Copenhagen, July 15, N. S.

THE King of Denmark, who put to Sea on the 11th Instant, arrived in the Sound on the 13th about Three o'Clock in the Afternoon, and went directly to Friedensburg, where the Queen resides.

Copenhagen, July 19, N. S. The Queen of Denmark was Yesterday so well recovered from her late Indisposition, that her Majesty proposed to take the Air this Afternoon if the Weather permits. Colonel Paurneind is appointed to succeed the late Governor Walter, in the Post of Commandant of the Citadel of Copenhagen; and young Count Larwig, of the Foot Guards, has Colonel Paurneind's Regiment, and the Government of Rendsburg is conferred upon Lieutenant General Dombroick.

Bern, July 20, N. S. All the inferior Courts of Justice in this Capital continue shut, and the Supreme Council have been wholly taken up in reading the Examinations, and in passing Sentence upon three of the principal Persons concerned in the late Conspiracy, which was accordingly done on Wednesday last, and they were all beheaded the next Morning, with this Difference, that the Lieutenant of the Garrison had his Right Hand cut off before he lost his Head. As it was apprehended that the Populace intended a Rescue, two Companies of Dragoons, a strong Detachment of the Militia in the Neighbourhood, and another of the Garrison, were ordered, contrary to Custom, to guard the Criminals to the Place of Execution; but no Disturbance happened. Twenty other Persons remain still confined.

Paris, July 28, N. S. Wednesday next is fixed for his Excellency the Earl of Albemarle's Audience of his most Christian Majesty at Compiègne; for which Place his Excellency is to set out To-morrow Morning.

Whitehall, July 25.

The King has been pleased to grant unto Dudley Baxter, Esq; the Offices of Solicitor,

THE Tripoli Ambassador, from his natural Inclination to Justice, having freely and voluntarily passed from the Privilege his Excellency was and is intitled to, of protecting his Domesticks and Servants from Arrests for Debts, and having signified this his Resolution, first, by giving Notice to the Publick, by several Advertisements in the Daily Advertiser; and afterwards, when some of his Servants had been seduced by some idle and disorderly People, and carried to Houses of bad Repute and great Expence, and fearing they should contract Debts, he, in farther Manifestation of his firm Resolution not to protect such Servants, did, by the said Daily Advertiser of the 9th of September 1748, acquaint the Publick, that he would not protect any of his said Servants from any Arrests or Proceedings of Law on Account of their just and lawful Debts, or otherwise. Notwithstanding of which Indulgence, certain Persons have most industriously employed themselves, in going from House to House, to find out the said Servants Debts, and have advised the Creditors to draw up a Petition, which they have laid before his Grace the Duke of Bedford, one of his Majesty's Principal Secretary of State, complaining that his Excellency owed them the several Sums therein mentioned, whereby they have most falsely and wrongfully injured the Honour and Character of the said Tripoli Ambassador, and made false Representations to the said Secretary of State. Therefore Notice is hereby given to the said Persons, that if they shall not make it appear, within eight Days from the Date hereof, that the said Ambassador owes
