Whitehall, October 16, 1747.

It having been represented to the King, That on Wednesday the 7th Instant, between Twelve and One of the Clock in the Morning, a considerable Number of Persons, arm'd with Muskets, Pistols, and Swords, went to the Custom house at Poole in Dorsetshire, and placed a Guard upon the Watchmen, and all other Persons, whom they met with in the Streets; and then broke open the outward Door of the said Custom-house, and the Door of the Collector's Office, and one other Door leading to the King's Warehouse; declaring, they were come for their Tea; and accordingly took from thence all the Tea, which had been lately seized by Capt. Johnson, Commander of the Swift Privateer, being upwards of Four Thousand Two Hundred Weight, and carried the same to a Place in the said Town, where their Horses waited; obliging the Watchmen to go and remain with them, till they had loaded them: That they were upwards of Sixty in Number, with about Thirty Horses; and that they left behind them, in their Hurry, a Crow Bar of a new and uncommon Make; His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned therein, is pleased to promise his most gracious Pardon to any one of the Offenders, who shall discover any one, or more of his Accomplices, so that he or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
