THE Bashaw has ordered the Eight British Subjects, which were taken some Time since in a Danish Ship of 16 Guns, called the St. Antonio, John Sands, Master, to be delivered up to the British Vice-Consul at this Place, who embark'd them on the 5th of June last on Board a Pollacco for Mahon, in their Way to England.

Tangier, Aug. 17. The Sickness is now quite extinguished in both these Towns, it being upwards of a Month since any Symptom thereof has appeared. During the Time it lasted, according to the best Computation, it carried off about 3000 Persons, together with the Alcaide, and the British Vice-Consul; and out of 130 Jewish Families in this Town, but 15 Jews remain alive.

Algiers, Aug. 27. On the 22d past a French Vessel, with about Seventy Passengers on board, came to an Anchor in this Road from Tetuan, and a Report being immediately spread that the Plague was on board, the Dey gave Orders that no Person should come on Shore, and agreed with the French Consul that the said Vessel should perform a Quarantine of Forty Days; but as Mr. Keppel, the British Commodore, took it into Consideration, that as those People were absolutely ignorant of the Laws of Quarantine, and consequently had neither Regulations nor Officers adapted thereto, that there would be the greatest Danger of the Infection's being introduced by some rash Attempt or other of the Passengers, he therefore represented to the Dey, that the important Command his Britannick Majesty had entrusted him with, obliged him to remonstrate to his Highness, that he could by no Means think of staying one Moment in the Bay, unless that Vessel was ordered away immediately; upon which the Dey sent that Instant for the French Druggerman, and gave him Orders to send the Vessel away directly, which was done accordingly, not only to the British Commodore's, but to the Satisfaction of almost the whole City. On Friday the 27th past, about Ten at Night, the whole City was under the greatest Consternation, by the blowing up of one of the Castles, in which were, as 'tis said, about fifteen Barrels of Powder; but as the Castle stood upon a Hill above the Town,

and was built chiefly of Earth and Mortar, the City received no material Damage; but as for the Castle itself, nothing but the Ruins remain. Two or three contiguous Country Houses were thrown down, and about 20 People in all killed. The Cruizers of this Place did very little the last Cruize, having only taken a small Portuguese Vessel loaden with Salt; another with 124 Chests of Sugar; a Neapolitan with Sparta, whose Crew escaped in their Launch; and a small Vessel with Oil and Tunny Fish. They are now all out again. The annual Danish Ship, with Powder, Naval Stores, &c. is arrived, and 'tis said has brought all agreeable to Treaty.

Petersbourg, Sept. 7. The Fleet belonging to this Empire, having finished its Cruize, most of the Ships which composed it are gone into their different Ports, in order to be laid up. There is arrived at Cronstadt, a new Ship of War, built at Archangel, and named the City of Moscow; and 'tis said there are several others building in the said Port, which will be ready to launch next Spring.

Naples, Sept. 8. The two Galliot, which the Court lately ordered to be stationed on the Coast of Calabria, in order to hinder the clandestine Trade which has, for a long Time past, been carried on there, have already taken several Barques loaden with contraband Goods; but the Orders they received not to go off the Coast, has prevented their giving Chace to some Corsairs which are cruizing in those Parts, and very much interrupt the Commerce.

Rome, Sept. 12. The Pope has assigned a Pension for the Bishop of Volterre, who has been for some Time confined in the Castle of St. Angelo, and given him Leave to walk about the City; but 'tis said that Prelate has excused himself from accepting of either of those Favours. Since the publick Notice that was given for the bringing to the Secretary of State's Office, Samples of Oil and Olives, in order to contract for supplying the Inhabitants of this City with the same for a certain Number of Years, many Dealers in those Commodities have given in their Proposals, but as yet that Affair is undetermined. A few Days ago the Prince of Caserta received Advice, that the great Forest of Caserta was entirely destroyed by Fire, but that no one could tell how it happened.

Genoa, Sept. 12. General Pallavicini, who has been here for this Fortnight past, is on his Departure for Milan, in order to take Possession of

of the Government of that Dutchy. The Weather is at present so prodigious hot here, that the City is near deserted, most of its Inhabitants being gone into the Country for the Sake of the Air.

Milan, Sept. 17. An Edict of the Empress Queen of Hungary has been published here, by which her Imperial Majesty diminishes considerably the Duties upon divers Sorts of Foreign Merchandize, which shall for the Future be brought into or carried out of this Country. This Edict has caused great Joy amongst the Merchants, and is looked upon as one of the good Offices which Count Harrach, Governor General of the Milaneze, has done for this Country; and makes his Departure from hence, which is fixed for To-morrow, very much regretted. Count Pallavicini, the new Governor General of this Country, is expected here some Day next Week.

Neuschatel, Sept. 18. Last Sunday Night and Monday Morning we had a most surprizing Quantity of Rain fell here, which swelled the River that runs through the lower Part of this City so very much, as occasioned it to overflow, and brake down its Banks; and the Torrent was so very strong; that several Bridges and Mills were broke down and carried away by it, as was in short every Thing that stood in its Way; which makes the Loss to the Inhabitants much more considerable than any one can possibly imagine, who has not seen the great Damage that has been done by this Inundation.

Vienna, Sept. 29. The Deputies of the States of Lower Austria are most of them arrived in this City, and will open their annual Assembly on the 22d Instant with the usual Ceremonies. M. Petzold, Resident from the King of Poland, as Elector of Saxony, is arrived here; and Count Flemming, Envoy Extraordinary from his Polish Majesty, is daily expected. The Coaches of Prince Esterhasi were Yesterday sent away for Naples, whither that Prince is going as Ambassador from their Imperial Majesties; and the Equipage of Count Esterhasi, who is going with the same Character to the Court of Spain, are also sent away for Madrid, and will be followed by the Count himself the beginning of next Month. The Departure of Count Kaunitz, on his Embassy to the Court of France, remains fixed for the 25th Instant. Count Canale, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Sardinia, is making Preparations for receiving, from the Hands of the Emperor, the Investiture of the Estates the King his Master holds in Fiefs of the Empire; and we are assured that the Investiture of the Duke of Modena will take Place soon after.

Dresden, Sept. 21. By Letters from Warsaw we are informed, that the King was at length determined to go to Petrikau, in order to assist at the Election of a Marshal of the Tribunal of that City, which was to come on the 25th Instant; and that the Ulans had received Orders to hold themselves in Readiness to march, in order to escort his Majesty thither. The Great Chancellor, and several Grandees

of that Kingdom, propose to accompany his Majesty in that Journey with a numerous Retinue.

Ratisbon, Sept. 24. The Celebration of the Marriage of the Prince of Tour Taxis with the Princess of Furstenberg, was performed on the 21st Instant, at Night, with great Magnificence; and on the 22d and 23d their Highnesses received the Compliments of the Nobility, Foreign Ministers, and all other Persons of Distinction. The Feast and Rejoycing on this Occasion lasted two Days.

Franckfort, Sept. 27. The Elector of Cologne arrived here on the 25th Instant from Bonn, and was saluted by the Cannon from our Ramparts; after which his Electoral Highness received the Compliments of the Magistrates of this City in a Body, and Yesterday he continued his Route for Mergentheim, in order to hold a Chapter of the Teutonic Order, and create some new Knights.

Hague, Oct. 2. The States of Holland assembled on Wednesday last in Consequence of their Summons. We hear from Zealand that the States of that Province separated on Friday last, and appointed the 12th Instant for their re-assembling. During their last Meeting they have again farmed out their Publick Revenue for the Year 1751, and agreed to set on Foot a Negotiation for raising 300,000 Florins at Three per Cent. The Duke of Richmond arrived here a few Days ago from England; and this Morning his Grace set out for Loo, from whence he purposes to proceed to Hanover. M. Caudebach, who was lately appointed the King of Poland's Resident at the Hague, delivered on Monday last his Credentials to the President of the Week, and has since been acknowledged by the States General.
