*Hambourg, April 16, N. S.*

**B**Y our last Advices from Rostock, the Magistrates, not being inclined to confirm the Conditions which they pretend were extorted from them, and which they had seem'd to assent to; only to prevent the Consequences they were threatened with from a publick Commotion, the Mob rose again on the 10th Instant; and the Prince then finding that Measures of Lenity would not carry his Cause, has taken Possession of the Customs, Books of Entry, &c. and these Misunderstandings will in all Probability be driven to great Lengths. The new Taxes, laid so heavily upon the Subjects of Sweden, have made the Sufferers desperate in many Places; near Upsal one of the Tax-Gatherers has been killed, and the Bailiff of that District obliged to raise it in Person, with the Assistance of a Detachment of Dragoons.

*Liege, April 16, N. S.* The French have not advanced so fast as they expected, for Want of Boats and Horses. Marshal Saxe is very impatient at this Delay, and sends Order after Order to hasten them. He hath ordered a vast Quantity of Pallisadoes from Namur, which, it is supposed, he intends to place on the Intrenchments which he is making about his Camp; and hath three Bridges of Pontons below Maestricht, and two others of Boats between Viset and that Town, though that nearest Liege will not be finished till To-morrow. On the 12th Instant 200 Waggon's went from Namur, loaded with all Sorts of Ammunition,

to the Marshal's Camp, by the Rottian Causeway. The 14th, thirteen Pieces of 12 Pound Ball, six of 16, and 20 Mortars, set out for Louvain; to be sent from thence, as is given out, to the Camp before Maestricht, by the Causeway. To-day they expect 65 Boats from Metz and Verdun with Provisions, &c. which, when unloaded, will serve to finish the second Bridge. Of 80 Battering Cannon for the Siege, only 13 are yet arrived, but the rest are hourly expected. They have landed Bullets, Shells, Grenadoes, Mortars, Shovels, &c. which were in Part conveyed Yesterday to Tongres. M. Lowendahl sent Yesterday to demand 20 Pieces of heavy Cannon for his Attack, and the 13 which were arrived were sent to him, and probably he will have the rest at Viset To-day; but it is computed that the Train will not arrive in the Marshal's Camp before Friday. Eight hundred Artillery Horses arrived last Night to draw the Cannon.

*Liege, April 19, N. S.* The French opened the Trenches before Maestricht in the Night between the 15th and 16th, about 300 Toises from the Cover'd Way. They form'd three Attacks, one between the Gate of Tongres and Bois-le-duc, commanded by Marshal Saxe; another at Wyck, under M. de Lowendahl; and the third at St. Peter's Fort, commanded by the Marquis de Brézé. Last Night between Ten and Eleven the Garrison of Maestricht sallied out upon the Attack made by the French at the Gate of Tongres, which was attended with great Success. Part of the Trenches was filled

up, and two Batteries, which were this Day to play, were destroyed, the Cannon rendered unfit for Service, and the French lost at least 600 Men. The Loss of the Garrison amounted to about 200 Men. The French confess that the Fire from the Garrison is very brisk, well directed, and annoys them much.

*Head Quarters at Hellinrouch, April 18, N. S.* The Accounts we have of the Enemy are, that Marshal Saxe has his Head Quarters at Hoechten, and has taken his Position from thence to Billen, and invests Maestricht as far as the Jaar. M. de Brezé, with a Corps of about 8 or 9000 Men, is posted between the Jaar and the Meuse, and M. de Lowendahl is at Burgharen; Part of his Corps fronts the Geul, and the rest invests the Place on the Wyck Side. Last Night a Detachment from the Enemy's Army, consisting of 300 Horse, and as many Foot, who were designed to march to Sittart, were attack'd on their Retreat to their Camp, by General Baroniai, who made 117 Prisoners, of which five are Officers; there were also a great Number killed. Lord Albemarle arrived Yesterday at Venlo, and will arrive here the 20th. The Enemy seem to design to form one Attack on the Wyck Side, and another between the Port of Tongres and that of Bois-le-duc. The Trenches were open'd in the Night between the 15th and 16th. They expected some Cannon and Mortars as last Night, and that they should fire to Day, but it is thought they will not be ready before the 20th.

*Hellinrouch, April 22, N. S.* A Letter from Maestricht of the 19th gives a very favourable Account of the Disposition of the Garrison and Governor of that Place. A Sally has been made with a great Number of Men under the Command of the Prince d'Aremberg, which was attended with very good Success, a Battery of the Enemy having been destroyed, and 120 Yards of the Trenches filled up. It is reported that the Loss of the Enemy was very considerable; and Advices from Liege mention, that 80 Waggons of wounded Men had been sent to their Hospital. Lord Albemarle is arrived here with nine British Battalions and four Regiments of Dragoons, four Austrian Battalions, and

the whole British Train, and lost but five Men upon the March.

*Hague, April 19, N. S.* The Prince of Orange's Field Equipages have been all sent to Breda; but the Day that his Highness purposes to put himself at the Head of his Army is not certain; but the Troops were to encamp as this Day at Leur, to the Number of fifty Battalions; the Number of Squadrons are not mentioned. The Horse Guards marched from hence this Morning to join them, but the Remainder of the Foot Guards have not yet received any Orders to march, and it is thought they are to continue here till the Regiment of Swiss Guards, which is now forming at Delft, is compleated, and ready to come to this Place. By the last Letters from Bois-le-duc, the Prince of Swartzemberg's Troops were arrived there, to the Number of 680 Men.

*Aix la Chapelle, April 21, N. S.* The Spanish and Genoese Ministers are arrived here.

Whereas William Gray and Thomas Kemp, two notorious Smugglers, forcibly made their Escape out of Newgate on Wednesday the 30th of March last, about Eight o'Clock at Night, with the Assistance of some other Persons, by knocking down the Turnkey and one of his Assistants with Pistols and Broomsticks.

William Gray is about Twenty six Years of Age, a well made Man, Five Feet eight or nine Inches high, of a fair Complexion and fresh Colour, and has lost the Thumb of his Left Hand; when he made his Escape he had on a light Russian Frock, and a strip'd Lapel Waistcoat.

Thomas Kemp, about the same Age, is a thin made Man, Five Feet eight or nine Inches high, of a fair Complexion, or little Pock-fretten and fresh Colour, Cape Goat and grizzle Peruke.

For the better discovering and bringing to Justice the said Gray and Kemp, the Commissioners of his Majesty's Customs do hereby promise a Reward of One hundred Pounds for the discovering and apprehending either of the said Persons (upon and above the Reward of Fifty Pounds offered by the Keeper of Newgate) to be paid by the Receiver General and Cashier of the Customs, upon their being apprehended and committed to Goal.
