

Navy Office, Feb. 21, 1749.

The Right Hon. the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury having appointed Money for paying of Half Pay to Sea Officers, from the 31st of December 1748, to the 30th of June 1749, according to his Majesty's Establishment on that Behalf;
