*Constantinople, March 24.*

**Z**AYDE Efendi, the late deposed Cheaia, waits at Gallipoly for a Ship to transport him to Cairo, from whence it is said he is to go to Mecca, and remain there. The Thames and the Triton, with all the other Ships hitherto departed from these Ports, have had clean Patents, for notwithstanding the Foreign Gazettes, we have been several Months, both here and at Smyrna, quite free from any Contagion.

*Petersbourg, April 12.* Her Imperial Majesty came on Wednesday last from Gostilitz to this City. On the 5th Instant a Fire broke out in the fine House of General Count Soltikoff, and reduced it to Ashes, but the best Part of the Furniture was saved. That Night a Fire broke out also in the Village of Wologda Jemskoi, by which it was almost entirely destroyed. And on the 7th the Church of the Holy Trinity, which was new built but about four Years ago, was reduced to Ashes, owing to the Negligence of one of the Churchwardens, who left a Candle burning before one of the Images of the Saints; and the Wind being very high, the Flames extended themselves so far, that about 20 Houses were burnt down. There is no more Talk of the Marching of Troops to reinforce those on the Frontiers of Finland.

*Turin, April 14.* A great Number of Persons of Quality are arrived in this City, to see the Ceremony of the Marriage of the Duke of Savoy with the Infanta of Spain, and partake of the magnificent Entertainments which will be given on that Occasion. Count Colloredo, their Imperial Majesties Minister to this Court, arrived here Yesterday; and the Equipages of the Marquess de Castromonte, his Neapolitan Majesty's Minister to this Court, are also arrived, and his Excellency himself is hourly expected.

*Warsaw, April 19.* Count Poniatowski, Palatine of Mazovia; the Prince Czartoriski, Vice-Chancellor of Lithuania, and the Bishop of Cracow, are already arrived here. The Queen's Ladies of the Bed-Chamber are also arrived To-day, and their Majesties are expected by the first of next Month at farthest, with the Prime Minister Count Bruhl, and the rest of the Court. The holding of the Senatus Consilium is now said to be fixed for the 4th of next Month; and a few Days after the Universalia will be issued for convoking an extraordinary Diet. The Great General of the Crown, who has been greatly indisposed, is now perfectly recovered, and is shortly expected here.

*Stockholm, April 21.* Publick Prayers are ordered to be put up in all the Churches for the

happy Delivery of the Princess Royal. The King still keeps his Chamber, notwithstanding his Fever has quite left him. All is quiet in Finland and upon its Frontiers. M. Mannerheim, Lieutenant Colonel of the Regiment of Dalecarlie, has been promoted to the Rank of Colonel, and Count Possé is appointed Major of the Regiment of Helsinguie. His Majesty has disposed of the Government of Halland in Favour of M. Hummelheim.

*Vienna, April 22.* The Departure of Count Bentinck is said to be deferred till after the Arrival of Prince Charles of Lorraine, who is expected here towards the End of the Month.

*Poznan, April 23.* The King and Queen of Poland arrived Yesterday in this City, and immediately repaired to the Episcopal Palace; where they were complimented by the Bishop and Magistrates in a Body. Upon their Arrival the Cannon upon the Ramparts were fired, and in the Evening the Houses were illuminated, and great Rejoicings made by the Inhabitants; and this Morning their Majesties continued their Journey for Warsaw.

*Copenhagen, April 25.* On the 22d Instant the King went to Jagersbourg, and the next Day returned to this City. 'Tis said the Baron de Bernsdorff is appointed Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs in the Room of the late Count Schulin.

*Berlin, April 28.* The Departure of the King for Prussia is fixed for the 1st of June next; and the necessary Orders for his Majesty's reviewing a great Body of Horse and Foot, are already sent away to that Kingdom.

*Hambourg, April 29.* Several Families from Saxony, intending for the new Settlement in Nova Scotia, arrived here about Ten Days ago. By a Fire which lately happened at Elmesborn, a very large Village belonging to the King of Denmark, at about the Distance of three German Miles from this Place, above 50 Houses were destroyed in a few Hours; and it was with great Difficulty that the Church and adjacent Buildings were saved.

*Paris, May 1.* The Dauphiness, who is now in the sixth Month of her Pregnancy, continues to enjoy a good State of Health. On the 29th past the King, accompanied by the Dauphin, set out for the Castle of Muette, and Yesterday his Majesty reviewed the Regiments of French and Swiss Guards upon the Plain of Sablons, and returned afterwards to Muette, and from thence To-day to Versailles.

*Osnabrug, May 2.* The King of Great-Britain passed through this Place about Eight o'Clock this Morning for Hanover; and 'tis not doubted but his Majesty arrived there this Evening.



*Hague, May 5.* The States of Holland and Westfrizeland continue their Assembly. The Deputies from the several Colleges of the Admiralty of this Country are arrived here, and will begin their Deliberations To-morrow.

*Rotterdam, May 6.* The Commissaries named by the States of Holland to examine into the State of the new Taxes, are expected here To-morrow.

*Whitehall, April 28.*

On Thursday Evening last his Excellency the Earl of Harrington, Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, arrived at his House in the Stable Yard, St James's, from Dublin.
