Naples, May 26.

THE King has appointed the Duke of Invitti to be one of the Members of the Supreme Council of Sta Chiara.

On the 13th Instant deserted, when on Duty at one of the advanced Posts of this City, a Piquet of Grenadiers out of the Swiss Regiment Jauch, but being followed by a Party of Bailiffs, were overtaken and arrested near Capoa, and conducted to this City. The Corporal and two of the Soldiers have been since executed, and the others condemned to the Gallies. The Court, on Notice of the Arrest at Rome of the Prince of Filomarino, jun. at the King's Request, ordered immediately a Detachment both of Horse and Foot to proceed to Portella, to receive him from the Pope's Jurisdiction, and conduct him hither. We Learn from Leghorn, that an Algerine Corsair took last Week a Genoese Ship richly laden.

Rome, May 30. The Pope, to provide against the Scarcity of small Money in this City, has ordered a large Quantity of Plate to be coined immediately at the Mint into Carlins. The Fraternity of the Trinity, who from the Beginning of January to April last, having laid out the Sum of 52000 Crowns in receiving and maintaining upwards of 145,000 Pilgrims, who in the Space of four Months came into this City from all Parts, finding itself incapable to bear so great an Expence, have petitioned the Pope for Assistance, or to supply them by way of Loan, with such Sums of Money as they may have Occasion for, as the Fraternity may not be obliged to dispose of their Estates. On the 29th the Pope, attended by his Retinue and Guards, set out for Castle Candolfo, where he proposes to pass some Weeks. The same Day he caused an Edict to be published, forbidding the Course of under-weight Roman Zekeens, of which a large Quantity have been sent lately into this City from Naples and other Places.

Florence, June 5. General Stampa, agreeable to the Permission he has obtained from the Emperor, has fixed his Departure from Pisa to Milan for the 17th Instant; he proceeds by way of Genoa, the Republick having ordered one of their Gallies to attend him from Lerici to Genoa.

Parma, June 6. The Ducal Palace is ordered to be immediately repaired and beautified for the Reception of the Court. The Secretary of the Finances, the Abbe Serrati, having been dismissed from that and his other Employments, has petitioned for Leave to retire from Court,

which has been granted him. The Post of Governor of this City, vacant by the Death of the late Marquis Luchefini, is not yet disposed of, but 'tis generally thought it will be given to the Marquis de Mari.

Milan, June 6. Count Harrach has at last obtained his Recall, and is preparing to set out for Vienna, to take Possession of the new Post lately conferred on him by the Empress Queen; and Count Pallavicini succeeds him in the Government of this Dutchy. The magnificent Feasts given at Turin, on Occasion of the Marriage of the Duke of Savoy with the Infanta of Spain, have drawn the greatest Part of our Nobility thither.

Aranjuez, June 8. On Saturday May 30, which was St. Fernando's Day, whose Name the King bears, their Majesties received the Compliments of the Nobility and Foreign Ministers, who were afterwards magnificently entertained at Dinner by the Marquis de l'Ensenada, Secretary of State. In the Evening the King, Queen, and Infante Cardinal, attended by the Court, walked in the Gardens belonging to this Palace, where several Bands of Musick were placed amongst the Trees for the Entertainment of their Majesties and his Highness. The Nobility who composed the Family which was appointed to attend the Dutches of Savoy to the Frontiers of this Kingdom, returned hither upon the Eve of St. Fernando's Day, in order to pay their Court upon that Occasion, and were graciously received by their Majesties, who are extremely pleased with the magnificent Manner in which they have executed their Commission. Letters from Cadiz mention, that the Arrival of 45 Sail of English Ships in that Bay, laden with Corn, has had no Effect upon the Price of that Commodity.

Dantzick, June 10. The Price of Corn, which was greatly risen on Account of vast Quantities being bought up by the Russian and Swedish Commissaries, begins now to fall, on the present Appearance of a plentiful Harvest. We learn by our last Letters from Warsaw, that neither the Deputies of the Magistrates, nor those of the Citizens of this City, have been able to obtain an Audience of his Majesty; but that the Great Chancellor, Count Malachowsky, had assured them, that his Majesty would give great Attention to their Complaints; that he would neglect nothing in his Power to re-establish a perfect Harmony between them; and that they should on every Occasion receive particular Marks of his Favour,

Vienna,

Vienna, June 10. Advice has been received at Court by Express, that the Princess of Hohenzolern Sigmaringen was happily delivered of a Prince on the 29th past. On Saturday last her Imperial Majesty came hither from Schonbrun, and the next Day their Imperial Majesties, accompanied by the Archduke Joseph, set out for Laxembourg. A Project is on Foot for obliging the Clergy to pay their Proportion of all publick Taxes.

Copenhagen, June 13. The Baron de Bernsdorff, whom his Majesty has appointed Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, in the Room of the late Count Schulin, arrived here the 3d Instant from Paris, and the next Day waited on his Majesty, and met with a gracious Reception. The Day of the King's Departure to visit the Danish Islands, two Ships of War were launched in his Majesty's Presence, after which he set out on his Tour. All the Troops in the different Islands his Majesty visits, will be reviewed by him, accompanied by General de Lerke, Secretary at War, who attends his Majesty.

Dresden, June 14. A few Days ago the Prince and Princess Royal gave a grand Ball to the Lords and Ladies of the Court in the Garden of the Count de Bruhl, situated in the Neighbourhood of d'Ostewize. Yesterday a Fire broke out in the Suburbs of this City, which burnt down many Houses before it was extinguished.

Ratisbon, June 14. By Letters from Munich we learn, that the continual Complaints the Inhabitants of Bavaria had made against the Multiplicity of Incidents which prolonged their Proceedings at Law, had at length determined the Elector to order an Ordonnance to be published, whereby his Electoral Highness greatly abridges for the future all those Proceedings throughout his Dominions.

Paris, June 19. Yesterday Morning an Express arrived at Court from the Marquis de la Chetardie, our Ambassador at Turin, with an Account, that the Infanta of Spain, now Dutches of Savoy, had made her publick Entry into that City on the 4th Instant; and that the Feasts and Rejoycings on that Occasion were most-surprizing. The Court continues its Residence at Compeigne, where his Majesty often takes the Diversion of hunting.

Hague, June 23. The States of Holland and Westfrizeland continue their Assembly. Count Czernicheff, the Russian Envoy Extraordinary to the Court of Great Britain, arrived here from London on the 19th Instant; that Evening he waited on the Prince of Orange, and the next Morning set forward on his Journey for Herrenhausen. By Letters received last Post from Hanover we learn, that Prince William of Hesse Cassel, who had been there for some Days, and assisted at the Reviews his Britannick Majesty had made of Part of the Troops of that Electorate, had taken his Leave of his Majesty, and was set out on his Return to Cassel.
