**H**IS Majesty in Council was this Day pleased to order the Right Honourable the Lord High Chancellor, to issue Writs for proroguing the Parliament, which was appointed to meet on Thursday the Thirteenth of this Instant, to Thursday the Tenth Day of September next; and also for proroguing the Convocations of Canterbury and York, which were appointed to meet on Wednesday the Nineteenth of this Instant, to Friday the Eleventh Day of the said Month of September.

**W**Hereas John Carbold, of Finingham in the County of Suffolk, Labourer; James Morley, of Frandelstone in the said County, Carpenter; Thomas Brooks, commonly called Bricklayer Tom, of Cotton near Finingham in the said County, Labourer; Edward Brook, of Yackley in the said County, Butcher; James Cunningham, commonly called Curse Mother, of Winkfield in the said County, Labourer; Robert Cunningham, of the same Place, Labourer; Charles Blumfield of or near Halstone in the said County, Labourer; Henry Chittock, of Stoke near Twaite in the said County, Carpenter; John Oldous, of Fresingfield in the said County, Labourer; Robert Clarke, commonly called Plunder, of or near Halstone aforesaid, in the said County, Labourer; George Potter, otherwise Porter, of Wickham Sky in the said County, Cordwainer; and Thomas Fisher, of Dis in the County of Norfolk, Locksmith; were, upon the Tenth Day of July last, charged by Information of a credible Person upon Oath, by him subscribed before Thomas Burdus, Esquire, one of his Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the County of Middlesex, with having been guilty, upon the Fifth Day of September last, of being armed with Fire Arms or other offensive Weapons, and so armed being all assembled at Feverton in the said County of Suffolk, in order to be aiding and assisting in the Running and Carrying away uncustomed Goods; which Information was afterwards certified by the said Thomas Burdus, under his Hand and Seal, to one of his Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, who has laid the same before his Majesty in his Privy Council, pursuant to the late Act of Parliament of the Nineteenth Year of the Reign of his present Majesty, in that Case made and provided.—His Majesty doth, by and with the Advice of his Privy Council, by

this his Order in his Privy Council, require and command, That the said John Carbold, James Morley, Thomas Brooks, commonly called Bricklayer Tom, Edward Brook, James Cunningham, commonly called Curse Mother, Robert Cunningham, Charles Blumfield, Henry Chittock, John Oldous, Robert Clarke, commonly called Plunder, George Potter, otherwise Porter, and Thomas Fisher, do surrender himself and themselves, within the Space of Forty Days after the first Publication of this Order in the London Gazette, to the Lord Chief Justice, or one other of his Majesty's Justices of the Court of King's Bench, or to one of his Majesty's Justices of the Peace.

**W**Hereas William Pollard, otherwise Jeremiah Curtis, of Hawkhurst in the County of Kent, Yeoman, and Jacob Pring, of the same Place, Labourer, were, upon the Seventeenth Day of July last, charged by Information of a credible Person upon Oath, by him subscribed before Thomas Burdus, Esquire, one of his Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the County of Middlesex, with having been guilty, upon the Twenty-eighth Day of December last, of being, together with diverse other Persons, armed with Fire-arms or other offensive Weapons, and so armed, being assembled at Folkstone Warren, in the said County of Kent, in order to be aiding and assisting in the Running, Landing, and Carrying away uncustomed Goods; which Information was afterwards certified by the said Thomas Burdus, under his Hand and Seal, to one of his Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, who has laid the same before his Majesty in his Privy Council, pursuant to the late Act of Parliament of the Nineteenth Year of the Reign of his present Majesty in that Case made and provided.—His Majesty doth, by and with the Advice of his Privy Council, by this his Order in his Privy Council, require and command, that the said William Pollard, otherwise Jeremiah Curtis, and Jacob Pring, and each of them, do surrender himself and themselves, within the Space of Forty Days after the first Publication of this Order in the London Gazette, to the Lord Chief Justice, or one other of his Majesty's Justices of the Court of King's Bench, or to one of his Majesty's Justices of the Peace.
