THE King has been pleased to appoint Sir Thomas Robinson, his Majesty's Minister Plenipotentiary at the Court of Vienna, to be joint Plenipotentiary with the Earl of Sandwich at the Congress at Aix la Chapelle. And also to appoint Richard Leveson Gower and Edward Wortley Montagu, Esqrs, to execute the Office of his Majesty's Secretary at the said Congress.

Brussels, July 31, N. S. Advertisements having been put up in the publick Places, that the Wood, which the French have at Rupelmonde, and that which they had designed to build Boats and Gallies with, as well as what had been cut down in the Wood of Soignies, will be exposed to Sale some Time next Month, it is apprehended that they will soon evacuate the Conquer'd Countries. The Regiments of Vincens Infantry, which is here in Garrison, will march on Sunday towards Dunkirk; in order to rejoin the Battalion which has been in Garrison there since last Winter. The fourth Battalion of the Regiment de la Couronne will set out the 8th of next Month, in order to rejoin their Regiment, which is in Garrison at Lille. And the Royal Regiment, which is at Arcos, will begin its March the 10th following, to rejoin the fourth Battalion which is at Ypres. It is assured, that when they are all rejoined, there will be a Reform in all the French Regiments.

Hague, August 2, N. S. There are Letters from Provence, which mention, that the English Fleet had anchored before Villa Franca and Nice, and that Marshal Bellisle had given an elegant Entertainment to all the Officers thereof. It is confidently said, that the King of Sardinia's Army had repassed the Var, and that the Cavalry was to return upon the Rhone and into the Vivares. The French King, we hear, will confirm to Marshal Saxe the Title of Governor General of the Low Countries, and that, in Consequence thereof, he will have fifty Guards in the same Manner as one of the Princes of the Blood. Orders have been sent from Madrid to Barcelona, to prepare Quarters for the Troops which composed the Army of the Infant Don Philip. The Walloon and Spanish Guards, with Part of the Cavalry, will be soon in Languedoc, if they are not already arrived there. An Express has been sent to Cadix for the Register Ship la Reine, to sail immediately with Orders to Mr Reggio at the Havanna, to return

to Europe with his Squadron, and to bring the Treasure on board it, as soon as the Cessation of Hostilities shall take Place. The same Ship will also carry the like Orders to the Ships at La Vera Cruz, Lima, and Carthagena, as well as to the other Places in the Indies.
