Constantinople, February 5. HE Grand Seignor has given the Regencies of Barbary to understand, that he would not refuse effectually to fuccour them, if they were attacked 5y any Powers what loever that are not in Treaty with them; but if, by their own ill 'Conduct, they should draw on themselves the Resentment of any of the Powers with whom they are at Peace, he would not in that Cafe give them any Relief, but that they themselves should be anfwerable for fuch their ill Conduct. The Grand Vizier has notified this to the Ministers of the several Christian Courts, desiring them at the fame Time to acquaint their Masters, that it is the Request of the Grand Seignor, that they would use their utmost Endeavours to prevent their Subjects from coming wilfully to any Difagreement with the Regencies of Barbary. Lisbon, Feb. 13. Several Men of War are ordered to be got ready forthwith to put to Sea, in order to protect the Trading Veffels of this Kingdom against the Corfairs of Barbary, many of which we are affured are now equipping with all Speed. The Marquess de Tavora, whom the King has lately appointed Viceroy of the Indies, will fet Sail with three Men of War for Goa fome Time next Month. Petersbourg, Feb. 17. Great Preparations and Fireworks are making here for celebrating, on the 21st of this Month, the Anniversary of the Birth of his Highne's the Great Duke, who is pretty well recovered from his late Illnefs. We learn from Molcow, that the Count de Gourofski, who was detained there by Illness when her Imperial Majesty left that City, is now perfectly recovered, and intends to fet out shortly for this Place. Petersbourg, Feb. 24. Last Saturday, the **Pift Inftant, being the Anniverlary of the** Great Duke's Birth, when he enter'd in the 23d Year of his Age, there was at Noon a very numerous Court at the Palace, to compliment his Imperial Highness on that Occasion, and in the Evening there was a Ball and a very magnificent Supper of a hundred Covers, to which were invited the principal Ministers and Officers of State, the Generals, the Foreign Ministers, and other Persons of Rank and Distinction. Bologne, Feb. 21. By Letters from Milan we learn, that her Imperial Majesty has resolved to continue Count Harrach in the Government of that Dutchy, and that the Marquefs de Botta will be appointed Governor of the Caftle of Milan, and Commander of all the Imperial Forces in Lombardy, in the room of the Marques de Pallavicina. We are informed from Genoa, that M. de Chauvelin, having received his Credential Letters, will foon be admitted to an Audience of the Doge and Senate, in Quality of Envoy Extraordinary from his Most Christian Majesty to that Republick. Naples, Feb. 24. M. Marro, late Chaplain in Ordinary to their Majesties, who was some Months ago difmiffed from that Employment for his diforderly Life, and appointed Arch-Dean of Carinola, having continued to live a scandalous Life, was, upon the Application of shat

Bishop to the King, taken up a few Days ago, and sent to Prison at Capoa. On the 10th Instant their Majesties, attended by their respective Retinue and Guards, returned to this City from the Woods of Persano. On the 14th their Equipage was ofdered to Bovino, where they proposed to pass a few Days in Hunting in that Forrest.

Florence; Feb. 27. Last Week some Soldiers of the Lorrain Regiment of Foot Guards deferted from their Duty at one of the Gates of this City. On the 24th Instant arrived in this City from Leghorn, where he performed Quarantine, the Ambaffador from Tripoli to the Emperor, attended by a Retinue of fourteent Perfons; he lodges at one of the Great Duke's Houses, purposely prepared for him, is entertained at the Emperor's Expence, and defigns to proceed for Vienna in a few Days. Romé, Feb. 28. The Armenian Nation having requested and obtained the Pope's Confent for Erecting a College in this City, they are accordingly making the necessary Dispositions for that Building. As foon as Cardinal Corfini, Protector of the Crown of Portugal, was informed of the Death of Cardinal Bichi, he immediately fecured and fealed up all the Papers of that Minister, and on the 14th dispatched a Courter to Lisbon with Notice thereof. And the Pere Jesuite, Assistant of Portugal, has taken Charge of the Affairs of that Crown at this Court, till the King appoints a new Minister. The Chevalier Capello, the new Venetian Ambaffador, had his first Audience of the Pope of Saturday last, and delivered his Credential Letters. Parma, Feb. 28. Their Serene Highnesses the Duke and Dutches, with the whole Court, are gone to Colorno, where it is thought they will stay till Easter. We enjoy here a perfect Tranquillity, notwithstanding the many Reports which have been spread of new Troubles being foon to break out in Italy. Venice, Feb. 28. We learn from Genoa, that a Tartan from St. Remo, having on board the Marquess de la Rocca and his Family, had perished last Week in a violent Tempest near Albizola; and that out of twenty Passengers and Sailors, only two had the good Fortune to be faved. Turin, March 2. M. Colombo, the new Minister from the Republick of Venice, has had his first private Audience of his Majesty, and delivered his Credential Letters. Stockbolm, March 3. The King continues to enjoy a pretty good State of Health, and often affifts at Council. His Majesty has conferred the Dignity of Prefident of the Council ' of Justice on the Baron de Lowenhielm, in the Room of the Count de Frolich, who has obtained his Difmission from that High Office ; and the Baron de Fleerwood is appointed Governor of the Province of Sudermania. The Princess Royal advances happily in her Pregnancy, and publick Prayers are already ordered for her fafe Delivery. The Sea is already fo free from Ice, that feveral Ships have arrived here within thefe few Days. Posnania, March 5. On the 28th past a dreadful Fire broke out in the little Town of Czartknow, about eight Miles from hence, which burnt with fuch Violence, that the whole Town was reduced to Afhes, except the Church, which has all o suffered greatly.

Vienno, March 7. The Empress Queen and the young Archdutchess are both extremely well, and 'is thought her Imperial Majesty will soon be able to appear again in Publick. Last Sunday a Fire broke out in this City, which burnt down about 15 or 16 Houses, and a Monastery, before it could be extinguished.

Turin, March 7. By Letters from Spain we are informed, That the Infanta's Journey is fixed for the Middle of April, and the is expected here by the Beginning of June. The King of Naples has appointed the Abbe Caftromonte to come hither as his Ambaffador, to compliment his Sardinian Majefty on Occasion of the Marriage between his eldest Son and the Infanta of Spain. This Court has lately borrowed One Hundred and Twenty Thousand Pounds Sterling, at Four per Cent. of some principal Persons in the Republick of Berne, in order to pay off some other Sums they were obliged to borrow during the War at Five and even Six per Cent.

Dresden, March 8. The King's Departure for Poland continues fixed for the 20th of April. His Majesty has appointed the Chevalier de Champgny to be Colonel of Horfe; and the Company of Grenadiers, vacant by the Death of M. Priskorn, has been given to M. Bellegarde. Bon, March 9. Last Wednesday Evening he Electoral Highness our Sovereign arrived here from Westphalia, to the great Joy of the Noblity and Inhabitants of this City, his Highness having been absent near five Months; and the next Day he was complimented upon his Arrival by all Persons of Distinction. The Count de Wartensleben, Minister from the States General to this Court, having executed his Commillion, will shortly set out from hence for fome other Courts of the Empire. Francfort, March 10. Yesterday we received Advice, that in the Night between the 5th and 6th Instant, a Fire broke out in the Electoral Palace at Munich, which had entirely destroyed one Wing of that grand Edifice. Several Perfons belonging to the Court perished in the Flames, amongst whom was the Baroness de Wolffskell, Lady of Honour to her Electoral Hghness, Mademoiselle de Lerchenseit, one of her Maids of Honour, and two of his Electoral H ghness's Pages. All the rich Furniture and Paintings in that Wing were destroyed, which makes the Los, very confiderable. Their Highneffes are retired for the prefent to Nimphenb urg. On the sift Instant died at Berlenb urg in the Weteraws," in the soth Year of her Age, the Countels of Sayn and Wittgenstein, as did three Days after the Count her Hu band, in the 55th Year of his Age, leaving behind them c ght Children. Dusselderp, March 12. The Court has fent Orders for all the Officers to have their respective Regiments complete against the Spring, when Commiliaries will be fent to review them; and "in faid the Elector Palatine has even refolved to augment his Troops with one Battalion of Foot and four Squadrons of Horfe. Letters from Mayence fay, that there are already arrived in that City a great Number of Merchants, with all Sorts of Merchandizes, particularly from France, fo that it is imagined their approaching Fair will be very confiderable. Hambourg, March 12. On the 10th Inflant, about Noon, we had a most violent Storm of Thunder and Lightning, by which the Church of St. Michael, and three Houles adjoining to it. were entirely reduced to Alhes, and feveral

other Houses very much damaged before the Fire was extinguished; but we do not hear of any Persons having perished in the Flames.

Paris, March 13. On Sunday last the King went to Choify, and returned to Versailles on Monday Night; and the next Day gave Audience to several Foreign Ministers. On the 11th his Majesty signed a Contract of Marriage between the Marquess de Chatenoy and Mademoiselle Bretul, Daughter of the late Secretary at War. The Count d'Aucourt is set out for his Government of Perpignan.

Berlin, March 14. Prince Henry, the King's Brother, has been appointed Lieutenant in the Regiment of Fufileers; and M. Van Often has been raifed to the Rank of Colonel. His Majefty has appointed M. Plotho and M. Heiligenftadt to be his Privy Counfellors. Prince Maurice of Anhalt Deffau fet out on the 4th Inflant for Stargard, in order to review his Regiment which is in Garrifon there.

Hague, March 19. On the 16th Inftant M. Berkenroode had a long Conference with his Serene Highness the Prince of Orange, and several of the Lords of the Regency, after which he fet out on his Embaffy to the Court of France. Their High Mightiness, at the Request of the Prince of Orange, have conferred on Baron de Wassenaer the Office of Droslard of the Town of Gorcum, and Superintendant of the Digues of Altena. His Highness has appointed M. Seve, late Captain-Lieutenant in the Regiment of Dragoons of General Trips, to be Captain of the late M. Viffcher's Company n the faid Regiment The Hr ty Pr ce f Brandenbourg-Anspach, a te Ŋ ſ fau-Ufingen, who came hither o mM the Prince and Princess of Orange u n Celebration of the Anniversary of the Births of the Hereditary Prince and the Prince's Caroline his Sifter, are fet out on their Return to Utrecht. The States of Holland and Westfrizeland separated on the 14th Instant till after Easter.
