The King's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**W**HEREAS his Majesty hath received Information, that the many Rules, Orders and Regulations, made from Time to Time by his Majesty at this Board, for putting a Stop to the Spreading of the contagious Distemper amongst the Horned Cattle, have not produced the good Effects intended, the said Distemper having not only spread itself to most Parts of this Kingdom, but doth at this Time rage with a Malignity and Violence very little short of what had appeared at its first Breaking out; and that the principal Cause of the Continuance of the said Distemper, hath been the great Neglect of the Officers appointed to carry his Majesty's aforementioned Rules and Regulations into due Execution, and particularly the suffering Cattle to be bought, sold, removed, and carried to Fairs and Markets, without the proper Certificates of the Health of the Cattle, as required by the said Rules, and the many Frauds and Impositions that have been committed by the Persons entrusted with the said Certificates, so that it is become absolutely necessary, in order to prevent the further spreading of the said Contagion, to put the Liberty of buying, selling and removing of Horned Cattle under other and stronger Rules and Regulations:—And whereas his Majesty hath this Day taken this Matter into his most serious Consideration, and being desirous of doing every Thing in his Power towards putting a Stop to the said Distemper, hath therefore thought proper, by and with the Advice of his Privy Council, to order, as it is hereby ordered, That after the Fourteenth Day of January next, and before the Fourteenth Day of March following, no Ox, Bull, Cow, Calf, Steer, or Heifer, within England, whether fat or lean, sick or well, be removed from the Grounds, Lands or Places where they shall be on the said Fourteenth Day of January, excepting only such sound and fat Cattle, fit for Slaughter, as shall be removed in order to be slaughtered at some uninfected Place within the Distance of two Miles from the Place where they shall be on the said Fourteenth Day of January, by Virtue of a Certificate to be granted by some duly qualified Justice of Peace, or Commissioner of the Land

Tax under his Hand and Seal, expressing the Description and Soundness of such Cattle, the Place from and to which they are to be removed; and which Certificates shall not be granted but on full Enquiry into, and full Satisfaction had by such Justice of the Peace, or Commissioner of the Land Tax, on Oath of the Soundness of such Cattle.

And it is hereby further ordered, That the Church-Wardens, Overseers of the Poor, Constables, and such other Person or Persons as have been, or shall be appointed by the Justices of the Peace, in Pursuance of any Order made by his Majesty in Council, do stop any such Cattle which shall be driven contrary to this Order, or to any of the Acts of Parliament made in Relation to the distempered Cattle, and carry the Offender or Offenders before some Justice or Justices of the Peace, to be punished according to the aforesaid Acts.

Provided, and it is declared, that this Order is not intended to prohibit the Carriage of Carcasses of any Cattle not infected, without their Hides, to such Places, and in such Manner, as the respective Owners thereof shall think fit; nor to prohibit the Removal of such Cattle, as shall be in Want of Pasture, into other Grounds belonging to or in Possession of the Owner of such Cattle, not above the Distance of Two Miles from the Places where the same shall be on the said Fourteenth Day of January, nor within One Mile of any infected Place.

Provided also, that nothing herein contained shall extend to prohibit the Removal of any such Cattle, which shall be within the Dominion of Wales, from one Part of the said Dominion of Wales to any other Part thereof; nor to prohibit or restrain the Removal of any such Cattle which shall be in any of Counties of Somerset, Dorset, Devon and Cornwall, from one Place to another within the said Counties, but without going into any other than the abovementioned Counties, which are all represented to be, not only free from the said Infection, but at a considerable Distance from the infected Parts of this Kingdom.

And it is hereby further ordered, that so much of his Majesty's Order in Council of the 22d of March 1747, as relates to the driving or removing of any Oxen, Bulls, Cows, Calves, Steers or Heifers, from one Place to another, by Virtue of any Certificate or Certificates, shall, from and after the said Fourteenth of January next, until the Fourteenth of March following, be and stand suspended, and not put in Execution

tion as to any Cafes happening within the Time aforefaid.

And for the better Execution of fo much of his Majesty's faid former Order in Council of the 22d of March 1747, as relates to the killing and burying the diftemper'd Cattle, it is hereby further ordered, that during the Continuance of this and the faid Order of the 22d of March 1747, the Owners of all Horned Cattle do, as foon as the Diftemper fhall appear in or among any of the faid Cattle, immediately give Notice thereof to the Conftable of the Town or Parifh, and alfo to the Church Wardens and Overfeers of the Parifh or Place where fuch infected Cattle fhall be, of the Appearance of fuch Infection, or to any Infpector already appointed or to be appointed by the Juftices of the Peace for the Diftrict where fuch Parifh or Place fhall lie.

And his Majesty doth hereby further order and command, that the faid Juftices of the Peace, and Commissioners of the Land Tax, do grant the Certificates allowed by this Order gratis; and that they do not fuffer their Clerks, or other Perfon or Perfons any Ways concerned in iffuing fuch Certificates, to ask, demand, receive, or take any Fee, Reward, Gratuity, or Sum of Money whatfoever, under Pretence of making out fuch Certificates, or for any Act or Thing done in Relation thereto.

And his Majesty doth hereby ftrictly charge and command all his Majesty's Juftices of the Peace for the feveral Counties, Ridings, Divifions, Cities, Liberties, and Towns Corporate within this Kingdom, and alfo the Commiffioners of the Land Tax authorized to act herein, to carry this his Majesty's Order of Council into Execution; as likewise all the Rules and Regulations relating to the diftemper'd Cattle, and alfo to Hides, contained in the aforementioned Order of his Majesty in Council, dated the 22d of March 1747, fo far as the fame are not varied by this prefent Order, and more efpecially fuch Parts thereof as relate to the Killing and Burying of any fuch diftemper'd Cattle, and the Cleansing and Purifying the Houfes, Buildings, and Places, where any fuch infected Cattle fhall have flood, or been killed; and likewise to carry into Execution the feveral Acts of Parliament made in relation to the faid Cattle: And that they do likewise caufe the Penalties, directed by the faid Acts, to be inflicted on all Perfons who fhall difobey any of the Rules, Orders, and Regulations made by his Majesty in Council.

And for the better notifying of this Order, it is his Majesty's Pleafure, that the fame be forthwith printed and publifhed, and be alfo inferted in the next London Gazette, and be likewise read in all Parifh Churches, Chapels, and other Places fet apart for Divine Worfhip, on the Firft and every other Sunday after the Publication hereof.

*Lifbon, Nov. 24.* A large Fleet of Merchant Ships, bound for Rio de Janeiro, fet Sail from hence on the 15th Inftant with a favourable Wind. It is expected that the Marriage of

the Infant Don Pedro with the Princefs de Beyra, will foon be declared at Court, the neceffary Preparations being already made for that Purpose. There are lately arrived in this Port two of our Ships, the one from the Bay of All-Saints with 700,000 Cruzades in Gold and Silver, and the other from Nuova Colonia with 200,000 Cruzades in Gold, and 123,000 Piastres on Board, befides valuable Cargoes. The Corfairs of Barbary frequent our Coafths pretty much, and often carry off fmall Prizes.

*Naples, Nov. 29.* The Queen was this Evening happily delivered of a Princefs, and both her Majesty, and the young Princefs, are as well as can be expected.

*Petersbourg, Nov. 29.* As her Imperial Majesty, with the whole Court, is expected to return from Moscow to this City in about three Weeks, a great Number of Perfons of Difinction are already arrived here, as are likewise moft of the Principal Officers of the Troops quartered in Finland, who fome Time fince obtained Leave to come hither to compliment her Imperial Majesty upon her Arrival. The Baron de Greiffenheim, the new Swedifh Minifter to this Court, arrived here a few Days ago; and the Count de Lynar, the new Danifh Minifter, is daily expected.

*Modena, Dec. 4.* On Monday laft the Duke our Sovereign, with all his Court, came from Saffuolo to the Palace in this City for the Winter. The Count Ferdinand de Cofi, his Serene Highnefs's Gentleman of the Bed-Chamber, who had been to Parma to compliment the Infanta upon her Arrival in that City, is returned hither, greatly pleafed with the Reception he met with from that Princefs.

*Turin, Dec. 7.* The King has appointed the Chevalier de Monbervel, heretofore Governor of Plaisance, to be Governor of the City and Citadel of Alexandria; and his Majesty has likewise appointed the Marquefs de Doncieux, and the Counts de la Ville and de Revere, to be Gentlemen of his Bed-Chamber.

*Warsaw, Dec. 10, N. S.* The Preparations which were making here for the King's Reception, are at prefent fufpended, his Majesty's intended Journey for this Kingdom having been put off for fome Time. The King has given to the Count de Luberzinski the Regiment of Dragoons, vacant by the Death of Major General Kufcinski. We are informed by Letters from Podolia and Mohilow, that a contagious Diftemper continues to make great Havock in the Neighbourhood of thofe Places, fo that they have been obliged to reinforce the Troops pofted at all the Avenues leading to the neighbouring Provinces, in order to prevent its Spreading.

*Paris, Dec. 19, N. S.* M. Loupre, the King's Lieutenant of the Baftile, has obtained his Difmiffion with a Pention of 1200 Livres. His Majesty has given the Command of the Regiment of German Horfe, vacant by the Death of the late Marquefs de Rosen, to Prince Eugene de Wirtemberg Stutgard.

*Hague, Dec. 23, N. S.* The States of Holland and Weft Frizeland will adjourn their Af-fembly To-morrow for the Holy Days. Their High Mightineffes have appointed M. de Kerffboom

boom, at the Recommendation of his Serene Highness the Prince of Orange, to be first Commissioner for the Finances of the Generality.

The King has been pleased to constitute and appoint Sir Thomas Robinson, Knight of the Bath, to be Keeper of his Great Wardrobe, in the room of John Duke of Montagu, deceased.
