WELVE Ships of the Line, and fix Frigates, lie ready at Cronftadt to put to Sea, In order to exercise their Seamen, as they usually do every Symmer.

Leghorn, June 26. The great Quantity of Corn which has been lately brought into this Port, and the Appearances we now have of a plentiful Harvest, has greatly fallen the Price of that Commodity. A few Days ago one of the. Barbary Corfairs brought in here a Portuguese Ship laden with Tobacco, which fhe took in the Spanish Sea; and the Master of a Ship just arrived from Corfica fays; that there are feveral Barbary Corfairs cruizing upon that Coaft, as well as that of Sardinia, but that he had not heard of their having taken any confiderable Prize; he likewife fays, that he was chafed by one of them for tw lve Hours, but that he had the good Fortune to out fail her. Turin, June 27. 'On the 21st Instant the Archbishop of this City, accompanied by most of the Bishops of this Kingdom, went in Pro ceffion to compliment his Majesty and the Royal Family on the Marriage of the Duke of Savoy with the Infanta of Spain; fince which the Clergy in a Body have done the fame. The Deputies from the feveral Provinces of this Kingdom have likewife had the Honour of Complimenting the King on this Occasion, and have prefented his Majesty with the Free Gift each Province makes in Confideration of this Marriage. This Day the Ceremony of inftalling the last promoted Knights of the Order of the Annunciade was performed in his Majefty's Presence, when each Knight was invested with the full Habit and Collar, being the Enfigns of that Order, of which the Archbishop of this City is appointed Chancellor. The Marquefs de Corfeigne, Great Chamberlain, and Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, died here in the Night between the 23d and 24th Instant of an Apoplectick Fit, Rome, June 27, The Number of Barbary Corfairs which almost continually infest the Italian Sea, making it apprehensive least they " thould attempt a Descent upon the Coast of the Ecclefiastical State; and fearing least the Number of Troops already posted along the Coast, fhould not be fufficient to hinder them; the Pope has ordered those Troops to be augmented with two Companies of One hundred Men each, the one of Horse, and the other of Foot, which it is thought will be fufficient to prevent any Attempt of that Kind. Madrid, June 29. The last Advices from Parma inform us, that the Dutches, Confort to the Infant Don Philip Duke of Parma, was entered into the third Month of her Pregnancy.

And from Turin we learn, that the Dutchef of Sayoy expresses the greatest Satisfaction at the Reception the has met with from all Claffes of People at that Court. Orders are given for the Examination of a Plan to make the River Ebro navigable from Saragoza to the Mediterranean. And a Project is likewife forming for rendering the Guadalquivir navigable from Seville to Cordova, and as much higher into the Country as may be found practicable. His Catholick Majesty has named the Chefs d'Escadre, Don Pedro de la Cerda, and Don Francisco Orosco, Gentlemen of the Bed-Chamber. The Court is expected at the Palace of the Buen Retiro on Saturday the 4th of next Month. Vienna, Ju'y 1. On the 22d Instant a Grand Council was held at Schonbrun, fince which the Court has been preparing for its intended Journey to the Camp at Petau in Stiria, which will certainly take Place in a few Days; and befides the Prince and Princels of Lorrain, their Imperial Majeffies will be accompanied thither by many of the principal Lords and Ladics of the Court. The Baron de Backhoff is arrived here in Quality of Minister from the King of Denmark. Her Imperial Majesty has appointed the Baron de Breitlach to be her Ambaffador Extraordinary to the Court of Ruffia. The Tripolitan Minister had Yesterday his Audience of Leave of Count Harrach, President of the Council of War, and will fet out towards the End of the Week for Leghorn, in his Way to Tripoly. Copenhagen, July 4. The King returned on Tuesday last from visiting the Danish Islands, and this Morning his Majesty set out for Fredensberg. On the 28th past the East India Company's Ship, the King of Denmark, arrived here from China; and the Queen of Denmark, another of that Company's Ships, is daily expected. Berlin, July 7. On Tuesday last the Court went into Mourning for the late Prince of Hohenzollern Hechingen. The Duke and Dutches of Brunswick Wolfenbuttel are expected here fome Time this Month; in the mean Time a fine Firework and other Preparations are making, by Order of the King, for their Entertainment. Hambourg, July 8. This Morning came in here a Jager with twenty Barrels and a half of British Herrings, two Dutch Jagers with about fixty Barrels of their Herrings, having arrived a few Hours before ; as the former were saught by two Buffes only, and the Dutch have a whole Fleet, 'tis thought here that the English have had extraordinary good Success. M. Bofanquet, to whom the English Jager was configned, had been previously directed by the Society of the Free British Fishery in England, to ienq

fend away immediately to Hanover, two fmall Kegs of Herrings, as foon as they should arrive, one as a Prefent for the King, and the other for the Duke of Newcastle, as Samples of the British Herrings; accordingly an Express fet out with them this Day at Noon.
