Constantinople, October 24.

Solyman Pascha of Bassora, who formed the Blockade of Bagdat with a considerable Force, is reinstated in his Dignity, and has had the Paschelyck of the Town and Province of Babylon conferred on him by the Grand Seignor; that Prince's Second Imrchor, or Master of the Horse, is set out to carry him the Castan, and other Marks of Honour. Shawrooke Schach is in quiet Possession of the Throne of Persia, and Ibrahim Mirza is fled or destroyed.

Moscow, Nov. 20. This City seems at present very sickly, many Persons of the first Distinction being confined to their Beds by Fevers, occasioned, as 'tis imagined, by the late sudden Thaw, and the prodigious Quantity of Rain which followed it.

Venice, Nov. 26, N. S. A great Number of Recruits continue to pass by this City for Lombardy, to compleat her Imperial Majesty's Regiments in Garrison there. The two Gallies and two Galliot's of this Republick, which have been cruising for some Time past in the Adriatick Sea against the Corsairs of Barbary, are returned into Port, and are ordered by the Senate to be laid up.

Rome, Nov. 29, N. S. Several Prelates, and many Persons of Distinction are already arrived in this City, and others are continually coming in from Italy, France, Spain, Portugal, and other Catholick Countries. The Pope has named Father Palombara, of the University of Padoue, to the Bishoprick of Terracine.

Parma, Nov. 29. Publick Rejoycings have been made for three Days successively, on the Arrival of his Royal Highness the Infant our Sovereign with his Spouse, on which Occasion Te Deum has likewise been sung in all the Churches of this City.

Turin, Nov. 29, N. S. The Marques de la Chetardie, Ambassador from France, arrived here the 19th Instant, and on the 22d had his first private Audience of his Majesty. The Count de Chavannes has wrote Word to Court, that the Port he is erecting at Nissa Limpia near Niece, by his Majesty's Order, is already in great Forwardness, that it will be very commodious, will hold a great Number of Ships, and is well secured from the Winds.

Copenhagen, Dec. 6, N. S. The King has appointed the young Counts de Hauthausen, de Leynar, and de Henkel, to be Gentlemen of his Bed-chamber; and his Majesty has conferred the Title of Colonel of Infantry on M. George Frederick de Holstein, Master of the Ceremonies; and given the Regiment of Wester Lehn, to Lieutenant Colonel de Kraagen. We hear from Odensee, that Lieutenant General Adolphe de Neuberg, Colonel of the Regiment of Holstein, Cuirassiers, died there the 27th past after a short Illness.

Paris, Dec. 12, N. S. We learn by Advice from Rochfort, that a Vessel named the Diana was arrived in that Road from Canada, and that the Tyger was daily expected from Isle Royal, as was likewise another Ship from Mississipi. The King came to Versailles from Crecy on Thursday last.

Berlin, Dec. 13, N. S. The King has conferred the Title of Baron on M. Cocceii, his Grand Chancellor; and his Majesty has given the late Duke of Holstein Beck's Regiment to Colonel de Below, whom he has likewise raised to the Degree of Major General. On Tuesday last the Baron de Oppelen, Minister from the Duke of Saxe Gotha, had his Audience of Leave of his Majesty.

Hague, Dec. 16, N. S. On the 10th Instant, their Serene Highnesses the Prince and Princess of Orange, with all their august Family, left Leuwarden, and arrived that Evening at Loo; from whence his Serene Highness, accompanied by the Baron de Birmania, arrived here Yesterday Morning in perfect Health, and was soon after complimented thereupon by the Lords of the Regency, the Foreign Ministers, and other Persons of Distinction. And this Morning her Royal Highness the Princess of Orange, with the Hereditary Prince, and the Princess Caroline, will set out from Loo, and propose to reach Utrecht as this Night; where they will embark To-morrow Morning, on board one of the States Yatches, for this Place, and in all Probability will be here in the Evening. His Serene Highness has appointed M. Ryk Tulbagh, to be Governor of the Cape of Good-Hope, in the Room of M. Swellinggrebel; and M. Serge Swellinggrebel is appointed Deputy Governor thereof.

Hague, Dec. 18, N. S. His Serene Highness the Prince of Orange set out Yesterday Morning for Alphen, where he met her Royal Highness the Princess, with the Hereditary Prince, and the Princess Caroline; and the same Evening they all arrived here in perfect Health.

This Day Koied Mahommed Aga, Ambassador from Tripoly, had his first Audience of his Royal Highness the Duke.

And afterwards an Audience of her Royal Highness the Princess Amelia.

To both which he was introduced by Sir Clement Cottrell Dormer, Knt. Master of the Ceremonies.
