HER Imperial Majesty having received repeated Advices from Bohemia, of the great Desertions of the Troops in that Kingdom, it has been resolved to establish a Commission of General Officers, who are to deliberate upon the Means of preventing those Desertions for the Future. The Departure of the Baron de Wollzogen; Minister from the Duke of Saxe Gotha, is put off for the present, he having received fresh Instructions from the Duke his Master.

Copenhagen, Nov. 15, N. S. The King has appointed M. d'Ahrenstorff to be one of the Council of State; and M. Revenfeld to be one of the Council of Justice. The King has likewise appointed M. Bierregaard to be one of his Majesty's Chamberlains. M. de Voss, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Prussia to this Court, is daily expected here, his Equipage being already arrived.

Hambourg; Nov. 17, N. S. On the 11th Instant the Duke of Mechlenbourg was invested at Schewrin with the Order of St. Andrew; which the Empress of Russia had conferred on his Highness; and, at the Conclusion of the Ceremony, he was complimented by all the Lords of his Court, and other Persons of Distinction. The Duke and Dutchess of Saxe Hildbourghausen set out a few Days ago from Altena for Harbourg, from whence they will continue their Journey to their own Country. The Contagion amongst the Horned Cattle still continues to rage very much in Holstein and that Neighbourhood.

Paris, Nov. 17, N. S. On the 15th Instant the King set out from Fontainbleau for Choisy, from whence his Majesty returned To-day to Versailles. The Queen and all the Royal Family are likewise expected To-morrow at Versailles from Choisy. M. de St Contest, Ambassador from this Court to that of the Hague, is arrived here from Bourgogne; he is getting ready his Equipage with all Expedition, and 'tis expected he will set out towards the End of next Month. We are assured that the Project, which was presented to the Council of State, for making a Canal in Provence, has been agreed to, and that divers Regiments will be immediately employed in that Work.

Berlin, Nov. 18, N. S. On Sunday last an Express arrived at Court with Advice, that Prince Frederick William, Duke of Schleswich Holstein, Field Marshal of the King's Armies, and Governor of this City, died on the 11th Instant at Konigsbergue, in the 62d Year of his Age. The same Day Prince Maurice of Anhalt Dessau set out from hence on a Tour to Stargard.

Turin, Nov. 19, N. S. The Small Pox still continues to rage very much in this City, between 40 and 50 dying in a Week; and, till it is abated, the Royal Family will not come hither from the Venerie.

Hague, Nov. 23, N. S. The States of Holland and West Frizeland will continue their Assembly till Tuesday next. M. de Lestevenon, Lord of Berkenrode, proposes to set out in a Fortnight or three Weeks for Paris, where he is to reside in Quality of Ambassador from this State: And M. Kalkoen will set out on his Return to Dresden, with the Character of Minister Plenipotentiary from their High Mightinesses, about the same Time.
