Genoa, June 8.

WE have just received Advice that the Corsairs of Barbary have made themselves Masters of a large Neapolitan Bark, but that the Crew saved themselves by getting on shore.

Stockholm, June 9. The Prince Successor returned the 3d of this Month to Drotningholm from Nykoping and Linkoping, after having reviewed the Regiments quartered in those two Places. The King continues to enjoy a pretty good State of Health.

Vienna, June 13. Their Imperial Majesties came from Laxembourg to Schonbrun the 11th Instant, and Yesterday was held an extraordinary Council. The Court having received several Expresses concerning the Affair of Hohenloe, and divers Protestant Princes having also presented Memorials to Count Colloredo, Vice-Chancellor of the Empire; concerning religious Grievances; these Memorials have been laid before his Imperial Majesty, who has given Orders that all those Grievances be immediately look'd into and redressed.

Copenhagen, June 20. The two Ships of War, which were launched in the King's Presence the Morning he set out on his Tour to visit the Danish Islands, were of 60 Guns each, and called the Seeland and the Neptune. His Majesty will have finished his Tour, and it is expected will be back again at Friedensburg about the Beginning of next Month.

Franckfort, June 22. The Princess of Hesse Darmstadt is happily delivered of a Prince, who has been baptized by the Name of George Frederick William. The Princess of Nassau Weilbourg died on the 8th Instant of an Apoplectick Fit.

Hanover, June 23. Though the King, God be praised, continues in good Health, yet his Majesty has had, for a few Days past, a Pain in his Foot, which has been declared by his Physicians to be the Gout; this however has not prevented his Majesty from continuing the Review of his Troops Yesterday and this Morning, which made the finest Appearance imaginable, and performed their several Exercises to the universal Satisfaction of all that saw them. His Highness Prince Frederick of Hesse was present at the Review of the first Week; and Prince Lewis of Wolfenbuttle is now here, and will stay till the Reviews are finished.

Hague, June 26. Count Tierheim, a young Gentleman related to several of the most considerable Families in Bavaria, and who was a Captain in the Republick's Service, was condemned a few Days ago to be shot, and was publicly executed at Gorcum on Wednesday last, notwithstanding the strong Sollicitations made in his Favour. This unfortunate Gentleman, who commanded a Company in the Regiment of Bade-Baden, in Garrison at Gorcum, had persuaded, near a Month ago, about Twenty of his Men, to assist him in forcing open a Prison, and rescuing a Soldier of that Regiment, who had been confined for Smuggling, upon some Complaints of the Collectors of the publick Revenue. It was with some Difficulty at first, that his Friends made him sensible of the Greatness of his Crime, and could persuade him to make his Escape: But he soon returned again to the Neighbourhood of Gorcum, where he was immediately secured, and delivered up to the High Council of War, who, at the same Time that they condemned him, pronounced Sentence of Death on Fourteen of his Accomplices, three of which only have been executed; the Prince Stadtholder having mitigated the Sentence of the others, and changed it into a severe Whipping.

Dublin, June 11.

This Day being the Anniversary of his Majesty's happy Accession to the Throne, the Great Guns were fired at the Phoenix Park, and answered by Volleys from the Regiments in Garrison, which were drawn out in the Royal Square at the Barracks: At Noon their Excellencies the Lords Justices met at the Castle, and received the Compliments of the Nobility and other Persons of Distinction: And the Night concluded with Bonfires, Illuminations, and all other Demonstrations of Joy.

Leicester-House, June 17.

This Evening the new-born Prince was baptized by the Name of Frederick William; The Ceremony was performed by the Right Reverend the Lord Bishop of Oxford. The Sponsors were their Royal Highnesses Prince George and the Princess Augusta, and Prince William of Saxe Gotha, Brother to her Royal Highness the Princess of Wales, who was represented by the Right Honourable the Lord North and Guildford.
