P R E S E N T,

The King's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS his Majesty hath received Information, that the many Rules, Orders and Regulations, made from Time to Time by his Majesty at this Board, for putting a Stop to the Spreading of the contagious Distemper amongst the Horned Cattle, have not produced the good Effects intended, the said Distemper having not only spread itself to most Parts of this Kingdom, but doth at this Time rage with a Malignity and Violence very little short of what had appeared at its first Breaking out; and that the principal Cause of the Continuance of the said Distemper, hath been the great Neglect of the Officers appointed to carry his Majesty's aforementioned Rules and Regulations into due Execution, and particularly the suffering Cattle to be bought, sold, removed, and carried to Fairs and Markets, without the proper Certificates of the Health of the Cattle, as required by the said Rules, and the many Frauds and Impositions that have been committed by the Persons entrusted with the said Certificates, so that it is become absolutely necessary, in order to prevent the further spreading of the said Contagion, to put the Liberty of buying, selling and removing of Horned Cattle under other and stronger Rules and Regulations:—And whereas his Majesty hath this Day taken this Matter into his most serious Consideration, and being desirous of doing every Thing in his Power towards putting a Stop to the said Distemper, hath therefore thought proper, by and with the Advice of his Privy Council, to order, as it is hereby ordered, That after the Fourteenth Day of January next, and before the Fourteenth Day of March following, no Ox, Bull, Cow, Calf, Steer, or Heifer, within England, whether fat or lean, sick or well, be removed from the Grounds, Lands or Places where they shall be on the said Fourteenth Day of January, excepting only such sound and fat Cattle, fit for Slaughter, as shall be removed

in order to be slaughtered at some uninfected Place within the Distance of two Miles from the Place where they shall be on the said Fourteenth Day of January, by Virtue of a Certificate to be granted by some duly qualified Justice of Peace, or Commissioner of the Land Tax under his Hand and Seal, expressing the Description and Soundness of such Cattle, the Place from and to which they are to be removed; and which Certificates shall not be granted but on full Enquiry into, and full Satisfaction had by such Justice of the Peace, or Commissioner of the Land Tax, on Oath of the Soundness of such Cattle.

And it is hereby further ordered, That the Church-Wardens, Overseers of the Poor, Constables, and such other Person or Persons as have been, or shall be appointed by the Justices of the Peace, in Pursuance of any Order made by his Majesty in Council, do stop any such Cattle which shall be driven contrary to this Order, or to any of the Acts of Parliament made in Relation to the distempered Cattle, and carry the Offender or Offenders before some Justice or Justices of the Peace, to be punished according to the aforesaid Acts.

Provided, and it is declared, that this Order is not intended to prohibit the Carriage of Carcasses of any Cattle not infected, without their Hides, to such Places, and in such Manner, as the respective Owners thereof shall think fit; nor to prohibit the Removal of such Cattle, as shall be in Want of Pasture, into other Grounds belonging to or in Possession of the Owner of such Cattle, not above the Distance of Two Miles from the Places where the same shall be on the said Fourteenth Day of January, nor within One Mile of any infected Place.

Provided also, that nothing herein contained shall extend to prohibit the Removal of any such Cattle, which shall be within the Dominion of Wales, from one Part of the said Dominion of Wales to any other Part thereof; nor to prohibit or restrain the Removal of any such Cattle which shall be in any of Counties of Somerset, Dorset, Devon and Cornwall, from one Place to another within the said Counties, but without going into any other than the abovementioned Counties, which are all represented to be, not only

only free from the said Infection, but at a considerable Distance from the infected Parts of this Kingdom.

And it is hereby further ordered, that so much of his Majesty's Order in Council of the 22d of March 1747, as relates to the driving or removing of any Oxen, Bulls, Cows, Calves, Steers or Heifers, from one Place to another, by Virtue of any Certificate or Certificates, shall, from and after the said Fourteenth of January next, until the Fourteenth of March following, be and stand suspended, and not put in Execution as to any Cases happening within the Time aforesaid.

And for the better Execution of so much of his Majesty's said former Order in Council of the 22d of March 1747, as relates to the killing and burying the distempered Cattle, it is hereby further ordered, that during the Continuance of this and the said Order of the 22d of March 1747, the Owners of all Horned Cattle do, as soon as the Distemper shall appear in or among any of the said Cattle, immediately give Notice thereof to the Constable of the Town or Parish, and also to the Church Wardens and Overseers of the Parish or Place where such infected Cattle shall be, of the Appearance of such Infection, or to any Inspector already appointed or to be appointed by the Justices of the Peace for the District where such Parish or Place shall lie.

And his Majesty doth hereby further order and command, that the said Justices of the Peace, and Commissioners of the Land Tax, do grant the Certificates allowed by this Order gratis; and that they do not suffer their Clerks, or other Person or Persons any Ways concerned in issuing such Certificates, to ask, demand, receive, or take any Fee, Reward, Gratuity, or Sum of Money whatsoever, under Pretence of making out such Certificates, or for any Act or Thing done in Relation thereto.

And his Majesty doth hereby strictly charge and command all his Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the several Counties, Ridings, Divisions, Cities, Liberties, and Towns Corporate within this Kingdom, and also the Commissioners of the Land Tax authorized to act herein, to carry this his Majesty's Order of Council into Execution; as likewise all the Rules and Regulations relating to the distemper'd Cattle, and also to Hides, contained in the aforesaid Order of his Majesty in Council, dated the 22d of March 1747, so far as the same are not varied by this present Order, and more especially such Parts thereof as relate to the Killing and Burying of any such distemper'd Cattle, and the Cleansing and Purifying the Houses, Buildings, and Places, where any such infected Cattle shall have stood, or been killed; and likewise to carry into Execution the several Acts of Parliament made in relation to the said Cattle: And that they do likewise cause the Penalties, directed by the said Acts, to be inflicted on all Persons who shall disobey any of

the Rules, Orders, and Regulations made by his Majesty in Council.

And for the better notifying of this Order, it is his Majesty's Pleasure, that the same be forthwith printed and published, and be also inserted in the next London Gazette, and be likewise read in all Parish Churches, Chapels, and other Places set apart for Divine Worship, on the First and every other Sunday after the Publication hereof.

An Act for reducing the several Annuities, which now carry an Interest after the Rate of Four Pounds per Centum per Annum, to the several Rates of Interest therein mentioned.

Whitehall, December 21.

On Saturday last James Cleverly, one of his Majesty's Messengers, arrived here with Dispatches from his Excellency the Earl of Albemarle, containing a Duplicate of the most Christian King's Orders to the Governor of Martinico, for the immediate Evacuation of the Islands of St^a Lucia, St. Vincent, Domenica; and Tabago: which Duplicate, together with similar Orders on the Part of his Majesty to the Governor of Barbadoes, has been already dispatched to that Governor by the Jamaica Sloop of War.

Moscow, Nov. 27. The Frost is now set in again with greater Severity than it did before the late Thaw, but as yet there is but little Snow fallen. On the 24th Instant was celebrated at Court the Nuptials of Count Iwan Cze nizew with the young Countess Jephimowski, as were those of M. Narinski with Mademoiselle de Repnin; as these two Ladies were both Maids of Honour to her Imperial Majesty, all the Foreign Ministers were invited to the Entertainments given on this Occasion, which lasted for two Days.

Petersbourg, Dec. 4. Last Week arrived here the Retinue and Baggage of General d'Arnheim, who is coming to reside at this Court in Quality of Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Poland, and his Excellency is daily expected.

Naples,

Naples, Dec. 2, N. S. The King has appointed the Duke of Miranda to be Great Butler to his Majesty, in the room of the Duke of Turfi, who died lately at Rome; and the Marquis of St. Marco is to succeed the Duke of Miranda in the Post of Master of the Horse. The King has confirmed M. Cito in the Post of Director of the Custom-house at Foggia.

Rome, Dec. 6, N. S. Preparations are making at the Vatican for the Pope, who is to remove thither on the 21st Instant, in order to be nigh at Hand to perform the Functions of the Holy Year. Cardinal Aldrovandi, Bishop of Monte Fiascone, having permitted, by an Edict which he caused to be published, the sending of Corn out of his Bishoprick, contrary to the Pope's Orders, the Secretary of State has, by another Edict, declared void the Permission of the said Cardinal Aldrovandi. The Pope, to enable the Roman Senate to make a decent Appearance in the Attendance they are to give at the Ceremonies of the Holy Year, has lent them 16,000 Crowns, to enable them to purchase a suitable Equipage for that Purpose. On the 1st Instant the Pope held a private Consistory, in which he appointed a Vicar Apostolick of Aquilea, in the Venetian Dominions, and fixed the Ceremonial for the Coronation of the Emperor.

Marseilles, Dec. 10, N. S. We learn from Constantinople, that most of the Jew Merchants, residing in the Suburbs of that City, had quitted their Habitations, and retired into the Country, on Account of a contagious Distemper breaking out at Adrianople, which spreads very fast, and carries off a great Number of Persons.

Florence, Dec. 12, N. S. On the 5th Instant, at Night, M. de Richecourt, Baron Toussaint, M. Acton, Colonel Mill, M. Lowther, &c. returned to this City from Leghorn; and by the best Accounts of their Transactions in that Place, it is asserted, that the Project for trading to the East Indies is quite laid aside. On the 8th the Emperor's Birth-day was celebrated with the usual Solemnity, on which Occasion the Foreign Ministers, the Nobility, and Military Officers, appeared in their rich Habits, many of whom were entertained at Dinner by M. de Richecourt.

Parma, Dec. 12, N. S. Their Serene Highnesses the Duke and Dutchess have at last settled their Household, though not entirely to the Satisfaction of the Nobility of Placentia. The Court intending to pass some Weeks at Colorno, the Marquess de Leede and M. Tillet, went thither last Week to make the necessary Preparations for their Reception. The Duke de Montelegre, Ambassador from his Catholick Majesty to the Republick of Venice, is soon expected here; as is also the Marquess de Grimaldi, in Quality of Envoy Extraordinary from the Grand Master of Malta, to compliment their Highnesses upon their happy Arrival.

Stockholm, Dec. 12. The King has lately made a Promotion of military Officers, amongst

whom M. Christian Barnekow has been appointed Major General; Baron Charles Aldersfelt, and Count Ponte de la Gardie, Adjutants General; Baron Funck, Lieutenant Colonel; and M. Charpentier, Major.

Augsbourg, Dec. 17, N. S. We are informed by our last Letters from Munich, that the Reduction which the Elector of Bavaria had ordered to be made in his Troops, is countermanded, and that Orders had been given by his Electoral Highness for raising Recruits, and completing his Regiments.

Vienna, Dec. 18, N. S. The Queen of Hungary has sent positive Orders to the Officers of her Troops posted in Hungary and Transylvania, to take all imaginable Precautions to stop all Persons and Effects coming from the Frontiers of Turkey and Poland, her Majesty having received certain Advice, that a contagious Distemper continues to make great Havock in those Countries. Count Pallavicini is expected here in a few Days from Milan, to lay before the Court the State of Affairs in Italy, as well with Regard to the Condition of their Imperial Majesties Troops in Lombardy, as to the Finances of the Dutchy of Milan and its Dependencies. General Count de Collredo, Envoy Extraordinary from this Court to that of Sardinia, is preparing to set out next Week for Turin. His Imperial Majesty has appointed the young Count d'Alheim to be one of his Chamberlains.

Copenhagen, Dec. 20, N. S. The 11th Instant being the Anniversary of the Marriage of their Majesties, the same was celebrated at Court; when Numbers of the Nobility of both Sexes appeared in very rich Habits to compliment their Majesties on that Occasion. On the 12th arrived here the Baron de Voss, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Prussia, and 'tis expected will have his first Audience of his Majesty in a few Days. Two Ships belonging to our East India Company, the one bound for China, and the other for Tranquebar, are now at Helsingør, and will put to Sea with the first fair Wind.

Paris, Dec. 26, N. S. On the 24th Instant the Court went out of Mourning for the late Landgrave of Hesse Rhinfelds; and To-morrow the King proposes setting out for Choisy for two, or three Days. His Majesty has appointed M. Auty, late Major of the Bastile, to be Lieutenant thereof, and M. Cavalier succeeds him as Major. Part of the Retinue of M. Berkenrode, the new Ambassador from the States General, being already arrived here, 'tis expected M. de St. Contest, Ambassador from this Court to that of their High Mightinesses, will soon be setting forwards for the Hague. Prince Frederick of Hesse Cassel proposes leaving this Place, in a few Days, on a Tour to Italy.

Hague, Dec. 30, N. S. His Royal Highness the Prince of Orange assisted this Day at an Assembly of their High Mightinesses, when several Military Officers, who had been promoted by his Highness, took the usual Oaths before the Council

Council of State, for their different Employments. A few Days ago the Prince of Bade-Bade set out from hence on his Return to Germany; and M. Kalkoen is expected to set out in a few Days for the Court of Dresden, in Quality of Minister Plenipotentiary from their High Mightinesses. The Prince of Saxe Hildbourghausen, Governor of Nimeguen, is soon expected here.
