WE your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Provost, Fellows and Scholars of the College of the Holy and Undivided Trinity of Queen Elizabeth near Dublin, beg Leave to congratulate your Majesty on your safe and happy Return to these Kingdoms.

We acknowledge, with the highest Sense of Gratitude, that through the whole Course of your Majesty's Reign, the Interest and Honour of your Subjects have been the invariable Rule of your Administration; and your Majesty's late paternal Care and Wisdom, in the successful Restoration of the publick Tranquility, give us the strongest Assurances of your tender Regard for the Happiness of your People.

By your Majesty's unwearied Labours, Europe enjoys the inestimable Blessings of Peace; and we may with the utmost Confidence expect, that under your gracious Protection Arts and Sciences will flourish, Trade and Commerce be further extended, and these Nations be render'd more distinguish'd and glorious.

May it please your Majesty,

WE the Lord Mayor, Sheriffs, Commons and Citizens of the City of Dublin, most humbly beg Leave to congratulate your Majesty on your safe Arrival in Great Britain, and on the Conclusion of a Peace, advantageous to your Subjects, and satisfactory to your Allies.

Princes may glory in attempting to extend their Dominions at the Expence of the Blood and Treasure of their Subjects; your Majesty, studious of the Happiness of your People, can only be prevailed on to enter into a War for the Preservation of their Liberty and Commerce; and when the End of such a just War, the Independency of your Kingdoms, and the Preservation of the Balance of Power in Europe can be obtained, your Majesty inclines to Peace.
