Naples, July 22, N. S.

ON the 9th instant their Majesties, with the young Prince and Princesses, attended by their respective Courtiers and Guards, returned to this City from Portici: And the Queen has since declared herself to be four Months gone with Child. Orders from the King have been sent to the Banks of this City, not to dispose of any Spanish Pistoles, Moidores, nor the Pope's Zekeens, which he designs to have melted into Money of his own Coin.

Barcelona, August 3, N. S. An English Ship named the Alexander, John Ker, Master, arrived here this Week from the Adriatick Sea, laden with Spanish Artillery, which was brought down the River Po. The Master of her reports, that another English Ship is freighted to bring down the rest, which are all to be deposited in this Arsenal.

Bern, August 7, N. S. Yesterday Morning two Persons, concerned in the late Conspiracy, were tried and condemned to perpetual Banishment; and this Morning seven others received Sentence of Banishment, four for Life, one for twenty Years, one for ten, and the other for four. A Scheme is on Foot for augmenting the Garrison of this Town to the Number of six hundred Men.

Paris, Aug. 15, N. S. Marshal Saxe returned to this City the Night before last from Germany.
