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Naples, July 28.

THE King, as an Act of Clemency, has consented to the Return of the Bishop of Nola to his Archbishoprick, and has charged the Delegate of his Jurisdiction, to renew his Insinuations to the Prelates of the Kingdom, to caution the Curates of their respective Parishes not to marry any Military Officers in his Service, under Pain of incurring his Displeasure. His Majesty has appointed the Counsellor d'Andrea to be Judge Delegate for the Differencies between his Courtiers and Servants.

Rome, Aug. 1. A few Days ago the Chevalier Cappello, the Venetian Ambassador to the Pope, together with his Lady and Family, agreeably to the repeated Orders from his Senate, departed from this City on his Return, by Way of Viterbo and Florence, to Venice. On the 20th past Count Monestarolo, Minister from the King of Sardinia, to that of Naples, set out from hence thither, to take upon him that Charge; as did, on the 21st, the Marquis de Millefino, on his Return from Naples to Turin, having executed his Commission at that Court on the Part of the Duke of Savoy. The same Day the French Ambassador came to this City from Frascati, and had a long private Audience of the Pope, relating to the Disagreements between the Senate of Venice, the Court of Vienna, and the Pope, about the Patriarchate of Aquileja. On the 23d the Pope held a Consistory, in which he appointed Cardinal Barni to be Legate of Ferrara, Cardinal Bolognetti to be Legate of Ravenna, and confirmed Cardinal Doria in the Legation of Bologna.

Genoa, Aug. 1. The Master of a French Pink arrived here from Algiers reports, that before his Departure from that Place, twelve Xebeck Corsairs sailed from thence on a Cruize; that they separated as soon as they got out of Port; but that he knew not what Course they had steered.

Florence, Aug. 4. Last Week sailed from Leghorne for Genoa, the Emperor's Ship the Lyon, to escort to Leghorne the Tunisine Xebeck, which that Government has given up to the Emperor, and which is to be restored to the Bey of Tunis. On the 24th past in the Evening, Count Richecourt returned to this City from Leghorne, whither he had been to give Orders for the final Departure of the Emperor's new Men of War which are in that Port. Agreeable to the Emperor's Directions to compleat the two Companies of his Life Guard, called la Garde Noble, fifteen Italian young Gentlemen were last Week enlisted in the said Companies; and Dispositions are making for the remounting the whole Guard. On the 28th at Night, the

Chevalier Cappello, the late Venetian Ambassador to the Pope, his Lady and Family, arrived here from Rome, on his Journey to Venice.

Warsaw, Aug. 5. On Monday last, being the King's Birth-Day, and also the Anniversary of the Institution of the Order of the Black Eagle, the same was pronounced to the People in the Morning by a Discharge of the Artillery. Towards Noon all the Knights of that Order, who were in Town, waited on the King in his Closet, in their proper Habits; and having complimented him on his Birth-Day, his Majesty was pleased to make a Promotion of the following new Knights, viz. M. Szoldrki, Palatine of Ynowladislaw, and General of Great Poland; the Prince of Radzivie, Palatine of Nowogrodeck; Mess. Gurouwski, Czerny, Sollohub, and Grabowski, Castellans of Polnapia, Woyniz, Witebsk, and Dantzick; the Baron de Westenberg, Great Master of the Queen's Household; Count Potocki, Crown Carver; and Prince Lubomirski, Crown General. After the King had invested the new Knights with the Habits of the Order, his Majesty appeared in Publick, and received the Compliments of the Senate, the Nobility, and Foreign Ministers; after which the King gave a grand Entertainment, the Knights of the Order of the Black Eagle being admitted to dine at his Majesty's Table; four other Tables being prepared for the Nobility and Foreign Ministers. Yesterday, being the Day appointed for the Opening of the Extraordinary Dyet, their Majesties repaired to the Collegiate Church of St. John, and heard Mass celebrated Pontifically by the Bishop of Cracow; after which his Majesty went to the Senate-house, and opened the Dyet with the usual Formalities.

Vienna, Aug. 8. Count Christiani, Great Chancellor of the Milaneze, arrived here on the 6th Instant from Italy, in order to lay before her Imperial Majesty the State of her Affairs in Lombardy, and particularly of her Finances; and Count Harrach, Governor General of that Dutchy, is expected here next Month. Preparations are still making for the Court's Departure for Bohemia, Part of their Imperial Majesty's Baggage being already sent away.

Stockholm, Aug. 11. Since the Permission which was granted for sending Corn from Livonia into Foreign Countries, on Account of their plentiful Crops this Year, several Vessels are gone thither from different Ports of this Kingdom, in order to take in their Loading of that Commodity at Riga and Revel.

Hambourg, Aug. 12. By Letters from Warsaw we are informed, that the Palatine of Poland, Count Rzewuski, had just given a remarkable Instance of Zeal for the Good

his Country, in having resigned, into the King's Hands, his Lignity of Palatine, and renounced his Rank as such amongst the first Senators of the Kingdom, that he might return to the Equestrian Order, and be one of the Nuncio's at the ensuing extraordinary Dyet; an uncommon and singular Example. This Nobleman having already had the Happiness of being invested with the Dignity of Marshal to the Dyet of Pacification in the Year 1736, and then greatly contributed, by his Capacity, to the Success of it, will easily reunite the Votes for his Election in the same Quality, at the approaching Dyet.

Berlin, Aug. 15. On the 11th Instant in the Evening the King came hither from Potsdam; and the next Day his Majesty, accompanied by the Margrave of Bareith, and several General Officers, reviewed the Troops in Garrison in this City. After which his Majesty returned to the Castle, and gave Audience to some Foreign Ministers. On the 13th his Majesty attended the Margrave into the Suburbs, to see the different Manufacturies of Silks and Stuffs that are established and carrying on there; with which they seemed greatly pleased, and gave several Sums amongst the Workmen for their Encouragement; and Yesterday his Majesty, accompanied by the Margrave and Margravine of Bareith, and all the Royal Family, and attended by the whole Court, set out for Charlottenbourg, where they propose to spend some Days in partaking of the Diversions of that Place.

Brussels, Aug. 17. Prince Charles of Lorraine, Governor General of these Provinces, is expected at Namur on Thursday next, and 'tis believed will reach this City on the Saturday following; at whose Arrival 'tis imagined M. de Wit, President of the Chamber of Accompts, will be declared Treasurer General of the Finances. An additional Duty has been laid on all Stamp Paper and Parchment in Brabant, the Produce of which is to be employed to discharge the Sum of 1600,000 Florins which the States of that Province have negotiated. Notwithstanding we have very fine Crops of Corn this Year, the Price of that Commodity keeps pretty high, occasioned by the large Quantity that has been sent out of this Country, particularly towards the Frontiers of France. A great Number of the Nobility and Gentry of this Country are already arrived in this City, and others are almost continually coming in, to wait the Arrival of Prince Charles of Lorraine, and to compliment him thereupon.

Hague, Aug. 21. The States of Holland have been summoned to meet on Wednesday next, and the Prince Stadtholder is expected here by that Time, in order to assist at their Assembly. His Serene Highness has been a little indisposed at Loo; but by the last Advices, his Illness had been attended with no bad Consequences. The Prince has issued two Proclamations, the first dated the 3d Instant, N. S. for the Preservation of the Game in this Province. The other is dated the 5th Instant, N. S. and relates to the Disorders which have happened at Oudewater in this Province, in Consequence of the Disputes arisen among the Magistrates; and his Highness orders by this Proclamation, that they shall be all dismissed, and those who are

named in the Proclamation, established in their Stead. This Proclamation is founded on the Resolution of the States of Holland of the 21st of Sept. N. S. 1748, by which the Prince was authorized to change the Magistrates of all such Towns as should desire it.

African House, Aug. 7, 1750.
