WHEREAS the Lords Justices of Great Britain have signified unto us their Pleasure, That the Parliament of this Kingdom, which now stands prorogued to Tuesday the Tenth Day of July Instant, be further prorogued to Tuesday the Fifth Day of March next; We do therefore Publish and Declare, That the said Parliament be, and accordingly the said Parliament is, hereby further prorogued to Tuesday the Fifth Day of March next: Whereof the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Commons in this present Parliament, are to take Notice accordingly.

GOD Save the KING.

Petersbourg, June 30. Before the Departure of her Imperial Majesty for Peterhoff, several Orders were signed for the Disposition of the Forces of this Kingdom for the current Year amongst which a considerable Body of regular Forces are ordered to march into Livonia, in order to join the Forces already there.

Rome, July 3. On the 28th past the Pope, attended by about thirty Cardinals, and several Archbishops and Bishops, went in a solemn Procession to the Church of St. Peter, and heard Vespers sung to Musick; and the next Day, being St. Peter's Day, the Pope officiated at high Mass in his Pontifical Habit, after which he was carried under a Canopy to his Apartment in the Vatican, where he gave the Apostolick Benediction to an infinite Number of Persons who were assembled together for that Purpose; that Night, and the next, the whole City was illuminated, and several fine Fireworks were played off. The Pope has appointed the Bishop of Osimo to be Assistant to the Pontifical Throne.

Warsaw, July 4. Although several of the Dietines are broke up unsuccessfully, as well in this Kingdom as in Lithuania, yet the greatest Part of them have elected Deputies for the extraordinary Diet, which will be held here the 4th of next Month; and we hear that several of those Deputies are already preparing to come hither accordingly. The Deputies from the

Magistrates and Citizens of Dantzick are set out on their Return Home. We have received a Confirmation of the total Defeat of a considerable Body of Heyducks, who were returning Home with their Spoils, after they had committed the greatest Outrages imaginable in the Ukraine; but we learn at the same Time, that M. Labiszewsky, who commanded the Polish Troops that were sent in Quest of them, had the Misfortune to be killed in that Rencontre, together with several superior Officers, and a great Number of Soldiers.

Dantzick, July 8. Preparations are already making here for the Reception of the King and Queen of Poland, who are expected soon after the holding of the extraordinary Diet. Their Majesties propose stopping four or five Days in this City before they proceed to Dresden. Some Days ago the Magistrates of this City received an Express from Warsaw, by which they were ordered immediately to re-establish the Citizens in their Prerogatives, conformable to what has been regulated by the King on that Subject, and to depose the two Counsellors who had been elected by them some Time since; which has been done accordingly. What other Differences may still subsist between the Magistrates and Citizens of this City, will be adjusted by his Majesty during his Stay here.

Vienna, July 8. Their Imperial Majesties are expected to arrive at Schonbrun this Evening or To-morrow Morning from Stiria. Advice has been received at Court, that the young Prince Emanuel of Lichtenstein was married on the 5th Instant at Feldsberg, upon the Confines of Moravia, to the young Countess of Sternberg, Daughter to Count Sternberg, their Imperial Majesty's Minister Plenipotentiary to the Court of Saxe.

Modena, July 8. The Duke our Sovereign, accompanied by his Consort, the Hereditary Prince, and the whole Court, came on the 2d Instant from Rivalta to this City, in order to celebrate his Highness's Birth-Day, who then entered into the 53d Year of his Age. On this Occasion Te Deum was sung in the Cathedral Church, and a general Discharge was made of the Artillery, after which their Highnesses received the Compliments of the Nobility and Gentry, and at Night returned to Rivalta.

Berlin, July 14. The King, who has been for some Time past at Sans Souci, one of his Summer Palaces, drinking the Mineral Waters of Egra, having left off the same, is returned to Potsdam, from whence his Majesty is expected here

here To-morrow or next Day, in order to give Audience to some foreign Ministers.

Brussels, July 19. On Thursday last we had in this City and its Neighbourhood, so violent a Storm of Hail, Rain, and Wind, that the like has not happened in the Memory of Man; it lasted about half an Hour, during which it did a surprizing deal of Damage, not only to the Houses and Windows, but also to the Fields and Gardens, many of which look most dreadfully.

Hague, July 21. M. Hop, the States General's Envoy at the British Court, set out two Days ago for Hanover. Mess. De Larrey and Marcellis are expected here immediately from Paris; they have been ordered Home, to lay before the States an Account of the Progress of their Negotiations with the French Ministers, for the Renewal of the Treaty of Commerce of the Year 1739. Every Thing necessary having been settled for the intended Expedition to Surinam, it is generally expected that the first Embarkation will take Place very shortly.
