The King's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS his Majesty was pleased, by his Order in Council of the Twenty Third of January last, to direct, That all the Rules and Regulations therein referred to, which have been made by his Majesty in Council relating to the Distemper'd Cattle, should continue and remain in Force for the Space of One Calendar Month, from the First Day of this Instant February:— And whereas the said Term of One Month will expire on the First Day of March next;— His Majesty doth therefore hereby order, with the Advice of his Privy Council, That all the said Rules and Regulations do continue and remain in full Force for the Space of Fourteen Days, to commence upon the said First Day of March next. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

Venice, Feb. 16, N. S. There is just arrived in this Port, on board a Venetian Ship come from Alexandria, Mr. Peisley, a Supercargo of the East India Company, who having lost his Passage, came from Bombay to Aleppo by Land; by whom we learn, that he left India in April last, when they had received Advice, that Commodore Griffin, with 15 Ships of War fitted out at Bengal, was arrived before Pondicherry. The Day that Mr. Peisley left Surat, they intercepted a Packet designed for the French Commander, by which they discovered the Stations of their Men of War, as also that they were starving at Pondicherry for Want of Provisions, particularly Rice, which was not to be procured at any Price. They had sent four Ships on the Malabar Coast for Provisions, which were still at Myhim at the Time the English Ships came before Pondicherry.

St. James's, February 24.

This Day Signior Grossatesta, Minister from the Duke of Modena, had his first private Audience of his Majesty, to deliver his Letters of Credence; to which he was introduced by his Grace the Duke of Bedford, one of his Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and conducted by Sir Clement Cottrell Dormer, Kt. Master of the Ceremonies.

On Wednesday Morning last his Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland set out from St. James's for Harwich, there to embark on board the Fubbs Yacht for Holland; and by an Express arrived late last Night, his Royal Highness sail'd about One Yesterday in the Afternoon with a fair Wind.

There are certain Advices come here from some Captains of his Majesty's Cruizing Ships

that are put into Port, that the Magnanime, a French Ship of War of 74 Guns and 700 Men, commanded by the Chevalier D'Albert, Chef d'Escadre, being taken by his Majesty's Ship the Nottingham of 60 Guns, commanded by Captain Harland, and the Portland of 50 Guns, commanded by Captain Stevens; but neither those Ships, nor the Prize being yet come into Port, farther Particulars are expected.
