Petersbourg, June 23.

TWELVE Ships of the Line, and six Frigates, lie ready at Cronstadt to put to Sea, in order to exercise their Seamen, as they usually do every Summer.

Leghorn, June 26. The great Quantity of Corn which has been lately brought into this Port, and the Appearances we now have of a plentiful Harvest, has greatly fallen the Price of that Commodity. A few Days ago one of the Barbary Corsairs brought in here a Portuguese Ship laden with Tobacco, which she took in the Spanish Sea; and the Master of a Ship just arriv'd from Corsica says; that there are several Barbary Corsairs cruizing upon that Coast, as well as that of Sardinia, but that he had not heard of their having taken any considerable Prize; he likewise says, that he was chased by one of them for twelve Hours, but that he had the good Fortune to out sail her.

Turin, June 27. On the 21st Instant the Archbishop of this City, accompanied by most of the Bishops of this Kingdom, went in Procession to compliment his Majesty and the Royal Family on the Marriage of the Duke of Savoy with the Infanta of Spain; since which the Clergy in a Body have done the same. The Deputies from the several Provinces of this Kingdom have likewise had the Honour of Complimenting the King on this Occasion, and have presented his Majesty with the Free Gift each Province makes in Consideration of this Marriage. This Day the Ceremony of installing the last promoted Knights of the Order of the Annunciade was performed in his Majesty's Presence, when each Knight was invested with the full Habit and Collar, being the Ensigns of that Order, of which the Archbishop of this City is appointed Chancellor. The Marquess de Corseigne, Great Chamberlain, and Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, died here in the Night between the 23d and 24th Instant of an Apoplectick Fit.

Rome, June 27. The Number of Barbary Corsairs which almost continually infest the Italian Sea, making it apprehensive lest they should attempt a Descent upon the Coast of the Ecclesiastical State; and fearing lest the Number of Troops already posted along the Coast, should not be sufficient to hinder them; the Pope has ordered those Troops to be augmented with two Companies of One hundred Men each, the one of Horse, and the other of Foot, which it is thought will be sufficient to prevent any Attempt of that Kind.

Madrid, June 29. The last Advices from Parma inform us, that the Dutchess, Consort to the Infant Don Philip Duke of Parma, was entered into the third Month of her Pregnancy.

And from Turin we learn, that the Dutchess of Savoy expresses the greatest Satisfaction at the Reception she has met with from all Classes of People at that Court. Orders are given for the Examination of a Plan to make the River Ebro navigable from Saragoza to the Mediterranean. And a Project is likewise forming for rendering the Guadalquivir navigable from Seville to Cordova, and as much higher into the Country as may be found practicable. His Catholick Majesty has named the Chefs d'Escadre, Don Pedro de la Cerda, and Don Francisco Oroasco, Gentlemen of the Bed-Chamber. The Court is expected at the Palace of the Buen Retiro on Saturday the 4th of next Month.

Vienna, July 1. On the 22d Instant a Grand Council was held at Schonbrun, since which the Court has been preparing for its intended Journey to the Camp at Petau in Stiria, which will certainly take Place in a few Days; and besides the Prince and Princess of Lorraine, their Imperial Majesties will be accompanied thither by many of the principal Lords and Ladies of the Court. The Baron de Backhoff is arrived here in Quality of Minister from the King of Denmark. Her Imperial Majesty has appointed the Baron de Breitlach to be her Ambassador Extraordinary to the Court of Russia. The Tripolitan Minister had Yesterday his Audience of Leave of Count Harrach, President of the Council of War, and will set out towards the End of the Week for Leghorn, in his Way to Tripoly.

Copenhagen, July 4. The King returned on Tuesday last from visiting the Danish Islands, and this Morning his Majesty set out for Fredensberg. On the 28th past the East India Company's Ship, the King of Denmark, arrived here from China; and the Queen of Denmark, another of that Company's Ships, is daily expected.

Berlin, July 7. On Tuesday last the Court went into Mourning for the late Prince of Hohenzollern Hechingen. The Duke and Dutchess of Brunswick Wolfenbuttel are expected here some Time this Month; in the mean Time a fine Firework and other Preparations are making, by Order of the King, for their Entertainment.

Hambourg, July 8. This Morning came in here a Jager with twenty Barrels and a half of British Herrings, two Dutch Jagers with about sixty Barrels of their Herrings, having arrived a few Hours before; as the former were caught by two Bussies only, and the Dutch have a whole Fleet, 'tis thought here that the English have had extraordinary good Success. M. Bosanquet, to whom the English Jager was consigned, had been previously directed by the Society of the Free British Fishery in England, to send

send away immediately to Hanover, two small Kegs of Herrings, as soon as they should arrive, one as a Present for the King, and the other for the Duke of Newcastle, as Samples of the British Herrings; accordingly an Express set out with them this Day at Noon. The small Cargoe, which came as a Tryal, sold immediately, and at the Rate of Eighty Pounds the Last, and that too at a Time when the Dutch sold theirs at Vlaerden at no more than Forty Guilders per Ton, which is only about Forty-five Pounds per Last; and as the British Herrings have been preferred to those of the Dutch at this Market, it is looked upon as an Earnest of farther Success in the present laudable Undertaking of the Free British Fishery.

Franckfort, July 9. We have just received Advice of the Death of the young Prince of which the Princess of Hesse Darmstadt was lately brought to Bed. The Affair concerning the Church which the Protestants are desirous of having built in this City, remains just in the same Situation, the Magistrates still persisting in their Refusal to grant any such Permission.

Hanover, July 10. Princess Mary of Hesse arrived Yesterday at Herrenhausen from Cassel, and immediately waited on the King her Father, who received her with great Affection.

Hague, July 14. Within these few Days past several Persons have taken the usual Oaths before the Council of State, to qualify themselves for the several Employments his Serene Highness the Prince of Orange has been lately pleased to confer on them. M. de Verelst, Minister Plenipotentiary from the States General to the King of Sardinia, set out on the 10th Instant for Zealand, of which he is Deputy, in order to take Leave of the States of that Province; after which he will proceed on his Journey to Turin. Most of the heavy Baggage of the Marquis de St. Contest, Ambassador from France to this Court, is arrived at Rotterdam, but his Excellency is not expected here these six Weeks. The Ambassador from the Emperor of Morocco, who arrived here some Days ago, has already had his first Audience of the Greffier Fagel.

The King has been pleased to constitute and appoint Charles Polhill, James Vernon, Robert Eyre, Horatio Townshend, William Burton, John Orlebar, Augustine Earle, and David Papillon, Esqrs. together with John Windham Bowyer, Esq; in the room of John Fowles, Esq; to be his Majesty's Commissioners for the Management and Receipt of his Majesty's Revenue of Excise and other Duties within England, Wales, and Town of Berwick upon Tweed.
