the Atlantick Ocean, do make their Quarantine for Forty Days, which shall be reckoned and commence from the Day each Ship or Vessel shall come to anchor in the Place appointed for performing such Quarantine, and not before.

That the Place for performing Quarantine by such Ships and Vessels, bound to any Port between Miffen-Head and the Tuskard, be the Bay of Baltimore. And for such Ships and Vessels as shall be bound for any Port between Tuskard and Rathlin, be Lough Learn and the Bay of Carlingford, near Killowen Point, opposite the Town of Carlingford. And for such Ships and Vessels as shall be bound for any Port between Rathlin and Torry-Island, be Ballymastoker Bay or Red Castle Road, near Londonderry. And for such Ships and Vessels as shall be bound to any Port between Torry-Island and Black-Sod Bay, be the Harbour of Killybeggs. And for such Ships and Vessels as shall be bound to any Port between Black-Sod Bay and Loop-Head, be Clew-Bay (otherwise

called) the Bay of Burrishowle. And for such Ships and Vessels as shall be bound to any Port between Loop-Head and Miffen-Head, be Scattery Road, in the River of Limerick.

That until and during the Time for making such Quarantine, no Person coming, or Goods imported in any such Ship or Vessel, shall come on Shore, or be landed in any Place within this Kingdom, other than as aforesaid.

That whatsoever Ship, Vessel, or Person shall receive any Men or Goods, from on board any Ship or Vessel under Quarantine, shall be compelled to perform the like Quarantine.

And we likewise further order and direct, that the Captains of every of his Majesty's Ships of War attending the Service of this Kingdom, who shall meet any such Ship or Vessel coming to any of the Ports of this Kingdom, shall take due Care to prevent the Landing any Goods, Seamen, or Passengers, from on Board the same, until they shall be put under the Direction of the Officers of his Majesty's Revenue.

And we do hereby order and direct the Commissioners and other Officers of his Majesty's Revenue, to use their utmost Diligence and Care that the Quarantine herein before directed be duly performed.

And we do hereby strictly charge and command the Commanders of his Majesty's Ships of War attending the Service of this Kingdom, as likewise the Commanders of his Majesty's Forts and Garrisons lying near the Sea Coast, and all Justices of the Peace, Mayors, Sheriffs, Bailiffs, Chief Magistrates, Constables, and other Officers and Ministers of Justice, to be aiding and assisting to the Officers of the Revenue and Customs, and to all other Persons that shall be concerned in stopping Ships coming from the Port of Santa Cruz, or any other Port in West Barbary upon the Atlantick Ocean, and in bringing them to the Places appointed for, and obliging them to perform their Quarantine, as aforesaid.

Hague, July 11, N. S. On Sunday Evening his Highness the Prince of Orange assembled the Council of State, upon certain Advice, that the very Evening of the late Battle the French had detached a considerable Body of Troops towards Antwerp, which looks as if they intended to besiege either Breda or Bergen-op-zoom. Upon this Intelligence, Orders were sent immediately to almost all the Troops about these Provinces, to join the Corps under the Prince of Saxe Hilbourghausen, who is at present retired within the Lines near Bergen-op-zoom: By these Means, and the Troops that are sent from Zealand, he will have under his Command 22 Battalions and 14 Squadrons, till he can be reinforced from the main Army. Orders have been likewise sent to cut the Dykes in the Neighbourhood of Bergen-op-zoom; and lest the Enemy should attempt any Thing against Bois-le-Duc, the Inundations are already completed about that Town. We hear that a Body of 24,000 French had appeared in the Neighbourhood of Sandvliet; and that it was expected that Place would soon be attacked in Form. There are several Letters here, that mention the entire Destruction by Fire of the Store Houses and Magazines belonging to the Navy at Barcelona. The first Division of the Hessian Troops, taken into the Service of the Republick, are expected To-morrow or next Day at Nimmeguen, and that the Troops from Wurtzberg were to set out by Water as Yesterday.

Admiralty-Office, July 7.

On Saturday the 20th of last Month, a small English Privateer fell in with the Squadron under the Command of Sir Peter Warren, and informed him, that on the 17th and 18th he had chased 15 or 20 little Coasters, laden with Stores for the King of Spain, into Sedere, a small Bay to the West of Cape Ortegall, where they might be very easily taken or destroyed; Sir Peter sent away the Viper and Hunter Dogger along with the Privateer, to perform this Service, and in two Days they rejoined the Squadron, with a small Privateer, Prize, and five little Barks, laden

chiefly with Iron, Rozin, and other Trifles, having burnt 28 more of the same Sort, which they could not conveniently bring off, and destroyed a three Gun Battery.

On Sunday the 21st, the Admiral steering with his Squadron for Cape Finisterre, fell in with ten Sail (six of them nearer the Land than the other four) to which they immediately gave Chace. The Admiral concluded they were all French, and therefore kept some of the Squadron close upon a Wind after the four, while himself with the rest, went in Pursuit of the six. In a short Time one of the four made a Signal for knowing each other, and proved to be his Majesty's Ships the Prince Frederick, Bristol, and Centurion, with a Portuguese Brig they had spoke with. They followed the six other Ships, which were Merchants, into a Bay a little to Windward of the Island of Sifarga, where the Enemy's Ships anchored very regularly, not imagining we should follow them; but finding their Mistake, they cut their Cables and run ashore, set Fire to one of the Ships, and a very fine Brig, which blew up before our Boats could get on board. The Ship which blew up was the Etoile, a Man of War of 46 Guns, and about 400 Men, came from Port Louis with a Convoy of ten Sail of Merchant Ships, six of which parted Company in the West-Indies. As they had not set Fire to the four Merchant-ships, the Admiral ordered the Monmouth, Portland, and Ambuscade, to anchor, and next Day they got them all off, without having received the least Damage. They are all thought to be pretty valuable, one alone of them being said to be worth 45,000 l. and are come safe into Plymouth, under Convoy of the Portland.

His Majesty's Ship the Lyon is arrived at Plymouth with four more of the St. Domingo Fleet, which he took alone within 12 or 16 Leagues W. S. W. of Belle Isle.

On the 2d Instant his Majesty's Sloop the Jamaica, cruising in the Channel, saw a Two-Mast Vessel at Anchor between St. Alban's Head and Peverel Point, which appeared to be a French Privateer, waiting for three Sloops that were coming round St. Alban's; the Jamaica thereupon made towards the Privateer, who immediately cut her Cable, and made the best of her Way to Sea, and was chased by the Jamaica, who came up with her at Ten o'Clock, when she struck, and proved to be the Renard of Dieppe, of one Carriage and five Swivel Guns, and 29 Men.

On the 2d Instant his Majesty's Sloop the Falcon, being on a Cruize off Mount's Bay, saw a large Ship to Windward, to which she gave Chace, and at Eleven o'Clock came up with and took her; she proved to be a French Ship called the Joseph from Newfoundland, bound to Havre de Grace, of 14 Carriage Guns, 37 Men, loaded with Mud Fish; and she has brought her into Plymouth.
