Whitehall, August 25.

THEIR Excellencies the Lords Justices in Council have been pleased to Order, that the Parliament, which stands prorogued to Thursday the Thirtieth of this Instant, should be further prorogued to Thursday the Twenty Fifth Day of October next.

Naples, Aug. 11. On the 23d past, Don Anthony Filomarino, in Consequence of the Capital Crime he had committed in running away with a young Lady from a Convent, was, by the King's Commands, transported to the Island of Sesta, there to be confined for Life. On the 24th sailed for the Adriatick, the King's Xebecs St. Anthony and St. Gennaro, escorting two large Transports, loaden with Utensils, and 100 Men out of the Gallies, to be employed at Work on the new Port of Barletta.

Turin, Aug. 12. The Court continues at the Venerie, where his Majesty often diverts himself with Hunting. By Letters from Milan we learn, that the Margrave of Baden Dourlach, who has been for some Time past in that City, set out a few Days ago on his Return Home. The same Letters add, that the Marquis de Pallavicini, who succeeds Count Harrach in the Government of the Dutchy of Milan, was on the Point of setting out for Genoa.

Rome, Aug. 14. The Week before last M. Geraud, the Pope's Commissary, return'd to this City from Norcia and Ascoli, after he had regulated with the King of Naples's Commissaries, the Confines of that Kingdom and the Ecclesiastical State. Cardinal Alexander Albani, agreeable to the Commission he had received from the Court of Vienna, has performed the Function of investing Prince Chigi with the Honour of the Golden Key, lately conferred upon him by the Emperor. This Government, on Notice that several Gangs of Banditti greatly infested the Districts of Spoleti and Foligno, has given strict Orders, and sent out People to destroy those Disturbers of the publick Tranquillity. On the 29th past Cardinal Valenti, the Secretary of State, received a Courier from M. Caraccioli, the Pope's Nuncio at Venice, with Notice, that after a long Consultation held by the Senate, a formal Intimation had been sent to him, to retire from that City, and the

State of Venice; whereupon the Nuncio immediately set out for Ferraro. On the 1st Instant Cardinal Mellini received a Courier with Dispatches from the Court of Vienna, amongst which was one for the Pope, which he immediately sent to him, relating to the Affair of Aquileja; and on the 3d the Cardinal had an Audience of the Pope upon the same Subject.

Florence, Aug. 16. Last Week the Senator Gaetani, and M. Libri, in Consequence of the Sentence pronounced against them, were removed from this Castle to their Relegation of Volterra. The Chevalier Borgherini remains in the Castle, in Hopes to obtain a Mitigation of the Ignominy, in being deprived of the Order of St. Stephen, and having the Habit of that Order torn from off his Back, according to the Sentence; his Relations having, for that Purpose, petitioned the Emperor, by Means of the Regency. On the 2d Instant anchored at Leghorn, on her Return from Genoa, the Emperor's Ship of War, the Heron, with the Tunefine Xebec, which the Republick of Genoa has given up to the Emperor. On the 3d M. Capello, the Venetian Ambassador, his Lady and Family, after having observed the Curiosities of this City, and accepted of the Entertainments of Dinners and Balls from divers of the Principal of the Florentine Nobility, set out from hence on his Return to Venice by the Lunegiana.

Warsaw, Aug. 18. Yesterday the Term for the Duration of the Dyet expired, and most of the Nuncios will have left this City, in order to go to their respective Homes towards the End of this Week. The Senatus Concilium will assemble next Monday.

Vienna, Aug. 19. On Saturday last her Imperial Majesty disposed of the Regiment of St. Ignon, Cuirassiers, in Favour of Lieutenant General Kalckreuter; and we hear that the Archduke Peter Leopold, who 'twas thought would have had the above Regiment, has obtained that of Cuirassiers of Hohenloe. Their Imperial Majesties left this Place on the 16th in the Morning for Bohemia; that Night they reached the Castle of Ludwitz, and the Night following they arrived at General Bathiani's Seat at Nauhoff.

Vienna, Aug. 22. M. Bentinck set out from hence, late on Thursday Evening, for Hanover, and is to take the Camp near Czaflaw in Bohemia in his Way.

Danzick, Aug. 21. The Differences which have so long subsisted between the Magistrates and Citizens of this City, are at last happily terminated to the Satisfaction of both Parties. M. Karesky, who came hither some Days ago to make the necessary Preparations for his Polish Majesty's Reception, set out on Sunday last on his Return to Warsaw, his Majesty's intended Journey to this City, in his Way to Dresden, having been laid aside. They write from Copenhagen, that the two Russian Frigates, which arrived there lately from Archangel, were put to Sea again for Petersburg, after having taken on board all necessary Refreshments.

Cologne, Aug. 24. The Prince of Tour Tax's, whose Marriage with the Princess of Furstemberg is fixed for the 22d of next Month, is expected here from Brussels towards the End of this Week in his Way to Ratisbon. We learn from Copenhagen, that the Baron de Sotenshall, his Danish Majesty's Minister to the Court of Great Britain, had obtained his Letters of Revocation, and that he would be succeeded in that Employment by Baron de Rosen-cranz, his Danish Majesty's Minister at the Court of Berlin.

Berlin, Aug. 25. The Departure of the King for Silesia is fixed for the 1st of next Month.

Versailles, Aug. 26. This Evening, about Six o'Clock, the Dauphiness was happily delivered of a Princess.

Hanover, Aug. 30. His Majesty is in perfect Health, and proposes to set out on Tuesday next for the Gohree.

Hague, Sept. 1. The States of Holland and Westfrizeland have this Day resumed their Deliberations. This being his Serene Highness the Prince of Orange's Birth Day, who enters into the 40th Year of his Age, there will be great Rejoycings here this Evening on that Occasion, for which Preparations are now making. We learn by our last Letters from Brussels, that M. Haren, their High Mightinesses Minister to that Court, was set out from thence for Loo, where he proposed staying some Weeks. The Regiment of Major General Deutz, which was ordered a few Days ago into Garrison at Bois-le Duc, is already on its March thither; and the first Battalion of the Regiment of Hirzel, which was in Garrison at Woerden, and the second Battalion of the same Regiment, which has been for some Months past in Garrison at Harlem, are on their March from those two Places for Namur. We have received an Account from Vienne in Dauphiny, by Letters which came in this Day from thence, that they have had such prodigious Quantities of Rain there for several Days together, that the River which runs through that City had greatly overflowed its Banks; that the Stream ran so very strong, that a great Number of Houses and Warehouses, and several Mills, had been destroyed by it, and many Lives were lost; that the Waters had extended themselves for some Miles round, and done great Damage in all the neighbouring Villages; and that the Loss upon this Occasion was computed at about three Millions of Livres.
