THE Difficulties which have occur'd in the Execution of the Plan offer'd for making good the Deficiency occasion'd in the Revenue of this Province, by the Suppression of the Farms, are not yet removed; and the Town of Amsterdam continues to oppose the Method, according to which it is proposed to levy, provisionally, the Quotas of the several Towns. It seems their chief Objection to this Plan is, that the Magistrates are to be empowered to distrain in Default of Payment, and that they themselves will likewise be liable to be distrain'd, in case they don't remit to the publick Treasure, at the End of every Month, the Quotas of their several Districts. The Deputies of Dort having inform'd the States of Holland that a Post Office was become vacant in their Town, and the Grand Pensionary having also acquainted them, that there was likewise one vacant at the Hague, they have been desired to give their Orders in Consequence of these two Vacancies; and a Resolution has been taken, by which they empower the Burgher-masters and Magistrates of those several Towns, where the Post Offices, when vacant, are to revert to the Province, to manage those Offices, or cause them to be administer'd for the Use of the Province, provisionally, and till such Time as the States are come to a final Determination in regard to this Affair. The States have taken a Resolution, whereby they appoint the first Day of their Meeting in September next for the Reception of the Lists which the Deputies of the Towns were formerly directed to lay before them, of all the Employments in the Disposall of their respective Regencies.
