Naples, June 23.

IS Majesty has ordered the young Prince Don Antoine Filomarini to be banished during Life to the Island of Pantellaria, for having run away with a young Lady from one of the Convents in the Suburbs of this City, The Prince of Campo Reale, Ambassador from this Court to that of their Imperial Majesties, set out a few Days ago for Vienna.

Parma, June 27. The Pregnancy of the Infanta is confirmed, and 'tis expected will be declared towards the End of this Month, which

occasions great Joy at this Court.

Genoa, June 29 A few Days ago Mess. Durazzo, Orero, Passano, Serra, and Fornari, were appointed Senators of this Republick, in the room of five others who go out in Turn Tomorrow; and Mest. Mari, Lercaro, Adorno, and Torre, are chosen new Directors of the

Bank of St. George.

Warfaw, July 4. The King has appointed the Colonels de Repin and Goltz to be Majors General. Advices from feveral Districts and Palatinates bring Accounts of their Dietines having broke up unsuccessfully, and many of them even without being able to make Choice of Deputies to the extraordinary Diet. Bishop of Warmia has declared to the Deputies from Dantzick, that the King proposed, after the holding of the extraordinary Diet, to return to Dresden, when he would make their City in his Way, and endeavour all in his Power to reconcile their Differences. By Letters from Bialacerkiew of the 15th of last Month, and from Lactyzew of the 18th we learn, that some Detachments of Horse, belonging to the Palatinates of Podolia and Volhinia, had come up with and defeated a very large Body of Heyducks, many of whom they had killed on the Spot without giving them any Quarter.

Vienna, July 4. On the 2d Instant the Emperor come hither from Schonbrun, when the Baron de Menzingen, and the Privy Counsellor Seefried, Ministers Plenipotentiary from the Margrave of Brandenbourg Anspach, were admitted to an Audience of his Imperial Majesty, and received from his Hands, in the Name of the Margrave their Master, the Investiture of the Fiels possessed by that House; when the Ceremony was ended, the Emperor returned to Schonbrun. And Yesterday their Imperial Majesties, accompanied by Prince Charles of Lorrain, and a numerous Retinue, set out for Stiria, in order to view the Troops which are encamped in the Neighbourhood of Petau, and 'tis imagined

they will return about the 8th Instant. The Queen of Hungary has conferred on M. Buday, an Hungarian Gentleman, the Regiment

of Pandours of the late Baron Trenck.

Turin, July 4. The Republick of Genoa has appointed M. Pinello to be their Envoy Extraordinary to this Court, on Occasion of the Marriage of the Duke of Savoy. M. Verelst, Envoy Extraordinary from the States General, is daily expected; and Yesterday the King of Sardinia appointed Count Viry to be his Minister at the Hague.

Dantzick, July 5. By private Letters from Petersbourg we are informed, that the Empress of Russia, before her Departure for Petershoff, had figned several Orders concerning the Disposition of her Forces for the current Year, as well in Livoria, as upon the Frontiers of Finland; and we wait with Impatience to be informed of

the Contents of those Orders.

Ratisbon, July 6. Letters from Munich of the 24th past say, that they had felt there that Night three different Shocks of an Earthquake, which being followed the next Day by very heavy Rains, attended with prodigeous Storms of Wind and Hail, had overflowed the Rivers. and done a deal of Mischief to the Houses, Cattle, Corn, and Fruits of the Earth.

Berlin, July 11. On the 6th Instant the Queen, accompanied by several Ladies of the Court, went to see the Settlement made at Blanckenfelde for the Protestant Families who came from the Empire, amongst whom the di-

stributed a considerable Sum of Money.

Hambourg, July 11. By our Letters from Stockholm we are informed, that about Ten in the Morning of the 29th past, a Fire broke out in the Suburb called Muncklager, which burnt with such Violence, that in two Hours Time a large Part of that Quarter was reduced to Ashes, with the Loss of several Manufactures and Ware-

houses belonging thereunto.

Paris, July 15. On Sunday last his Most Christian Majesty reviewed, in a Plain close to Compeigne, the Corps called the Grenadiers de France, who performed their Exercises to the Satisfaction of every Body. The Queen intends to leave Compeigne on the 18th, and his Most Christian Majesty on the 20th Instant. Marshal D'Harcourt died on Friday last, and the King has disposed of the Troop of Guards, vacant by that Marshal's Death, in Favour of the Duke of Luxembourg.

Hague, July 17. The States of Holland are to assemble on Wednesday next, and the Summons have already been issued for that
