## A P R O C L A M A T I O N.

*George Armagh, Newport, C.*

**W**HEREAS his Majesty hath signified unto us his Royal Pleasure, that the Parliament of this Kingdom, which now stands prorogued unto Tuesday the Twenty-ninth Day of August instant, be further prorogued unto Tuesday the Tenth Day of October next; then to meet and to sit for the Dispatch of Business; We do therefore publish and declare, That the said Parliament be, and accordingly the said Parliament is, hereby further prorogued unto Tuesday the Tenth Day of October next; and that the same shall be then held at Dublin, and sit for the Dispatch of Business: Whereof the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Commons in this present Parliament, are to take Notice, and to give their Attendance accordingly.

God Save the King.

*Naples, Aug. 12.* On the 30th past M. Amendola, one of the principal Merchants of this City, broke for the Sum of 200,000 Ducats, and on the 5th Instant Part of his Effects, amounting to 28000 Ducats, were seized on the King's Account, he being indebted to the Treasury as Agent Victualler of the Troops. Four Grenadiers of the Regiment Royal Italian, having deserted a few Days ago, and took Refuge in a Country Church in the Diocese of the Bishop of Venabro, the Council of War ordered them immediately to be taken out, and to be put to Death; whereupon the Bishop pronounced an Excommunication against those who had given such an Order, which excited the King's Resentment so much, that he sent Orders to the Bishop to annul and set Fire to that Act, and any others he had made on that Occasion. The Court of Vienna has solicited and obtained of the Pope the Reduction of a certain Number of Festivals in the Year, for the State of Milan,

on the same footing as was granted to the Courts of Spain and Naples.

*Florence, Aug. 22.* Notwithstanding the Magistrates of Health at Naples have reduced the Quarantine of all Vessels from the Ports of Tuscany to seven Days, the Magistrates of Health at Genoa have in the last Week subjected all Vessels from Leghorne to 14 Days Quarantine.

*Stockholm, Aug. 29.* The King is so well recovered from the late severe Fit he had of the Gravel, that he often assists at Council, walks Abroad, and sometimes goes a Hunting. We hear that the Prince successor, who is on his Tour to Gottembourg, has been received with great Affection by the Inhabitants of all the Places he has passed through.

*Vienna, Aug. 30, N. S.* We learn from Belgrade, that the Commander of that Place had published a Mandate in the Name of the Grand Signior, by which the Subjects of the Port are commanded not to give the least Obstruction to the Passage of any of our Merchandize, whether by Sea or Land, nor to furnish the least Matter of Complaint from any of the Subjects of this Empire, on Pain of their making full Satisfaction for all Injuries: Which Mandate has been well received by this Court, as it shews the good Understanding that subsists between us and the Turks.

*Copenhagen, Sept. 2, N. S.* The Queen advances happily in her Pregnancy. A few Days ago two Russian Frigates arrived here from Archangel, and are since sailed for Revel, to join some Ships of War of that Nation.

*Ajchaffenburgh, Sept. 4, N. S.* His Highness the Elector of Treves arrived here on the 28th of last Month from his Abbey of El angen in Swabia; and having passed seven Days with his Nephew the Elector of Mayence, our Sovereign; his Highness set out this Morning for his Castle of Ehrenbreitstein, situate upon the Rhine opposite to Coblentz.

*Copenhagen, Sept. 6, N. S.* On Friday next the Court and Council are to be held in Town; after which his Danish Majesty returns into the Country till about the 26th of October, at which Time a Jubilee is to be celebrated in this City with great Pomp and Solemnity, upon the Completion of the third Century since the Accession of the House of Oldenburg to the Throne of Denmark.

*Brussels, Sept. 9, N. S.* Prince Charles of Lorraine is returned hither from Engheim, extremely satisfied with the Reception he met with from the Duke d'Areberg. The repairing of the Fortifications of this City, Antwerp, Ath, Mons, Namur and Charleroy, having been agreed to, 'tis said that Prince Charles will soon set out with some Engineers for that Purpose; and that the Deserters out of the Imperial Troops, great Numbers of which have been lately secured, will be sent to work at those Fortifications. Deputies from the States of Namur are arrived here, in order to solicit Prince Charles for an Abatement of the ordinary Subsidies paid by them, in Consideration of the heavy Contributions they were laid under by the French during the late War.

*Harlem, Sept. 10, N. S.* His Serene Highness the Prince Stadtholder has lately named Mess. Juste Witte, Pierre Samuel Crommelin, Jean Hesbuysen, and Jacob Deutz, Grand Bailiffs of Kennemerland, to be Burgo Masters of this City.

*Hague, Sept. 12, N. S.* His Grace the Duke of Richmond, having taken his Leave of the Prince and Princess of Orange, is set out for France. The Princess Dowager of Nassau Siegen, with the young Countess of Bentheim, are arrived here from Germany, as is also Sir Hanbury Williams; they have all been to wait on the Prince and Princess of Orange, who received them very graciously. Lord Hyndford, Minister Plenipotentiary from his Britannick Majesty, M. Ammon, Minister from the King of Prussia, and M. Dehn, Minister from the King of Denmark, have lately been in Conference with his Serene Highness the Prince Stadtholder, and with several of the Lords of the Regency. This Day was held a Council of State, in which his Serene Highness the Stadtholder assisted in Person, when several Officers, who have lately been promoted by his Highness, attended and took the Oaths for their respective Employments.

*Leicester House, September 3.*

This Day the Count de Richecourt, Minister Plenipotentiary from the Emperor and Empress Queen of Hungary, had his first private Audience of his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales. And afterwards a private Audience of her Royal Highness the Princess of Wales; to both which he was introduc'd by Sir Clement Cottrell Dormer, Kt. Master of the Ceremonies.
