*Algier, September 8.*

**T**HE Dey has named Hadge Mahomet Hodgi, one of the four principal Secretary's of his House, Ambassador to the Court of Great-Britain, and accordingly he sails this Day in a Swedish Ship, and carries with him seven Horses, three or four Tygers, some Ostriches, Antilopes, and some of the Manufactures of this Country. Six Sail, supposed to be Maltese and Spanish Ships, were off here some Days ago, as if design'd to intercept the eleven Xebèques of this Place, which were out on a Cruize, but all came in safe the 4th instant, after having ranged along the Coast of Naples, Italy, France, and Part of the Spanish Coast without any Success, except the taking of a small Genoese Settee with Corn, and a Corsican with Wood, and making 29 Slaves.

*Vienna, Sept. 27, N. S.* The Queen of Hungary has lately employed herself very much in promoting Manufactures of Linnen, Cotton, and Leather, in her hereditary Countries; great Pains have likewise been taken to make the Mines in those Countries as profitable as they possibly could to the Proprietors. The Troops encamped at Salenau are now marching into Winter Quarters, and those of Pilsen and Konigsgratz are expected to move some Day next Week.

*Vienna, October 1, N. S.* It is said that the King of Spain has named Don Antonio d'Altor, a Major General, Brother to the Count de Guara in Arragon, to be his Minister Plenipotentiary at this Court.

*Dresden, Sept. 30.* The Court intends to set out this Week for Leipfick. The Baron de Greiffenhejn, Minister from the King of Sweden, who has had his Audience of Leave, and been presented by his Majesty with a Ring set with Diamonds, will soon set out on his Re-

turn to Stockholm, from whence 'tis said he is to proceed to the Court of Russia.

*Turin, October 1, N. S.* The Marquis d'Aigne Blanche, who is appointed Envoy at the Court of Dresden, will set out from hence in about a Month's Time.

*Copenhagen, October 4, N. S.* The Marriage lately concluded between her Royal Highness the Princess Louisa of Denmark and the Duke of Saxe Hildburghausen, was celebrated on the 1st Instant at Hirschholm with great Solemnity and Magnificence. A little before the Ceremony began, his Danish Majesty conferr'd the Order of the Elephant upon the Duke. His Majesty proposes to hunt once or twice a Week in the Park at Jagersbourg as long as the Season will permit. Count Lynar set out Yesterday for Germany, in order to pursue his Journey by Land to Petersbourg.

*Berlin, October 4, N. S.* The King has nominated the Count de Newwied to be Lieutenant General. Prince Lobkowitz, accompanied by Count Asgarotti, set out on the 30th past for Silesia. The Advices lately received from Russia and Sweden, have occasioned the holding of many extraordinary Councils.

*Hamburgh, Oct. 7, N. S.* The Marquis of Grimaldi set out this Morning for Copenhagen, on his Way to Stockholm, where he is to reside as Minister Plenipotentiary from the Court of Spain, and not with the Character of Ambassador, as it had at first been said.

*Hague, October 10, N. S.* The Greffier Fagel and M. Hop, set out Yesterday Morning for the Castle of Loo, to pay a Visit to the Prince of Orange. Major Cornabe is returned from Dutch Flanders, where he has been regulating divers Affairs with the Commissaries of France. Lieutenant General Schagen, Colonel of a Regiment of Horse in this Service, died the 4th of this Month at Horn. M. Ammon, the Prussian Minister, is set out on his Return to Berlin.
