*Rome, August 15.*

**P**RINCE Ruspoli is set out from hence for Venice, in order, as 'tis said, to make some Propositions for amicably adjusting the Differences which have arisen between this Court and that Republick, on Account of the Patriarchate of Aquileja. The tempestuous Weather we have lately had in this Country, has done a deal of Mischief to all the Fruits of the Earth in general.

*Genoa, Aug. 17.* This Government having been informed, that three Barbary Corsairs were cruizing off the Island of Gorgone, in the Sea of Corfica, they immediately ordered three armed Gallions, which lay ready in Port, to go in quest of them. Seven Dutch Ships have arrived here within these few Days; and as we were informed that one of them had touched on the Coast of Africa, where a contagious Distemper still reigns, the Government have obliged her to perform an exact Quarantine.

*Petersbourg, Aug. 18.* A few Days ago her Imperial Majesty went to visit their Imperial Highnesses the Grand Duke and Grand Dutchess, at their House at Oranienbaum, where a most magnificent Entertainment was provided; to which the principal Lords and Ladies of the Court, and all the Foreign Ministers were invited. Count Rasomowsky, the new Atteman or General of the Cossacks, has obtained the Rank of Field Marshal of her Imperial Majesty's Armies.

*Leghorn, Aug. 20.* Yesterday the new Men of War put to Sea for the Levant, having on board several Knights of the Order of St. Stephen, who have been waiting here for some Time past to go on this Expedition. We have received Advice, that the Republick of Lucca having been informed that the Duke of Modena was arrived at Castelnovo, upon the Frontiers of that Republick, they had sent M. Sardini, to compliment him thereupon in their Name.

*Vienna, Aug. 22.* We are informed by Letters from Bohemia, that their Imperial Majesties arrived at Neuhoff on the 17th Instant; and the next Morning all the Troops which are encamped near that Place, under the Command of Prince Lobkowitz, were drawn out in order of Battle, and performed all their Military Evo-

lutions in the Presence of their Imperial Majesties, who afterwards withdrew to a magnificent Tent purposely erected for them, when all the Troops, both Horse and Foot, passed in Review before them; after which they returned to Neuhoff. On the 19th their Imperial Majesties went again to the Camp, and saw all the Troops drawn out as before, and having seen them perform several Exercises, Evolutions and Firings, they returned again to Neuhoff, extremely pleased with the Appearance and Behaviour of those Troops. On the 20th the Court set out from Neuhoff to visit the other Camps in Bohemia; and 'tis said they will return to Schonbrun by the 26th or 27th at farthest, in order to celebrate the Empress Dowager's Birth-Day.

*Warsaw, Aug. 22.* Last Thursday being the Anniversary of their Polish Majesties Day of Marriage, the same was celebrated at Court with great Magnificence; on this Occasion their Majesties received the Compliments of the principal Nobility of the Kingdom; after which his Majesty disposed of several Important Posts, amongst which the young Count de Bruhl was appointed Starostie of this City, and was accordingly installed in that High Office by the Prince of Czartorinsky, Palatin of Russia. The Senatus Consilium opens on the 25th Instant, so that their Majesties Departure for Dresden will not take Place so soon as was expected. So many Robberies and Murders are committed in this City almost every Night, that they have been obliged to reinforce the Garrison, and to double the Guards and Patroles. They write from Podolia, that the Heyducks, notwithstanding their late Defeat, had appeared again in that Province; that a large Body of them had plundered the Inhabitants of the Town of Latyczew, and that they had retired to the Mountains with their Booty, before the Arrival of a Detachment of the Crown Army, who was ordered to the Relief of the Town.

*Copenhagen, Aug. 25.* The King has caused an Ordonnance to be published, by which the Portuguese Jews are allowed the same Freedom of Commerce throughout his Dominions, as is allowed to those of all other Nations. His Majesty, in Consideration of the great Loss which many of the Inhabitants of this Kingdom have suffered

suffered by the Distemper amongst the Horned Cattle, has ordered that they shall be excused, for the present, from paying one eighth Part of their yearly Taxes.

*Vienna, Aug. 26.* This Morning the Empress Queen passed by this City for Schonbrun, from the Tour she had made with the Emperor to view the Camps in Bohemia and Moravia; but his Imperial Majesty proposes staying in Bohemia about a Fortnight longer.

*Stockholm, Aug. 28.* The King continues his Residence at Carsberg, and enjoys a pretty good State of Health. The Princess, Spouse of the Prince Successor, went Abroad on Sunday last for the first Time since her Lying-in. The same Day their Royal Highnesses, accompanied by Prince Gustavus, went from Drottningholm to Exholm, where they propose spending the Remainder of the fine Season. The King has appointed Count Gyllenbourg to be President of the Mines; but we do not hear that his Majesty has as yet disposed of the Office of Grand Marshal of the Court, in the room of Baron Taube, who died on the 19th Instant. We learn by our last Letters from Finland, that all Things there remained in perfect Tranquillity, the Troops of both Nations continuing very quiet in their respective Quarters.

*Copenhagen, Aug. 29.* Yesterday General Numfen, who was appointed some Time since Governor of this City, took Possession of that Employment, and was complimented thereupon by all the Principal Officers of this Garrison. Count Reventlau, President of the Council of Altena, arrived here on the 27th in the Evening. Last Saturday Night a Fire broke out in the little Town of Prestoe, which burnt with such Violence, that in about two Hours Time both Sides of the Town were burnt to the Ground, which has reduced the greatest Part of the Inhabitants to extreme Want.

*Dresden, Aug. 29.* The Princess Royal advances happily in her Pregnancy. The Departure of Prince Xavier for the Court of France, will take Place the Beginning of next Month. We have received Advice by our last Letters from Lusatia, that a prodigious Swarm of Locusts had settled in the Neighbourhood of that Place, and had done an infinite deal of Damage.

*Berlin, Sept. 1.* This Morning the King, accompanied by Prince Ferdinand of Brunswick, and several General Officers, and Lords of the Court, set out on a Tour to Silesia. His Majesty proposes taking his Route by Custrin, where he intends staying only one Day, in order to review the Regiments of Dragoons of Rothenbourg, Bonin, and Katt, who are assembled for that Purpose in the Neighbourhood of that Place. Their Royal Highnesses the Princes Henry and Ferdinand, Prince Maurice of Anhalt Dessau, Prince Eugene of Wirtemberg, and several other Persons of Distinction, who were also to accompany his Majesty in this Tour, set out Yesterday. The Margrave and Margravine of Bareith are still here, but propose setting out on their Return Home on Saturday next.

*Hanover, Sept. 4.* We are informed by Letters from the Gohrde, that his Majesty arrived there in perfect Health.

*Hague, Sept 4.* Mr. Chiquet notified, on Wednesday last, to the President of the Weck, the Birth of the Princess, of whom the Dauphiness of France was delivered on the 26th of August, N. S. The States of Holland are still assembled. The Treaty of Subsidy with the Elector of Bavaria, lately concluded at Hanover, has been ratified here by the States of Holland, as well as by the States General; and the Ratification has since been sent back to M. Hop at Hanover.

*Hague, Sept. 8.* The States of Holland separated on Saturday last, till they are convoked again. We hear from Utrecht, that the Hereditary Prince of Anspach has left that Town in order to return to the Margrave his Father's Court. He goes to Loo first, to take Leave of their Royal and Serene Highnesses the Prince and Princess of Orange, who continue to enjoy a good State of Health at that Place.
