*Florence, February 20, N. S.*

**A**N Ambassador from Tripoli is arrived at Leghorn; he has finished his Quarantine, and is expected here this Evening or To-morrow; and after a few Days Stay here, is to continue his Journey to Vienna.

*Madrid, Feb. 23, N.S.* On the 20th Instant his Catholick Majesty appointed the Houshold to attend upon the Infanta Donna Maria Antonia, Dutches of Savoy, to the Frontiers of France, where her Highness is to be received by the King of Sardinia's Servants. The Marquess de Balbases is named Mayor-Domo Mayor, and the Duke de Medina-Sidonia Master of the Horse; and the Dutches de Medina-Celi Camerera Mayor; the Marchionesses de Cogolludo, and Val de Ravano, and the Countess de Hablitas, Ladies of the Bed-Chamber. On the 25th the Infanta sets out for St. Ildephonso, in order to pass fifteen Days, and take Leave of the Queen Dowager her Mother. Great Quantities of Jewels have been bought up in London on Occasion of her Highness's Marriage, which will be celebrated in a very magnificent Manner. Letters from Cadiz advise, that the Spanish Ship that was missing from Pasages, was arrived in the Bay, as well as a Vessel belonging to the Havanna Company, from Lagos; as was also the Lydia from Buenos Aires, with about a Million and half of Dollars, 16000 Hides, and 9000 lb. of Vicunna Wooll. By a Tartan that was sent in Quest of the Ships from the Havanna under the Command of M. Spinola, there is an Account, that they passed the Terceras on the 14th ult. which makes it believed they are gone to Galicia.
