Whitehall, October 22.

**L**AST Night a Courier arrived here from Aix la Chapelle, with an Account, that the Plenipotentiaries of his Catholick Majesty had acceded, on the 20th Instant, N. S. to the Definitive Treaty of Peace; those of the Empress Queen on the 23d; the Duke of Modena's on the 25th; and the Accessions of the Sardinian and Genoese Plenipotentiaries were soon expected.

*Hague, Oct. 22, N. S.* Last Sunday Evening M. Tulleken arrived here Express from Aix la Chapelle, with the News, that the Definitive Treaty was signed there the 18th Instant. This most welcome News was receiv'd by all Degrees of People with the greatest Demonstrations of Joy: And Yesterday the Prince of Orange went to the Assembly of the States General, where his Highness acquainted their High Mightinesses with the Conclusion of this important Negotiation, and communicated to them, at the same Time, the Treaty of Peace. His Highness purposes to set out To-morrow for Breda, and to return to this Place towards the Beginning of next Week. Mess. de Catwyck and Pauw, (the Prince Stadtholder's Commissaries) changed last Friday the Regency of Leyden, where every Thing seems at present pretty quiet. And Yesterday in the Evening those two Gentlemen set out for Rotterdam, in order to make some Alterations likewise in the Magistracy of that Town. M. de Haren, one of their High Mightinesses Plenipotentiaries at Aix la Chapelle, is expected here towards the latter End of this Week.

*Hague, Oct. 25, N. S.* The States General have taken a Resolution, according to which, the Deserters from the Troops of the Republick are not, for the future, to be punish'd with Death, but to be fetter'd for Life, and, in that Condition, to work at the Fortifications; and in case there should be no Work of that Sort to employ them in, they are to be closely confined. Such however as shall abandon their Posts, or desert to the Enemy from a Besieged Town, or from the Army on a March, or any other Occasion, or whose Desertion may be attended with any other aggravating Circumstances, are still to be liable to be punish'd with Death. Mess. de Catwyck and Pauw returned to this Place last Night, after having changed the Regency of Rotterdam; in Consequence of which, four of the old Burgo-masters and the Grand Bailiff have

been dismissed. The Prince of Orange set out on Wednesday Evening for the Head Quarters of the Dutch Army at Walwyck. M. de Haren, one of their High Mightinesses Plenipotentiaries, arrived here last Night from Aix la Chapelle. And this Morning an Express arrived from the same Place, with the Accession of the Courts of Vienna and Madrid to the Definitive Treaty.

*Hague, Oct. 29, N. S.* According to the Accounts we have received from Rotterdam, the People of that Town are very far from being contented with the Change that has been made in their Regency, several Gentlemen having been continued in their Employments, who have incur'd the Displeasure of the Populace. The Prince of Orange's Commissaries set out again on Saturday Morning for Tergau, where they are also to change the Regency: From thence they are to go to Gorcum, and then to Dort, where the Burghers have likewise drawn up a Petition against their Magistrates. A Resolution has been taken to disband the Waart Gelders or Militia, that were raised last Year; and, in Consequence thereof, those belonging to this Place are lately return'd hither. We are inform'd that the Prince of Orange, after reviewing the Dutch Army, and giving Orders for their Separation, set out for Eindhoven, in order to pay a Visit to his Royal Highness the Duke. The Earl of Sandwich, who was expected here last Night, is not yet arrived.

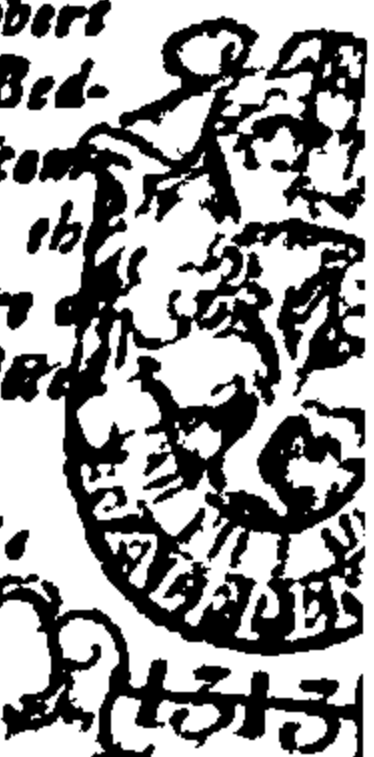

Whereas divers evil-disposed Persons have, for some Time past, made a Practice of filing Guineas, and dispersing the same; and for the apprehending of the Offenders therein, their Excellencies the Lords Justices have been pleased to promise a Reward of One Hundred Pounds (over and above the Reward allowed by Act of Parliament) to any Person or Persons, who shall apprehend and take any Person or Persons concerned in filing and diminishing of Guineas, so as he, she, or they be thereof convicted: And whereas Samuel Davies and Joseph Mapham, against whom Informations have been taken upon Oath, have, since the above Discoveries, absconded from their Habitation, the Sign of the Bull and Butcher in West Smithfield; on searching which said House, was found in a Bureau belonging to the said Samuel Davies, Tools and other Instruments for filing of Guineas; with a large Quantity of Filings of Gold Coin.

Samuel Davies was born at Wrexham, served his Apprenticeship at Liverpool, well known at Thame in Oxfordshire, and kept a Butcher's Shop for some Years in German-street St. James's. He is a black Man, about five Foot ten Inches high, has a down cast Look, and had on, at the Time he absconded, an old white Wig, a Fustian Frock with Plate Buttons, a blue and white striped Waistcoat, black Breeches, light colour'd Stockings, with large Silver Buckles in his Shoes, and is about fifty Years of Age.

Joseph Mapham (by Trade an Inlayer in Tortoiseshell,) was born in Newgate Market, and for some Years was a Green Grocer there: He is about sixty Years of Age, of a fair Complexion, has a long Nose, and Chin, is about five Foot seven Inches high, walks very lame, and had on, when he absconded, an old white Wig, and light coloured Coat and Breeches.

And whereas Informations have been taken against the following Persons for being concerned with others in filing and diminishing such Guineas, as aforesaid, as also the Portugal Gold Coin, to wit, Usher Gabagan, Bryan Duff, John Fullham, Mary Dean alias Harrison, and Margaret Rutherford, who have all lately absconded.

Usher Gabagan, born in Ireland, about five Foot six Inches high, a slender bodied Man, and pale faced, about Thirty-five Years old, Author of Latin Poems on Pope's Criticisms; and had on, when he absconded, a dark brown Lapelle Coat with yellow Buttons, and a Silver lac'd Hat; well known about Chancery Lane, and the Inns of Court Temple Bar; and lodged last with Hugh Coffy, in Dorset Court Fleet-street.

Bryan Duff, born in Ireland, a middle sized Man, full bodied, has a round plump Face, of a ruddy Complexion, and has a brisk Eye; is about thirty Years of Age, and generally wore a light brown Coat with yellow

low Metal Buttons, and a Scarlet Waistcoat; he lived Servant to a Gentleman in Charges-street Piccadilly, and Charles-street St. James's, and lodged last at the Red Lion in King-street Golden Square.

John Fullham, born in Ireland, of low Stature, has a very round Face, and a ruddy Complexion; generally wore a blue grey Coat with yellow Metal Buttons; went for a Lawyer, and lodged last in Ram Alley Fleet-street.

Mary Dean alias Harrison, born in Cheshire, is between forty and fifty Years of Age, lived many Years in Dublin, and well known at Liverpool, is a Dealer in Irish Stuffs: She is a middle-sized Woman, has a large Scar in the Left Side of her Neck just below her Hair, a Swelling in one of her Knees, and walks lame; well known in Green Harbour-Court near the Golden Hind, Moorfields, and lodged last in Sedwick's Rents near Moor-Gate.

Margaret Rutherford alias Mary Foster, (born in Ireland) Wife of Robert Rutherford, of Sir John Ligonier's Regiment, is a tall jolly Woman, between thirty and forty Years old, is pitted with the Small Pox, has grey Eyes, and a remarkable Dent at the End of one of her Thumbs; is by Trade a Mantua-maker and Dealer in Irish Stuffs, well known about Temple-Bar, and the Villages round London, and lodged last in Bow-Lane, Cheapside.
