**W**HEREAS his Majesty hath received Information, that many Abuses have been committed with regard to the granting Certificates for the Rewards allowed to the Sufferers for their Losses by Infected Cattle killed and buried, by granting Certificates for Infected Cattle as killed pursuant to the Directions of his Majesty's Order in Council of the Eighteenth of June last, (which directs them to be killed immediately, and so soon as any Signs or Marks of the said Distemper shall appear) though in Fact the said Cattle have not been killed, until after they had been long ill of the said Distemper, and till they were near expiring; which is contrary to the Directions and Intention of his Majesty's said Order in Council, and tends greatly to the Spreading the said Contagion—As also with regard to the Burying the said Infected Cattle, many of whom are not immediately buried so soon as they die, or are killed, but are suffered to lie above Ground for a considerable Time after, and others have been only put into the Ground and not cover'd over, but the Ground kept open, in order to put others expected to die soon, into the same Burying-place—And that others have not been buried near the Depth under Ground required by the said Order, under Pretence that they could not bury them that Depth by reason of the Water, and diverse other Pretences, by Means whereof Swine and Dogs have come at and fed upon the said Infected Carcasses, and thereby carried and spread the said Infection to and amongst Herds of Cattle, which were before sound and free from the said Distemper.

And whereas there is great Reason to apprehend, that Frauds may be committed, either by obtaining double Certificates, or by producing forged and counterfeit, or false Certificates, unless due Care be taken to prevent the same; His Majesty taking the Premises into his Royal Consideration, and having a due Regard as well to the Hindering, as far as may be, the Spreading the said Infection, as also to the Preventing any Abuse in the Payment of the Recompences allowed to the said Sufferers, is pleased, by and with the Advice of his Privy-Council, to make the following Variations and Additions to the Orders, Rules and Regulations contained in his Majesty's former Orders in Council of the Eighteenth

of June and Eighth of September last; and his Majesty doth by this his Order in his Privy-Council, accordingly order, require, and command,

That when any Owner or Owners of Infected Cattle apply to any Justice of the Peace, or Commissioner of the Land Tax, for a Certificate of such Infected Cattle having been killed and buried pursuant to the Directions of his Majesty's Orders in Council, every such Justice of the Peace, or Commissioner of the Land Tax, is carefully to enquire upon Oath, the Time when the Symptoms of the said Distemper first appeared upon the said Cattle respectively, and the Time when they were respectively killed, and when respectively buried, and where, and how deep, and whether the Earth was cover'd over them, and when, and to have the same verified upon the Oath of the Owner or Owners of the said Cattle, and also of the Inspector or Officer who visited the said Cattle, and where there was no Inspector or Parish Officer, of a credible Witness: And as to such of the said Cattle as shall not, upon such Examination, appear to the Satisfaction of such Justice of the Peace, or Commissioner of the Land Tax, to have been killed and buried within Twenty-four Hours at farthest from and after the said Cattle were first respectively seized with the said Distemper, at least four Feet deep, and the Earth cover'd in, the said Justices of the Peace, and Commissioners of the Land Tax, are hereby strictly charged and commanded not to grant, on any Pretence whatsoever, any Certificate for such Cattle, as killed and buried pursuant to the Directions of the said Order in Council: And as to such Cattle, as upon such Enquiry and Examination, shall appear to have been killed, buried, and cover'd in, within Twenty-four Hours at farthest, from and after their being first seized with the said Distemper, the Justices of the Peace and Commissioners of the Land Tax are hereby required to mention in every Certificate they shall hereafter grant for Infected Cattle killed and buried, that such Examination had been made on Oath, touching the Time the said Cattle were first seized with the said Distemper, and the Time of their being killed and buried.

That the Justices of the Peace, and Commissioners of the Land Tax, do not, on any Pretence whatsoever, grant any Certificate for the Reward for the Hides or Skins of Cattle that die of the said Infection, unless it be first made appear to him or them, by the Oath of the Owner or Owners of such Cattle, and also by the Oath of an Inspector or Parish-Officer, or, if they cannot be had, of a credible Witness, that the said Cattle were respectively buried immediately

mediately, and at farthest within three Hours after they died, at least four Feet deep, and the Earth cover'd in, and then to mention in the Certificate that such Proof hath been made.

That every Justice of the Peace, or Commissioner of the Land Tax, do within three Days after the End of every Month, in which any Certificate or Certificates for Infected Cattle shall be granted by him or them, transmit a List or Lists under his or their Hand or Hands, of all such Certificates as shall have been granted and signed by him or them within such Month, mentioning the Date of each Certificate, the Name and Place of Residence of the Person or Persons to whom granted, and the Amount of the Allowance or Allowances in each Certificate, to the Clerk of the Peace for the respective Counties in which such Certificates shall have been signed; which Certificates the said respective Clerks of the Peace are hereby enjoined and required forthwith to transmit to John Sharpe, Esq; the Solicitor of his Majesty's Treasury, at his Chambers N<sup>o</sup> 11. in Lincoln's Inn, or to Mr. Thomas Le Heup his Assistant, at his Chambers N<sup>o</sup> 13. in Lincoln's Inn, for their Guidance, and as a Cheque in the Payment of the Rewards due on such Certificates: And to the End that these Directions may have their intended Effect, it is hereby further ordered, that the said Recompence shall not be paid upon any such Certificates, until fourteen Days after such List or Lists shall be received by the said Solicitor of the Treasury or his said Assistant; and that no Certificates be paid by the said Solicitor or his said Assistant, but such only as are included in the said Lists.

That every Justice of the Peace, and Commissioner of the Land Tax, before the granting of such Certificates, do examine upon Oath the Person or Persons claiming such Rewards, and applying for such Certificates, very strictly, whether he, she or they, or any other Person or Persons, for or on his, her, or their Behalf, have not before obtained any Certificate or Certificates for such Rewards for the same Cattle, and do thereupon mention in the Certificates, that such Oath hath been made, and such Examination taken: And if the said Justices of the Peace, or Commissioners of the Land Tax, find just Reason to apprehend, that there is any Fraud or Collusion with regard to the said Cattle, or that the Cattle so Infected were brought into any Infected Place contrary to the Intent and Meaning of his Majesty's said former Orders in Council for preventing the Spreading the Infection, or that they had before obtained any Certificate for the same, that then, and in every such Case, they do refuse granting any such Certificates.

And whereas notwithstanding his Majesty did, by his said former Orders in Council, require, that all Persons thereby empowered to grant Certificates for any of the Purposes therein mentioned, should grant the same gratis; yet it hath been represented to his Majesty, that several of the Justices of the Peace and qualified Commissioners of the Land Tax, have suffered their Clerks to take Money of the unfortunate Sufferers for granting such Certificates; His Majesty taking the same into Consideration, and having a tender Regard and Compassion for the said poor Sufferers, doth declare himself highly displeas'd therewith; and doth, by and with the Advice of his Privy Council, hereby order and

command, That the said Justices of the Peace, and Commissioners of the Land Tax empowered to grant such Certificates, do grant the same gratis, pursuant to the Directions of the Act pass'd in the last Session of the last Parliament; and that they do not suffer their Clerks, under any Pretence whatsoever, to take any Fee or Reward for making out such Certificates, or for any Acts done in relation thereto; and that neither such Clerks, or any other Person or Persons any way employed or concerned in the Issuing such Certificates, do presume to ask, demand, receive or take any Fee, Reward, Gratuity, or Sum of Money whatsoever, under Pretence of making out such Certificates, or for any Act or Thing done in relation thereto; and that the like Directions be observed in granting all other Certificates required to be given by his Majesty's said former Orders in Council relating to the Distemper'd Cattle.

And whereas Information hath been given, that some of the Agents in London, employed by the Sufferers to receive the Rewards payable on such Certificates, have endeavoured to impose upon the said Sufferers, by charging Money as paid to the Clerks of the Solicitor of the Treasury or his Assistant, by way of Recompence or Reward for paying the same, with an Intent to make a fraudulent Gain for themselves; and it having appeared, after due Enquiry made, that the Solicitor of the Treasury, his Assistant, or Clerks, have not, in any case, taken, or received any Fee or Gratuity on Payment of the said Rewards, in any Manner whatsoever;— It is therefore thought proper, for the Information of the said Sufferers, to make the same known to them, as likewise, that all Certificates duly granted by the said Justices and Commissioners of the Land Tax, will be answered and paid in like Manner as they have hitherto been, without any Fee, Deduction, or Gratuity whatsoever.

And for the better preventing the spreading of the said Infection, his Majesty doth hereby order, That no Ox, Bull, Cow, Calf, Steer, or Heifer, whether fat or lean, nor any Hide or Skin of such Beasts, be suffered to pass the River Mersey Northwards, until his Majesty's Pleasure be further signified; and for that Purpose, his Majesty's Justices of the Peace, as also the Commissioners of the Land Tax qualified as aforesaid, of the Counties, Hundreds, Ridings, and Divisions through which the said River runs, are hereby required to cause strict Watch to be constantly kept, to guard all the Bridges, Fords, Boats and Ferries upon the said River, and to carry all Offenders herein before the next Justice of the Peace, or Commissioner of the Land Tax as aforesaid, to be dealt with according to Law.

That no Ox, Bull, Cow, Calf, Steer, or Heifer, either fat or lean, shall be driven or removed but between the Hours of Six in the Morning, and Six in the Evening.

And his Majesty doth hereby strictly charge and command all the Justices of the Peace, and Commissioners of the Land Tax, to hold a Meeting once a Fortnight at least within their respective Divisions, of the Counties where the said Distemper rages, and strictly and punctually to perform and execute, all and every the Matters and Things required of them by the Acts of Parliament relating to the distemper'd Cattle,

Cattle, and also by his Majesty's Orders in Council of the Eighteenth of June, and Eighth of September last, and also by this present Order; particularly with regard to the killing and burying the Cattle, under Pain of his Majesty's highest Displeasure: And that they do levy the Penalties inflicted by Law on all such who shall transgress any of the Rules and Regulations contained therein; and do not fail to transmit an Account of their Proceedings from Time to Time, to the Lords of his Majesty's most Honourable Privy Council, as they will answer the contrary.

And for the better notifying of this Order, it is his Majesty's Pleasure that the same be forthwith printed and published, and be also inserted in the next London Gazette, and be likewise read, together with the said former Orders of Council, in all Parish Churches, Chapels and other Places set apart for Divine Worship, on such Sunday in every Calendar Month as the Minister of such Parish shall think proper, agreeable to what is required by an Act passed in the last Session of the last Parliament.

His Majesty's Ship the Centurion, Captain Peter Denis, Commander, arrived Yesterday at Spithead, with the Walpole, Pelham, and Augusta East India Ships, and Trade from Lisbon. On the 19th of last Month he fell in with seven Sail of the scatter'd French West India Fleet, in the Latitude of 41° 00' N. 120 Leagues West of Lisbon, and took three of them. On the 20th he saw eight more of the said Fleet, and took four. On the 30th he retook the Allen from Pensilvania, laden with Tobacco for London, which had been taken by the Grand Biche Privateer, and was carrying into Morlaix. Captain Denis has brought in five of the Prizes and the retaken Ship, the other two having parted Company with him in squally Weather off the Lizard.
