TH E following Address of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Citizens of the City of Bath, has been presented to his Majesty by Sir John Ligonier, one of their Representatives in Parliament, being introduced by the Right Honourable the Lord Ashburnham, one of the Lords of his Majesty's Bed-chamber in Waiting: Which Address his Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

May it please your Majesty,

WE your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Mayor, Aldermen, and Citizens of your Majesty's ancient City of Bath, beg Leave, in the sincerest Manner, to congratulate your Majesty on your safe Return to these your British Dominions.

We cannot, upon this Occasion, omit to express our great Joy, in seeing this long and burthensome War, through your Majesty's Care and Wisdom, happily brought to a Conclusion. An Event that affords the most pleasing and promising Prospect to your Majesty's Subjects in general, and to this your dutiful Corporation in particular, as it must contribute to the Ease and Tranquility of your Majesty's Reign, and to the Happiness and Prosperity of your People.

We beg Leave to offer our ardent Wishes, that your Majesty may enjoy a long and happy Reign; and that the Crown may continue in your Royal Issue, as the best Guardians of our Religious and Civil Liberties, to the latest Posterity. In Testimony whereof we have hereunto set our common Seal, the 4th Day of January, 1748.

Copenhagen, Jan. 18, N. S. Lieutenant Colonel Hauch, of the Regiment of Falster, has been dispatched to Norway, with Orders, as it is supposed, to prepare the Troops there for the Arrival of his Danish Majesty, who intends to visit that Kingdom next Spring, as soon as the Weather will permit. The Spanish Minister having presented to the King of Denmark a Letter from the Queen Dowager of Spain, notifying the Death of her Mother, the Court goes into Mourning To-morrow for a Fortnight upon that Account. The Queen of Denmark continues still in perfect Health, and as the Time of her Majesty's reckoning is now said to be fulfilled, we are daily expecting her happy Delivery.

Hague, Jan. 21, N. S. The Earl of Sandwich left this Place Yesterday, in order to embark as this Day at Helvoetsluys on board one of his Majesty's Yachts. M. van Hoey presented Yesterday a Memorial to the States-General, desiring to be recalled from his Embassy to the French Court, and that he may be allowed to take his Leave of the King of France by way of Memorial. Their High Mightinesses agreed to his Request. The 12th of February, N. S. is appointed for the Departure of the Bavarian Troops which have been in the Service of the Republick. The Detachments of Dutch and Swiss Guards, which have been quartered at Leyden since the late Commotions there, are returned to the Hague, having been replaced at Leyden by Detachments from other Regiments of Foot which lay in that Neighbourhood. A dreadful Fire happened last Week at Flushing, which consumed the Arsenal, the Prince of Orange's House, the great Church, and a considerable Part of the Town.

Antwerp, Jan. 23, N. S. Sir Thomas Robinson intends to set out To-morrow for Calais, to embark there for England.

Hambourg, Jan. 24, N. S. Count Dehn, who is appointed the Danish Envoy to Holland, is arrived here, but has obtained Leave to make some Stay here and at Brunswick, upon Account of his private Affairs, before he proceeds to the Hague.

Liege, Jan. 25, N. S. The Austrian Troops took Possession of Tirlmont on the 23d Instant; and by an Express just arrived, there is Advice, that they entered Louvain this Morning. It is expected that Brussels will be delivered up on Tuesday next.

Hague, Jan. 28, N. S. The Earl of Albemarle set out this Day for Willemstadt.

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valuable Things were taken away: And whereas two of the Watchmen of the said Parish were wounded in a very dangerous Manner, by endeavouring to apprehend the Persons concerned in the said Burglary: His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the said Burglary and Robbery, is pleased to promise his most-gracious Pardon to any one of them, who shall discover his Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that he or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

Whereas it has been represented to the King, That Richard Hawkins, late of Yapton in the County of Sussex, Labourer, being, some Time in the Month of January last, at Work in a Barn near the said Parish, was forcibly taken from thence by Jeremiab Curtis, alias Butler, late of Hawkhurst in the County of Kent, and John Mills, alias Smoaker, of Trotton in the County of Sussex, Labourer, and was by them carried into a Back Room in the Dog and Partridge Alehouse on Slinden Common; where Thomas Winter alias Coachman, alias Kentish Coachman, of Postling near Hythe, in the County of Kent, Farmer; and a Person called Rob, otherwise Little Fat Back, Servant to Jere. Curtis, which said Rob lives at or near East Grinstead, and is Brother to a Person living there, known by the Name of the Cackler, were waiting for them: In which Room they detained the said Richard Hawkins till about Twelve o'Clock at Night; when the said Jeremiab Curtis, John Mills, Rob, and Thomas Winter went away, and took with them the said Richard Hawkins; who was not afterwards seen or heard of till his Body was found in a Pond in Parham Park, in the said County of Sussex: That the Coroner's Inquest having sat upon the said Body, found it to be the Body of the said Richard Hawkins, and brought in their Verdict, Wilful Murder by Persons unknown.

And whereas it has been further represented to the King, That several Murders, Burglaries and Robberies have been lately committed in the County of Sussex; and that there is the strongest Reason to believe, that the said Jeremiab Curtis, John Mills, Rob, and Thomas Winter, were the Authors of the said Murder: His Majesty, for the better apprehending and bringing to Justice the abovesaid Persons, as well as for discouraging such horrid and barbarous Outrages, is

pleased to promise his most gracious Pardon to any Person who shall apprehend, or, by giving Information, shall cause to be apprehended, so as he or they be convicted thereof, any one or more of the said Offenders; notwithstanding the Person making such Discovery shall now stand outlawed for not having surrendered himself to Justice, pursuant to Notice given in the London Gazette; provided that such Person shall not appear to have been concerned in the abovesaid Murder, or any other Murder; or to have been concern'd in the breaking open his Majesty's Warehouse at Pool.
