The vigorous Measures your Majesty took to procure National Justice, when a War was absolutely necessary; and your Readiness to accept honourable Terms of Peace when offered, are the strongest Instances of strict Regard for the Honour of your British Subjects, as well as Candour and Compassion for your Enemies.

The Regard your Majesty has paid to your Allies, and the quick Dispatch you have made in perfecting an Honourable Peace, must be pleasing to every one that has the least Sense of your Majesty's Wisdom and Prudence.
