Naples, November 11, N. S.

THE King, in Consideration of the Services done to him and to the Publick by the Marquis de Cesa, the present Eletto del Popolo, has honoured him with the Title of President, and confirmed him in the said Post for three Years longer. Last Week the King granted his Permission for the Recall, from their Banishment, of the Deputies from this City, who had incurred his Indignation by some Expressions they had made Use of in Support of their Privileges. Count Caiezza, Son to the Duke delle Serre, besides having of late been confined to the Castle for his ill Behaviour, was, on the 6th Instant, at the Request of his Father, taken up by the Bailiffs, and conducted to the common Jail. On the 10th Instant the Prince of Francavilla returned to this City from Turin.

Rome, Nov. 15, N. S. On the 31st past Cardinal Portocarrero had his first publick Audience of the Pope as Minister from the King of Spain. On the 10th Instant the French Ambassadour, his Lady, and Family, returned to this City from Frascati. On the 12th arrived here the Baggage and Domesticks of the Chevalier Cappello, the new Venetian Ambassadour to the Pope. Notwithstanding the repeated Sollicitations from this Ministry to the Republick of Bologna, to induce them to concur in the Expences to compleat the new Road, which the Regency of Florence is actually making, that Republick declines paying their Part of the Expence, which amounts to upwards of 40,000 Crowns.

Hambourg, Dec. 2, N. S. The Sieur Otte was Yesterday elected a Member of this Magistracy in the room of the deceased M. Col-dorf.
